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A Word From Governor Marie-

My fellow Rotarians,

Before I discuss the focus for this month, let me update you on what Bruce and I have been doing.

In the last month we visited 27 clubs, had the privilege of inducting new members, presented Paul Harris Fellows, Sustaining Member stickers, took part in a dictionary project presentation, received a plaque for the District from the Rotary Club of Venezuela, and heard that hundreds of dollars have gone to local libraries to promote literacy. We learned about water projects throughout the district, thousands of dollars presented to The Rotary Foundation, Blane Grant applications to promote immunization, and Public Relations Grant requests.

We worked in a Soup Kitchen, learned about the numerous projects that are being done all over the world PLUS all the things that clubs do besides the ones listed above - WOW! The fellowship and friendships that they are developing will last for years. You are all enlarging your Family of Rotary.

Now on to the focus for November - Foundation Month.

The Rotary Foundation has two aspects – the giving or Funds Development portion, and the spending or Grant Awards. Since I was last District Governor, the annual giving program is almost double what it was nine years ago. We now have more international projects with grant awards than we have ever had before.

The Funds Development has two different areas that we need to think about – the Annual Giving Program and the Permanent Fund.

The Annual Giving Program (AGP) is the primary source of support for the programs of The Rotary Foundation. The money in the AGP is spent every year on Foundation Programs, such as Humanitarian Grants which include the District Simplified Grants, Individual Grants, Matching Grants, 3-H Grants and Blane Grants. Then there are the Educational Programs, which include Ambassadorial Scholarships, Group Study Exchange, Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolutions and Rotary Grants for University Teachers. What about PolioPlus and PolioPlus Partners? Think of all the lives you have changed because of this one program alone!

The Permanent Fund secures The Rotary Foundation programs for the future through endowments. A portion of the funds is allocated to benefit Foundation programs every year, providing additional funds to meet the high demand for annual programs. The Permanent Fund has increased in recent years, which has enabled the Foundation to give more support to its annual programs. Donations to the Permanent Fund are usually in the form of Major Gifts or endowed funds, bequests, or life-income agreements. These types of donations can be very complex, so talk with an investment advisor along with our regional Rotary Foundation coordinator.

We need to be sure we all contribute to the Annual Giving Program each year so we can continue to do District Simplified Grants in our own communities and Matching Grants around the world.

Think about the good that your “Every Rotarian, Every Year” donation of \$100 does –

- One full year of education expenses for an underprivileged child in Thailand
- Dental and medical services to approximately 25 low-income individuals living in communities near Mexico City, Mexico
- Textbooks for a school in Villanueva, Colombia
- An osteoporosis education program and bone density screenings for six senior citizens in Iowa, USA
- A 10,000-kilowatt electric transformer that powers an agricultural/educational farm operated by a children’s orphanage in Mongolia.

Now multiply your \$100 by 5 or 10 and think what your \$500 or \$1,000 can do every year! Look at the impact your donation has on the world!

- The candidate must be willing and able to serve as a member of the committee for the three year tem.

Bath Sunrise Rotary Club Latin American Fiesta Dinner and Silent Auction

Bath Sunrise Rotary enjoyed another successful Latin American Dinner this year, raising nearly \$3,000 for international efforts. In Zihuatenejo Mexico the club supports the Netza Project, a bilingual primary school for 350 indigenous Indian children. Bath Sunrise also supports Safe Passage, a project founded by recent Bowdoin graduate Hanley Denning, which provides educational opportunities to nearly 200 children who live on the Guatemalan City Dump. Likewise, the club supports Campo Alagria which serves "dump children" in Nicaragua. Rotoplast fields volunteer doctors and other medical professionals throughout the world, to provide free reconstructive surgery to indigent children with cleft lips and palates. And, as we have for many years, we are proud to add our contribution to the \$600 million dollars Rotary International has already expended to eliminate polio throughout the world.



Rotary Club of Damariscotta – Newcastle Hosts "Friends Forever" Teens from Northern Ireland

The Rotary Club of Damariscotta – Newcastle was honored to host ten teens from the Ballymena region of Northern Ireland. Their visit to the mid coast region was sponsored and funded by the Rotary Clubs of Damariscotta-Newcastle and Boothbay Harbor. The group was accompanied by local program coordinator Erin Stodder and adult staff members Jim and Maureen Lynn.

