Spark Community Action with a District Simplified Grant

District 7780 clubs make big things happen with District Simplified Grants.

Consider Kennebunk and Kennebunk Portside. The two clubs got together to help the local school district fund the emergency communications equipment it needed. In addition to applying jointly for a District

fund the emergency communications equipment it needed. In addition to applying jointly for a District Simplified Grant (DSG), the clubs also cohosted a fundraising dance and a VIP opening. Somehow, even though it hadn't been budgeted, after all that community activity the school district stepped up with the remaining money to support what had grown into an \$8,654 project!

Then there's the Rumford Club, which proves that all you have to do is ask. Rumford's DSG grant money was matched and more by Dead River and Brookfield Power Company. Operation Heat Saver, which the club began with the aggressive goal of helping 60 local families get through the winter, is morphing into a

multi-year, all-community project to winterize homes of elders and other needful neighbors. Way to go, Rumford!

A DSG (combined with sweat equity) made it possible for Saco Bay to construct a stairway along its community River Walk last fall. Similarly, a DSG was part of Wells' fundraising for its new Rotary Pavilion. And 12 other clubs are currently finishing up their community projects paid for – or partially paid for – with 2008-09 District Simplified Grant funding.

So how can your club take advantage of this Rotary Foundation program? It's easy! Start your thinking now! Check the Foundation page on the District website – updated information and the 2009-10 application will soon be available. Attend the DSG breakout at the District Assembly. And remember: The deadline for applications will be July 31.

District Governor Elect Jeff Pelkey: Thoughts from the Membership Conference of RI President D.K. Lee

I recently spent the weekend in Greenbelt Maryland, jut outside of our Nation's capital with several other leaders from our District at RI President DK Lee's Membership Conference.

It proved to be a wonderful experience that I know was equally as well received by the others in attendance. President DK shared some of his continued hopes that at the end of the 2008-2009 Rotary year our organization will have grown to 1.3 million members worldwide. Considering that our membership has held steady at 1.2 million for many years, this could be a big feat.

As a group we examined many opportunities to share with our Districts and Clubs. The most challenging aspect of the entire event for me is that many of these ideas are not new. Our population has increased from 90 million people in 1905 to a staggering 306 million people in 2008. So it is clear that opportunity and people are not the problem. We continue to have multitudes of people to invite in and keep as members, but we are not.

So why? Well it would seem that this organization is one of the best-kept secrets in the world! Our members, for whatever reason, are not sharing the opportunity to serve with others, at least not here in North America. We see that in other parts of the world Rotary is growing in leaps and bounds, and yet here in North America we are declining.

So what do we do? Again so many good answers as it would seem, however many of these same answers have been bounced back and forth for years and it would not appear they are working!

If we have the people to bring in and our mission is arguably the best in the world, then maybe, just maybe, we as clubs and District leaders need to look at our club structure and how our club appears to others.

Think for just a minute, are our clubs open and inviting to others? Do we make guests and perspective members feel welcome when they walk in the door? Are we attractive to younger families? I would suspect that each of us would answer yes to these and many of the other questions that could be

However the truth of the matter is, if yes were true for all of us, our membership would really be taking off and it's not.

My hope for this year is that each club will really evaluate many of the previous questions, not just internally, but involve perspective members, reach out to former members (I know this is hard, but they left for a reason), and find out what it will take. Look at the hard questions and decide if we can meet the challenges of tomorrow, if we do not make changes today.

Know that Governor Brad, myself, and all the other present, future, and past District leaders, are here to help; just reach out.

Description of South African trip in Berri's words:

"There are few vehicles on the roads in Greytown, South Africa. Women carry wood and children haul water. There is silence and beauty that keeps you in the moment, but there is no escape from the hard reality of life in the third world. I visit St. Mary's Hospital every time I return to South Africa. In the palliative care ward, I take photographs of loved ones and give them copies as son as I'm able to get them printed. For many, it is the only photograph they will ever have to pass on to their families.

The women of Jabulani welcome me into their lives and if I have never been gone. I work in their sewing rooms and bake bread with them to spend time in their presence. They are sisters in another world. Our language is in our eyes. Their strength and gracefulness humble me everyday since I met them."

Kennebunk Portside Rotary partnered with Play Pumps of South Africa to bring water to three schools in Greytown. This was made possible with a matching grant from Rotary International. The students were so excited the day the bore holes were dug, they had to call school off for the rest of the day. These pumps will serve over 2000 children and their families. The reliability of clean water is not only a huge health benefit, but allows girls to go to school, rather than fetch water all day. It is incredible to think that such a contribution could so dramatically change the way of life for so many people.

Portside Rotary contributed in the water pump project in South Africa with contributions from our local club in spearheading this global project through Rotary International and contributions from Brunswick Coastal – a great accomplishment for Portside Rotary and huge humanitarian effort to support such a serious health concern in our world. Thank you Rotary!!
