

All this activity will take place the end of February, timed to coincide with Rotary's Polio Awareness Week and Rotary International president Ray Klinginsmith's visit to our District for World Peace and Understanding Day on February 22.

#### Polio Plus Giving Jumps with Special Incentive

In late October, Rotary promoted individual giving to Polio Plus with a two-for-one deal on Paul Harris Fellow recognition points. The results surpassed expectations: Although the data are not yet final, we know that:

- Polio contributions totaling over US\$2.8 million were received on-line in one week.
- At least 1,600 Rotarians registered on the Member Access Portal for the first time.
- Rotarians in more than 60 countries contributed on-line.
- The average gift was over \$300.

## **Rotary Lights the World To Raise Awareness of Polio**

What do the Pyramids, Houses of Parliament and Sydney's Opera House have in common? They are all landmarks that have been lit with the "End Polio Now" logo to help spread the word about what Rotary is doing to eliminate this disease.

And now the Ferry Building in San Francisco can be added to the list.

In recognition of World Polio Day, Bay Area Rotarians came together on Sunday, Oct. 24, to mark Rotary's 25-year fight to eradicate this crippling childhood disease. Events culminated in dramatic fashion at dusk, when the exterior of the San Francisco Ferry Building was illuminated with Rotary's pledge to "End Polio Now."

Fast Facts

Rotary has raised more than \$900 million, and is currently nearing its goal of raising an additional \$200 million to match a \$355 million challenge grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Since 1985, Rotary has immunized more than 2 billion children and reduced the



This year, significant progress has been made against polio in the remaining four polio-endemic countries, particularly in Nigeria and India. Nigeria, until recently the global epicenter of polio, has reported only eight cases in 2010, compared with nearly 400 at this point last year. India has also seen major progress, with an 80-percent reduction in polio cases since last year.

"We have come a long way," said Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar, chair of The Rotary Foundation. "We have reduced the number of polio cases by over 99 percent. But we can't let up now. The remaining one percent is proving to be the most challenging, since the poliovirus persists in the most intractable parts of the world. We have the tools to eradicate this devastating disease. It's up to us to make sure we have the resources needed to reach every child." amount of polio cases by 99 percent.

Rotary has reduced the incidence of polio cases from 350,000 in 1988 to less than 1,700 in 2009.

Nigeria has experienced tremendous progress against polio this year with only eight cases compared to 379 at this point last year.



## **Can We Really Succeed In Eliminating Polio?**

One of the most-asked questions I received at the Foundation seminar held recently at **Migis Lodge was, "Are we really going to succeed in eradicating polio?" The insiders are** quite convinced we will succeed, not just because we are too close to the finish line to stop now, but for very sound technical reasons: we have the product (vaccine), strategy, commitment, and personnel to complete the job. We are closing in on the money, if Rotary can meet the Gates Challenge and our governmental partners contribute as they say they will and have been doing.

There are many currently ongoing research and program initiatives that, taken together, provide the basis for the insiders' confidence. These are regularly described in a quarterly publication of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative called "The Polio Pipeline." If



you want to subscribe, send an email to polioresearch@who.int. I excerpt below from one article in the latest issue.

As part of the Polio Eradication Strategic Plan 2010-2012, the research agenda has been accelerated to develop and evaluate new tools and approaches that facilitate a swifter, more thorough outbreak response and limit renewed international spread of polio. For example, a game-changing new

bivalent oral polio vaccine was developed in record time; a new Short Interval Addi-

tional Dose (SIAD) strategy was introduced in conflict-affected and outbreak settings; social research was conducted to tailor social mobilization strategies in India, Nigeria and Pakistan; clinical trials were held to more clearly assess vaccine efficacy in multiple settings; mathematical modeling was employed to more clearly highlight areas at particular risk of outbreaks; new methods to monitor Supplemental Immunization Activities



were pioneered to help guide mid-course corrections; new strategies were examined to boost the efficacy of the vaccine; and, finally, supplemental surveillance strategies – including expanding environmental surveillance to key urban reservoir areas – were explored to ensure maximally rapid response to outbreaks.