The teens, ranging in age from 15 to 17, are part of the "Friends Forever" program. This twenty year old program sponsored by the Ballymena, Northern Ireland, YMCA brings teens from both sides of the sectarian divide in Northern Ireland together in a year long program that explores the cultures, emblems and symbols of the opposing religious communities that have been in deadly conflict for so long. One major aspect of the program is a trip to the United States where they travel together how our melting pot culture manages to live and co exist without the tensions still present in Northern Ireland. It is this unique and valuable experience that they spoke about to the club.

Following the club presentation, they toured the Damariscotta-Newcastle area and a picture taking session was enjoyed at the Pemiqid Point Lighthouse Park. The group was then entertained at a luncheon put on by the International Committee at the residence of President-Elect Carol Ransom. Committee members hosting the group included Pat Musser, Linda Brunner, Will Fiske, Joe Kindred, John Atwood, Bill Thompson and Gary and Judy Speers. Each member of the "Friends Forever" team from Ballymena was presented with a white rose to symbolize their "Leading the Way" towards peace.

The **Rotary Club of Oxford Hills** has just wrapped up their 3rd Grade Dictionary Project distributing a total of 301 to students in the school district. Club members donated items and made up 2 baskets to raffle off at the recent Business Showcase. It raised \$129 and was good exposure for promoting what Rotary is and does in the Oxford Hills. A brand new project this year, an Appraisal Day netted the club \$400 and allowed members and the public to bring items in, and for a fee, get an appraisal of their worth. The Club welcomed District Governor Marie for her annual visit with a BBQ and made a donation in her honor to the Paris Library Kids Program.

The **Fryeburg Area Club** also hosted a potluck dinner for Governor Marie and invited her and Bruce to join them in distributing 116 dictionaries to their 6th grade class at MollyOckett School. They also made a donation in Marie's honor to the Guatemala Literacy Program. Club members recently heard from 2 students they sponsored, about their experiences this summer at RYLA. And finally, as a result of their joint efforts with the Bridgton-Lake Region Club in running the Potato Booth at the Fryeburg Fair, were presented with the Red Potato, the White Potato and the Blue Potato by Bridgton-Lake Region President-Elect Mike Daley. The **Bridgton-Lake Region Club**, through Grant funding, will be distributing dictionaries to 3rd grade students at various Lake Region elementary schools. The Club also has plans for funds to be used for Christmas Angel and the Rotoplast projects. In conjunction with the

Brunswick Coastal Rotary Club, they have submitted a grant for a water project in Uganda.

The proceeds from the paying customers totaled about \$1,100, and will be used toward helping other families in need with heating bills this winter. Boothbay Harbor Rotary Supports Youth Locally and Across the Globe

Rotarians often say that our mission is to change the world – one child at a time. Boothbay Harbor Rotary Club activities in October proved that saying many times over:

We met – and cried – with three young Thai women who, thanks to Friends of Thai Daughters, a program started by two local Boothbay Region residents, have been saved from a life of prostitution or worse. Their personal stories moved us – but we also know that thousands of boys and girls are sold into Southeast Asia's Golden Triangle sex trade each year, so we voted the \$750 needed to keep just one young person decently housed and fed and in school for one year. The Thai Daughters' visit to our Clubhouse proved the opportunity to take the accompanying photo.

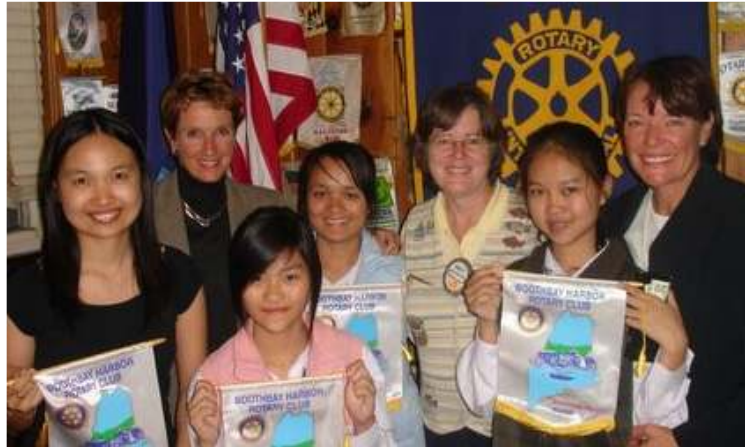
Other international youth activities include our continued involvement with Friends Forever, and our brand-new support for the Vietnam Libraries project.

Back at home, we were charmed by two young local Boothbay Region High School juniors, both recent recipients of Club scholarships, who used their scholarship funds to help turn their dreams into reality.

