

Vocational service began with the founding of our organization back in 1905. Rotary membership relied on the classification system and still does today. It assures representation of members from a cross-section of a community.

"The second part of the Object of Rotary calls for Rotarians to apply high ethical standards in their businesses and professions, recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations and to consider their own occupations as opportunities to serve society."

Initially, vocational service focused on personal contributions within the workplace but over time Rotarians expanded the definition by organizing career seminars and vocational workshops. During the 1990's Rotary Volunteers and a program called "Rotary Fellowships" were formed under vocational service.

Clubs can accomplish vocational service in many ways: classification talks and tours of Rotarian's businesses, recognize vocational excellence and high ethical standards in the community, career development and vocation at work.

One of the key things that make Rotary truly unique is our commitment to the values or ethics inherent in our "Four Way Test". This month will serve as a great reminder for Rotarians to renew this commitment in our businesses, Club activities and community service!

The Rotary Club of **Brunswick Coastal** continues to sponsor a Rotary "Service Above Self" Quilt For Aids. For the past several years the **Coastal** Rotary Club has worked with other District 7780 Clubs and our local community organizations to help fight AIDS and its devastating effects in South Africa. The purpose of the quilt is to help raise awareness and promote ways of helping, both here and abroad. Interested community businesses, organizations and individuals donate \$250 to sponsor and produce a foot square patch that will become part of our Rotary Quilt for AIDS.

All funds will be used directly in either local community AIDS prevention projects or to help the AIDS orphaned children of South Africa via ongoing **Coastal** Rotary projects. On July 20 of this year Past President of the Rotary Club of **Brunswick Coastal Mark Costa**, had the good fortune of meeting RI President **Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar** while making up at the Rotary Club of **San Juan. Puerto Rico. Mark** and **Carl-**

Wilhelm spoke about Brunswick **Coasta**l's interest and contacts in China. "I told Carl-Wilhelm that we have some valuable contacts in China through our current club President, Mary **Tennant**, and that we were investigating how best to utilize them to promote Rotary in China." It turned out that China is of great interest to RI as well. Mark came away impressed with Carl-**Wilhelm**'s desire to help. "The whole experienced reinforced my sense of how right Rotary is for channeling my desire to help others. Meeting Carl-Wilhelm and being able to discuss China with him, even if only for a few minutes, underscored how Rotary so excels at connecting the dots and providing the networking so necessary to getting things done."

The Rotary Club of **Freeport**'s Resolution to make Santa Barbara, Honduras, a sister city was unanimously approved by **Freeport** Town Council. Santa Barbara is the focus of the Rotary Club's *Pure Water for the World* project. Making this project an official project of the City of **Freeport** lends increased credibility to the raising \$55,000 to provide all 533 families in the villages and hamlets of Santa Barbara with their own water purification capacities. **Freeport** Rotary will

also be sending delegations to Santa Barbara to assist in the distribution of the filtering units, and to train families in the maintenance of the units. Freeport high schoolers will work with indigenous personnel, along with Pure Water and Peace Corps personnel, to educate families in preventive health activities. In this sister city relationship, **Freeport** is looking for the development of opportunities for families to share experiences and expertise.

The Rotary Club of **Brunswick** was very active at this years District Conference. President Dave Fuller led a breakout session outlining the club's Tsunami relief project in Sri Lanka to rebuild a coastal fishing village in partnership with the Rotary Club of **Colombo**, Sri Lanka. Past President Juliana L'Heureux also led a breakout "Rotary and Teenagers." Julie highlighted how her Club has forged a relationship with the Brunswick Teen Center which dates back to 1944. Because of Rotary's fundraising efforts and the active involvement of the Brunswick Rotarians the Teen Center is flourishing!

The Rotary Club of **Bath Sunrise** will host its annual Latin American Fiesta Dinner and Silent Auction, on Friday night, October 7, from 5-7 PM, at the Bath Senior Center. Tickets are \$10.00 in advance and \$12.00 at the door. The Netza School Project for over 400 indigenous children in Zihuatanejo, MX and several Nicaraguan families will be beneficiaries of this event. Bath **Sunrise** has just donated \$2,000 to the Katrina relief effort and last week gave \$500 to "The Sharing Foundation".
