A Word from Governor Marie--

My Fellow Rotarians:

Well, winter started late but has been hitting some of us with a vengeance, which is good for the north country! In just about two weeks, it will be spring and the end of our year together will be here before we know it. Spring is the time to think of new beginnings and I know DGE Liz and her team are busy planning for the beginning of their year - PETS, District Assembly, etc.

March is Literacy month in Rotary. As you all know by now, literacy is very near and dear to my heart having grown up in a household where only one parent could read and write. It never ceases to amaze me to see how many projects are being done around the world to help promote literacy - building schools, providing equipment for the schools. Providing food to entice children to go to school. Helping parents earn money so their children can have clothes to go to school and endless supplies of books for the schools. You haven't forgotten about promoting it here in your own communities as well. The dictionary project that I talked about during my official club visits has been done by a good part of the district, which is absolutely fantastic! The stories related to this project have been wonderful. Then there are club members who read to school children, are mentors and the many clubs that give books to their local or school libraries in honor of their guest speakers. The clubs put a book plate inside saying it is from the Rotary Club of ------ in honor of our speaker and many have the speaker sign it. I have had the privilege of signing a number of these books this year but I have also seen a number of other people sign books. The looks on these peoples faces when they sign a book is just wonderful, they are very honored to do so.

We need to remember to promote literacy in our homes as well. We all lead busy lives but don't forget the simple pleasures in life. Instead of taking the time to "smell the roses", take the time to "read to your child or grandchild" or an elderly person whose sight is failing. You have all heard me say the best thing in the world is being able to hold a small child in your lap and read to them until they fall asleep. I have often heard people say, "that is nice but my children are too big to hold in my lap and read to them now but I make sure they have plenty of books to read." But just giving them books to read isn't enough. Take the time to sit down with them and ask them to read out loud to you. This is not only quality time with your child but at the same time you are checking on their reading ability. If they are having problems reading, find out why - do they need glasses, do they have dyslexia or just having a hard time and need some extra help. It is much easier to catch it when they are young and not let them struggle all through school and sometimes through life with this problem.

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Often times a child goes all the way through high school with a reading problem that no one picked up on. If this happens and they go out into the business world, it is not going to be any easier for them. They will struggle even more as they can't get a good job or if they do, they can't advance in their job or they are fired because they aren't doing a good job. As employers, we need to keep an eye out for an employee that is struggling in their job. We often assume they are lazy and don't want to work but it may be they are struggling to read directions or keep up with memos. Take them aside and try to find out what the real problem is. I know first hand that people are very reluctant to admit they can't read or write, as they are embarrassed or ashamed. They should not be made to feel this way.

When you can't read or write, your opportunities in life are very limited. Giving people the ability to read is the best gift you can give anyone. When you can read and write the world is open to you and you can do anything you want to. Please continue to help **Lead the Way** to a more literate world!

But for New Year's things got much better, I went up to Jo's and we had a big new years party at her house.

Here in Constanta is goooooood, my host family is great, I'm going to be really sad when I have to leave :(I have a lot of friends all over the city, one of my good guy friends always jokes that I know more people than he does and he's lived here his entire life. School here is really really boring, but my school is very very close to where I live so it's not so bad. Every couple of days I go for walks with my friend Bogdon around the lake near by or to the sea, it's very fun and he is a really smart guy so we have lots to talk about. Here it's very uncool to be intelligent or show your intelligence, so it was nice to find someone who doesn't care about that. Things here have just gotten really normal for me, now the USA feels like a foreign country, which is a strange thing to experience. March is Literacy Month Adopt – Donate – Volunteer!

Nearly 800 million people worldwide, over age 15 lack basic reading and writing skills. More than 64 percent of them are women. About 113 million children do not attend school.

With stark statistics like that, is it any wonder that literacy has been a primary emphasis for Rotary since 1986? The Rotary International Board of Directors has made the promotion of functional literacy, reading and writing skills necessary to fully participate in everyday life, a special focus. There are multiple opportunities for clubs to become involved in literacy projects, both locally and internationally. The only limitation is our imagination. Whether working with our local schools, supporting early literacy programs for pre-school children, providing outreach for adults with limited literacy skills, or assisting children or women in far away communities, you might think of literacy projects through three lenses: Adopting, Donating, or Volunteering.

Becoming involved in a program that involves adopting creates a long term commitment to a program, a school, or a group of individuals. It could be providing scholarships to students who could not otherwise attend school, as in the case of many adolescent children in developing countries. Adopting students at risk in one of our local schools might mean checking in with students who would benefit by an adult mentor whose encouragement and support will keep their focus on success in school. This support and mentoring may be of great assistance to an individual enrolled in an adult education program, working to earn their GED.

There are many worthwhile projects that can benefit from your club's donations. Locally, many local nursing homes appreciate donations of books for their residents. Programs that serve low-income families would appreciate donations of resource materials to help new parents know how to best support developing literacy skills in their young children. There are many worthwhile international organizations that provide books and school supplies to students who would otherwise not be able to attend school. The structure is in place, these projects need the capital to continue their work.

And how many ways are there to volunteer time to support literacy? I can't imagine a primary grade teacher who wouldn't be thrilled to have volunteers in the classroom to read to or with students. Kindergarten and first grade teachers can always put adults to work listening to children's words and helping them to write down those words. Has your club offered to become involved in a vocational day at your local middle school – and as a part of talking about your professional life, underscoring the importance of reading skills? For those who are a bit more adventurous, opportunities abound to work with organizations who provide support for children in other countries, volunteering to work with children in orphanages, hospitals, day care programs, or schools.

During March, Literacy Month, I challenge each club to look at adopting, donating, or volunteering with

a new-to-you literacy project. If you would like additional or specific ideas or information of potential literacy projects, don't hesitate to contact me!

DGE's Corner-

2007-2008: ROTARY SHARES

On January 29, at the International Assembly in San Diego, RI President-Elect Wilf Wilkinson announced the Rotary theme for the coming year: ROTARY SHARES. In his words, "In choosing this theme, I thought about how much of Rotary is about sharing. We share our time, we share our talents, we share our money with others who need our help. We share our kindness and we share our love."

President-Elect Wilf went on to announce that he will continue to build on the four emphases that President Bill Boyd chose for this year: Water, Health and Hunger, Literacy and The Family of Rotary. These areas are built on each other. Clean water and adequate nutrition are prerequisites for healthy families. Children need to be healthy and well fed in order to learn in school. Families need to be healthy and literate in order to break the cycle of ignorance and poverty though education and vocational training.