This month also, sparked by a District Simplified Grant, we organized to give dictionaries to all the second and third graders in the three elementary schools in our Region.

And, our long association with and support for local Scouts is acquiring new impetus: A new Cub Scout Pack is being formed. Not only will we sponsor the Pack, but the boys plans to meet in the Scout Hall which we built and continue to maintain for our area Boy and Girl Scouts.

The circle of life goes round: This month we also said a sorrowful goodbye to long-time member (since 1947!) Fred Pratt, a past president, Paul Harris Fellow and, since his health deteriorated, honorary member of our Club. In Fred's memory we quickly voted a \$500 gift to the Boothbay Region Student Aid Fund, the scholarship program originally started by our Club and which has grown into one of the largest in the state.

Public Relations

I became involved in the Rotary Club of Portland in 1986, after meeting a new client at his place of work. His name was Bob Pierce, a member of the Portland Rotary, and he was wearing his Rotary pin on the lapel of his suit jacket. I asked about it, and he invited me to a meeting. He might not have known it, but wearing his pin was one of the best form of public relations a Rotary member can do.

Public Relations is not just about sending out the proverbial press release and hoping the newspaper picks up the story. It's the simple matter of making others aware about our personal involvement in Rotary, with just the simplest of tools. I am not advocating getting a Rotary wheel tattoo on your arm, unless you have the arms for it. But wearing your Rotary pin is something we can all do. Here are some quick ideas to let others know you are a Rotarian! Letterman has his Top 10, so here are mine for Personal Rotarian PR!

- 1. Wear your Rotary Pin to work, to church, or to other community functions.**
- 2. Take your business picture wearing your Rotary pin.**
- 3. Wear a Rotary baseball cap to a ball game.**
- 4. Frame the Four Way Test for your office.**
- 5. Place your Rotarian Magazine in your doctor or dentists office.**
- 6. Put a Rotary decal on your car.**
- 7. Put the Rotary seal on your business card.**
- 8. Put the Four Way Test on the back of your business card.**
- 9. Use a Rotary Pen to sign deals.**
- 10. Give everyone in your family a Rotary T shirt!**

I encourage every Club President to take 15 seconds each meeting to announce one personal PR idea of the week. Keep the ideas in front of people. At the root of all Public Relations is a dogged determination to work it!

DGE's Corner

On Thursday, November 2, District 7780 held the annual Membership Seminar as well as the annual Foundation Seminar. As always it was a pleasure to see old friends and make new friends from all over the district. That evening, the Rotary Club of Portsmouth held a gala fundraiser for Friends Forever. Hundreds of Rotarians and other Portsmouth area supporter of Friends Forever were there as well as members of the Rotary Club of Salem, Mass. in District 7930 and the Rotary Club of Saratoga Springs, NY District 7190, Zone 31.

Clubs, Districts, Zones. What do they mean?

Throughout the world, there are more than 31,000 Rotary clubs and more than 1.2 million Rotarians. The club, large or small, provides the cornerstone of Rotary for, despite its vast size, Rotary remains a grassroots organization and most service efforts are carried out at the club level. Rotarians are members of their clubs, and the clubs are members of Rotary International.

All of these clubs are grouped into 529 districts with an average of 40-45 clubs in a district. Each district is led by a governor who serves for one year. The District Governor is an officer of Rotary International and serves for one year as its representative in the field. Each district also has assistant governors and various committees whose job is to support the clubs. In turn, districts are grouped into 34 zones. On average, each 15 districts make up a zone. District 7780 is in Zone 31.

Every other year, each zone elects a Past District Governor to serve on the Rotary International Board of Directors for a two-year term. For example, in the Rotary years 2006-2007 and 2007-2008, Michael McGovern from Zone 31 (as well as District 7780) is serving as one of the 17 Directors of Rotary International. For the years 2008-2009 and 2009-2010, Michael Colasurdo from Zone 32 will serve as Director. For the following two years, the Director will again be from Zone 31. In total, there are 19 members of the Board of Directors of Rotary International: the 17 Directors representing 34 zones plus the President and the President-elect. The President is the highest officer of Rotary International and is elected from among past directors. The President serves for a term of one year. This year's president is Bill Boyd from Pakuranga, New Zealand and next year's president will be Wilf Wilkinson from Trenton, Canada.

Yet, in spite of the vast scope, size and structure of Rotary International, Rotary's success lies in the clubs, large and small, whose individual members volunteer so much time, talent and treasure to make a difference in our world.
