It is hard for the average American to imagine that a modern Western culture can produce poems of childhood such as this. No Hope for Tomorrow was written in 1988 by then 14-yr-old Karyn Woods, and though some things are far better in Northern Ireland today, most children there still live in predominantly Protestant or Catholic communities, with many of the same fears. However, the Friends Forever program that was started in Portsmouth Rotary and that brought Karyn to the US is continuing to operate throughout District 7780 and others, and has now provided life-alteringexperiences for just under a thousand teens from Belfast, Ballymena, and o ther troubled towns in Northern Ireland (as well as Israel).

It was a feast complete with all the Thanksgiving staples: turkey, stuffing, gravy, mashed potatoes, and homemade pie -- to name a few.

More than 100 Rotary members and community volunteers worked to prepare the meal and create a cozy, welcoming environment to help their guests feel at home for the holiday.

Rotarian Betsy Scott said she enjoys helping the familiar faces she sees around town. "This is for the people and to show them support," she said.

The guests were waited on hand and foot by the volunteers, who served whatever the guests desired.

Scott said the smile on her face can't get any bigger than when a guest asks for anything, even just a full cup of coffee. "It gives me such a thrill to make these people feel like there is an overabundance of food just for them, which there is," she said.

To make sure everyone got a chance at Thanksgiving dinner, the Rotary Club also delivered the meal home to some.

For 10 years, Rotarian Jay Levy has organized and dropped off the home deliveries. Lately he has recruited his children for help and uses the day to not only get closer to them, but also to the community. "You make great relationships," he said. "Year after year, this is one of those things people anticipate and look forward to. It's a great thing for everybody."

The event chairman, Donald Coker, said volunteers began preparing the meal Wednesday. Portsmouth Regional Hospital donated the food and the space to cook it. They cooked about 10 turkeys and baked 25 pies to satisfy an expected 125 guests for the sit-down meal and all the home deliveries.

Rochester Rotary Club Teams with IMEC

Cider Berry of Eastern Propane and Oil presents Rochester Rotary Treasurer, Dave Keefe, with a check for \$1,000, which will cover a portion of the cost to ship over \$200,000 worth of medical equipment to Rivas Hospital in Rivas, Nicaragua. The equipment, donated by Frisbie Memorial Hospital and the Rochester District VNA, will furnish 20 rooms in the Rivas hospital making

hospital stays and treatment available to many impoverished citizens who would otherwise be turned away. Rochester Rotary has teamed up with IMEC, International Medical Equipment Collaborative, to streamline the transportation of this sensitive equipment from the U.S. through customs and into Nicaragua and other needy third world countries. IMEC is providing the pod that will transport the entire shipment.



Boothbay Harbor Rotary Club Hosts Visitors in a Unique Setting

The Boothbay Harbor Rotary Club is the only Rotary Club in the United States to own its own clubhouse! Back in the late '40s, few restaurants in our fishing community were open year-round, and options such as church fellowship halls just weren't available. Club members had been meeting in a series of places including the local plumbing shop, but none were considered satisfactory, so in 1948 Club members finally decided to build their own space. We've been proudly meeting

in our clubhouse ever since, and our collection of banners and Rotary memorabilia has made us a destination for makeups and "summer complaints" throughout all these years!

Our clubhouse gives us a unique venue to host special guests. For example, we invite the entire high school senior class to dinner each year just before graduation, and we also annually honor a community Lifetime Achiever. And this month, we invited the American Legion to join us for a special Veterans Day program.

Spc. Derek Anderson, a reservist with the 182nd Armored Division just returned from Iraq, held the rapt attention of an audience of Rotarians and veterans when he spoke of his experiences at the

clubhouse in early November. But the real stars of the evening were the veterans -- Rotarians and American Legionnaires alike -- whose service dates back to World War II, Korea and Vietnam, and who all stood and quietly shared their service affiliation and their duty stations. The veterans thanked us for inviting them to dinner -- but mostly they thanked us just for remembering the service they have rendered and the time and sacrifice they have given our nation.

These projects range from establishing a sister club relationship in a foreign country to simply bringing spouses and children to club meetings or club events.

In all probability, most clubs are already involved in Family of Rotary activities. In Newburyport, for example, the Rotary club presents the annual Santa Claus parade. The Coast Guard brings club president Santa and Mrs. Claus by boat. The Rotarian Sleigh Team pulls the carriages of Santa and Mrs. Claus through the streets of downtown and Interact students dressed as cartoon characters such as Elmo, Shreck and Dora the Explorer help entertain the thousands of children, parents and grandparents who come to take part in this heartwarming event.

Saco Bay Rotary Prison Library Project

The prison library project is a project that involves cooperation on the part of the York County Sheriff's Dept., Sister Theresa and The Saco Bay Rotary. Sister Theresa is an amazing person who works tirelessly on a number of projects within the prison. These projects focus not only on the prisoners but also their families, especially the children. The prison library is just one project she oversees. She greatly appreciates the support, both financially and in the volunteerism she receives from Saco Bay Rotary. We have donated money for specific needs she has, such as, toys for the kids at Christmas or furnishing a quiet space for the children to spend time while the adults meet in the visitation rooms nearby.

As important, if not more so, is the volunteerism we have provided to organize and maintain the prison library. All the books are donated. Usually, Sister Theresa is the one beating the bushes for donations of books although we have supported her in that way as well. The actual work centers around unpacking the donated books and getting them on the shelves in some kind of order so that when a special request is made, the sheriff's deputies who are handing out the books will know where to look. We also put returned books back on the shelves. The prison staff truly appreciates the work we do.

The challenge is keeping the books organized. We don't use the Dewey Decimal System. It's more a matter of putting like kind books together. We have quite a collection, which includes self-help, poetry, romance, classic fiction, mysteries, non-fiction, biographies, sports and more

Why do we do it? I can't speak for Pat Lilly or Kitty Chadbourne (without whom this project doesn't exist), but for myself I'd say that in books there's hope and, dare I say, the chance of escape, if only for a short time. At the very least, no matter what your station in life, you can always find a character in literature that is worse off than you are.
