2007-08 Rotary Foundation District Simplified Grants Awarded

Gov Liz is pleased to announce that District Simplified Grants for this Rotary year have been awarded. Our District received requests for about \$31,000 of Grant monies, against an available pool of a little over \$20,000. It is important to remember that the amount of money that is available to distribute among clubs in our district is directly related to the amount of money we, as both Clubs and as individuals, contribute to the Annual Program Funds of The Rotary Foundation. As many have heard "The more that goes in, the more than comes out – it is just that simple".

The District Foundation Committee, led by PDG Peter Johnson, is a mix of five Past Governors and four Past Presidents who spent significant time deliberating the merits of each request in hopes of achieving as equitable a conclusion as possible. Anyone wishing a more thorough understanding of the process need only call Peter, 800-451-0369(w) 207-846-6526(h).

A few grants were fully funded, a few were significantly discounted from the original request, and many fell in-between. The amount of the grants ranged from a low of \$700 to a high of \$2500. Grant recipients were the Rotary Clubs of Boothbay Harbor, Bridgton-Lake Region, Brunswick Coastal, Fryeburg Area, Hampton, Newburyport, Portsmouth Sunrise, Saco Bay, Sanford-Springvale, Sebago Lake, South Berwick, Wells, and Yarmouth.

Most importantly, Governor Liz noted, is that the District Simplified Grant program is a means to use a portion of Rotary Foundation assets to assist in a wide array of local projects, including multiple variations on a theme regarding literacy, community assets (such as playgrounds, a youth center, a senior center, a common garden, emergency medical services), and Meals on Wheels. "In all cases, this is about using relatively small amounts of capital to leverage Rotarians' time and involvement into much more meaningful programs than the dollar amounts suggest, and I find the entire process and the anticipated results to be both extremely exciting, bringing even more substance to the idea that ROTARY SHARES."

Bet You Thought PolioPlus Was Over!

So did I! That is until DG Liz Cullen asked me to Chair the District's PolioPlus Program. Those of us who have been in Rotary for a while know that RI's goal was to eradicate polio from the face of the earth by our 100th anniversary in 2005. Back in 1985 when this program began, along with our Partners, UNICEF, WHO, and CDC, twenty years seemed like a reasonable goal. Well, we almost made it. By 2005, polio was a disease of the past for 99% of the world. Unanticipated events such as conflicts and politics have slowed things down a bit, but we are back on track and moving forward on the final push. There are only four countries where the virus remains endemic – Nigeria, India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan.

PolioPlus desperately needs your help to finish this most ambitious project in Rotary's history. We need you to open your wallets as both individuals and as Clubs; we need you to useyour legs and participate in an NID (National Immunization Day); and we need you to use your voice and spread the word.

As Immediate Past President Bill Boyd said, "Put simply, the job is not finished, and Rotary keeps its promises. We promised the children of the world that they would not have to face the threat of that dreaded disease. If we are to fulfill this promise, we need to stay focused until there is no more wild poliovirus."

The Local Paper Won't Print Anything About Our Club (and other urban legends)

Common wisdom in the Damariscotta-Newcastle Rotary Club was that the local Lincoln County News wouldn't run anything on Rotary. The club meets Tuesday breakfast, and the weekly editorial deadline is Tuesday noon. That tight deadline was really hard to meet, but even when club members busted a gut to do so, the paper invariably failed to run their article.

That was the situation when Gary Speers became president and de facto PR chair in 2006. Gary responded by doing something bizarre: He called up the editor directly, and asked what the problem was.

Simple question, simple answer: It turns out that, because the editor didn't often receive articles from the Rotary club, she didn't leave space for them. When they did show up, the paper was invariably full, and the material was usually out-of-date by the following week. Hence the cutting-room floor.

Simple answers usually result in even simpler solutions: Gary cut a deal. Gary would guarantee an article written and submitted every week by the Tuesday deadline, and the editor would do her utmost to make sure it ran in the paper.

One year later, the Damariscotta-Newcastle club has a scrapbook full of articles and photos that have run weekly in the Lincoln County News, and general recognition of the club and its activities has never been greater in the community.

There's a moral to this story. If you feel your local paper or media outlet is ignoring you, remember Gary: Pick up the phone, get to the bottom of the problem and work out a solution.

Answer: The annual Miles Memorial Hospital League Rummage sale in Damariscotta, Maine, the site where Damariscotta-Newcastle Rotarians proved once again that "Rotary Shares".

Over the three and a half days of actual sales the event billed as the largest Rummage Sale in New England raised a record \$128,000 for equipment for our local Hospital.
