Passing it On

If there's one thing all D-7780 Rotarians learn at PETS, at RLI, and whenever a speaker discourses on Polio Plus, it's that it was Filipino Rotarians who first conquered polio in their own country, and who led the way for RI to take on the fight against polio on a global basis. At the time, about 38 years ago, "everyone knew" that polio couldn't be exterminated from the Philippines, because this is a tropical country, because the serum has to be kept refrigerated, and because if one child missed the inoculation, that child could return to reinfect the entire village.

But the Filipino Rotarians persisted, and in a rapid six years they wiped out polio in their own country. RI took notice, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Fast forward to a few weeks ago, when I arrived here to lead the GSE team., and was completely dumbfounded to learn that very few Rotarians here in the Philippines -- including club presidents and assistant governors -- have any idea of the part they played in this incredible story.

So I've taken notice. Now, each of my talks begins by telling my Filipino Rotarian audience what I have just shared with you. But the lesson for D-7780 Rotarians is just as critical: We can't share our successes too often. It's all too easy to take for granted that "everyone knows" the local Rotary club started the scholarship program, or supports the food pantry, or gives money for home heating oil every year. Maybe "everyone" does know, but everyone frequently doesn't include the newbies ... and eventually it's the newbies who will need to pass the story on.

So let's sing our successes. Big and small. And let's never forget that it's up to us to make all the difference.



# Boothbay Harbor Rotary Supports Fuel Assistance Fund

With fuel costs rising, and many people in Maine unable to afford their heating expenses, the Boothbay Harbor Rotary Club was proud this month to support a fundraiser for the emergency fuel assistance fund of the Boothbay Region Community Resource Group.

State representative Bruce MacDonald organized and hosted a fundraising dinner on February 23, which was attended by more than 90 people and raised more than \$1,200 in donations from individuals and local businesses. But Rotarians Debbie and Darren Graves were among those in attendance, and carried with them a surprise: a \$2,000 donation from the Club. This helped bring the total amount raised to \$3,243. The money will be distributed to needy families throughout the region.

# District 7780 Well Represented at N.I.D. in India

On February 6, PDG Elias Thomas of Acton led fifty-four Rotarians and Friends of Rotary from six countries (United Kingdom, Sweden, France, Canada, Australia and the United States) to India to participate in a National Immunization Day (N.I.D.) against polio. Three other members of the Sanford-Springvale Rotary Club were among the team members. On February 9, the team met with the Chief Medical Officer of the area near Gurgaon and Sohna, and was provided with the latest statistics regarding new cases of polio (types 1 and 3), which have been diagnosed recently in Uttar Pradesh. Following this meeting, the team members joined some one hundred students from the Rotary Public School of Gurgaon and participated in a rally, as well as a march through the city of Sohna, helping to publicize the NID for the following day.

On February 10, members of Elias' team were dispersed throughout several small villages surrounding Sohna and Gurgaon, and dispensed oral polio vaccine to literally hundreds and hundreds of children younger than five years of age. In all of India, some 250,000 volunteers, including Rotarians, representatives from the W.H.O. and the United Nations were successful in immunizing nearly 172 Million children! Despite these efforts, a few new cases of polio have been diagnosed, originating in Uttar Pradesh and Bihar regions.

Polio eradication remains the singular corporate project for Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation. With your help and the extraordinary matching grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, we can reach this awesome

#### goal.

# ROTARIANS HELP SOUTH PORTLAND FOOD CUPBOARD



# March is Literacy Month Rotary Shares by Creating a Culture for Reading

Rotarians are amazing people. Consider the Rotarians in our district who have provided thousands of dictionaries to elementary school children, providing access important resource materials to a whole generation of children. Think about Rotarians visiting classrooms reading to young children, sharing the joy of story and rhyme. Have you heard about the Rotarians who are leading book study groups for fourth graders, giving these children an opportunity to experience quality literature and discuss their ideas? Rotarians are giving books to children several times during the school year to read and enjoy, sometimes being the only book these children have owned (and yes, these kids are kids in our own communities, right here in northern New England). Teachers in several communities have additional resource materials and books to share with their students, expanding classroom reading opportunities, how? Thanks to Rotarians, District 7780 actively supports a culture of reading.

So many Rotarians are helping to support a culture for reading as evidenced by the many projects undertaken by clubs in our districts. Yet, as a nation, there is much evidence that children are not reading, do not read, and do not value reading. As your club considers how to Share Rotary, there is no more important means of supporting your community than to support projects (and get actively involved in projects) that encourage and support reading. Share a story with a young child, talk with a middle school student about a piece of classic literature, establish a process in which you can encourage young parents to read with their baby, or begin book talk groups with high school students. March is Literacy Month for Rotarians. Take this time to emphasize the importance of reading and look ahead to developing new means to encourage and support reading. Let us tenderly and kindly cherish, therefore, the means of knowledge. Let us dare to read, think, speak, and write. (John Adams) Let us dare to share Rotary through literacy. Our communities, our children, and our future will benefit from Rotarians daring to create a culture for reading.

YES! Rotary Reads! Youth Book Club Received Rave Reviews

Twenty-five fourth graders from Yarmouth Elementary School were invited to participate in the pilot session of Yes! Rotary Reads, a Youth Book Club and twenty-five signed up. Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Yarmouth, ME, the Youth Book Club met in three sessions recently with local Rotarians Sharon Bagalio, Ted Hall and Gary Howard and Linda Varrell to discuss their first book, A Dog's Life: The Autobiography of a Stray By Ann M. Martin.

Feedback from parents and educators was overwhelmingly positive, with hopes that that program continues. Yes! Rotary Reads! was started by Rotarian Carolyn Johnson, the club's literacy chair and former school principal.

"Recreational reading seems to becoming a thing of the past," said Johnson, "we wanted to work with the students directly to generate enthusiasm in reading. The program gave the students the opportunity to discuss their thoughts and opinions in a structured environment with caring adults."

Working with Ellen Honan, the K-4 Language Arts Teacher, the program was designed to increase the students' interest in reading and improve comprehension. The discussion groups of five to eight students met three times and followed a typical book club format with open discussion and questions designed to gain insight into the author's thoughts and explore context, in this case, the world of abused and stray animals.