We are also closing in on the money to support all this work: By the end of September, Rotary had raised \$147 million toward its goal of \$200 million to meet the Gates Challenge. Remember, our District's 2010-2011 goal includes \$2000 from each club.

There are many thousands of highly qualified, experienced and committed people working full time to meet our goal of certified global polio eradication by 2015. We Rotarians should be proud to be part of the team.



## **Rotary Needs YOU to Help Create Our District's Future**

One of our responsibilities as Rotarians is to get involved in leadership positions within our clubs and the District. As many of you know, I am a firm believer that every job in Rotary should have someone in training for that job. Your experience as a leader within your club — perhaps as a committee chair, club officer or even club president — re-



quires a special commitment to the ideals and values of Rotary service.

It's time to take your club leadership as President to another level. Perhaps you've thought about it, undertaken the pleas of a past or current District Governor to become an Assistant Governor or served on a District Committee – all truly admirable roles of service beyond the club. Well, this is the call to become a true leader within the District and our Rotary world – it is time to consider becoming a District Governor!

Annually, all 530 Districts within our Rotary world solicit candidates for consideration as District Governor. Qualified candidates will be selected in the coming months to serve in Rotary year 2013-14, and to be considered, you will need the following:

- A written club resolution indicating that you are a past president and a current member in "good standing" of your Rotary club, signed by the current President and Club Secretary;
- A commitment to the ideals of Rotary service, perhaps further assuming a demonstrated leadership role at the club or district level;
- A willingness to experience Rotary in a way others seldom see ready to enjoy the experience of your lifetime!

To be considered, your written Club Resolution along with a resume or curriculum vitae should be sent to District Governor Ann Lee no later than January 15, 2011. It is the responsibility of the District Governor to verify that the candidate is qualified as described above and then forward the information on all candidates to the District Nominating Committee for interview.

Annually, the Nominating Committee also selects a qualified past president to serve a three-year term on the District Finance Committee, rotating annually from our three Rotary Divisions (see sidebar). This year the expiring term is from Division B, so clubs in that Division are urged to place the name of a past president in nomination to be considered by the Nominating Committee.

Our District is blessed with many, many qualified candidates for both District Governor and the Finance Committee. Interested Rotarians are encouraged to explore the resources available via the rotary.org website on established policies concerning **"Rotary Elections" and "Guidelines for District Elections" containing guidelines for** elections. As Chair of the District Nominating Committee, I stand ready to welcome successfully endorsed candidates willing to enhance our leadership in future years. Should anyone have any questions, please get in touch with me.

## The Fature is Yours

Participants in the Rotary Leadership Institute know that leadership requires knowledge about the many facets of our great Rotary world and skills to carry our efforts forward. Clubs embracing the Club Leadership Plan know that everyone in Rotary should have a role in structuring their club's future. And our new "Club Visioning" process seeks to carve out a participatory role for everyone within a club.

All of which suggests that District leadership starts with YOU! And even if you are not ready — yet — to run for District Governor, it may be appropriate to hone the skills you will need when that time comes. That probably includes volunteering for a position at the District level, getting involved in different aspects of Rotary, and making sure that you have the Rotary experiences you will need for successful District leadership!

## **Rotarians Unite to Assist AIDS Orphans in Africa**

Do you have a specific interest that you would like to serve through Rotary? Want to find other Rotarians who share your passion? Than a Rotary Action Group may be for you! I find the work of the Rotarians for Fighting AIDS, Inc. (RFFA) very impressive. Here's what they do:

RFFA was founded by Marion Bunch, a Rotarian from Atlanta, GA. Marion brought a personal perspective to the battle against AIDS when she lost her son, Jerry, to the disease. Her action began with an AIDS education project in 1997. Gaining a reputation as a passionate speaker on the subject of HIV/AIDS throughout the world of Rotary, Marion was invited to Africa in 2001 to learn more about AIDS problems. In 2002, Past RI President Bhichai Rattakul heard her speak and requested assistance

## for a plan to "help the victims of AIDS, especially children."

Responding, Marion formed a public/ private partnership called ANCHOR (Africa Network for Children Orphaned and at Risk) which provides care and support for thousands of orphans and vulnerable children in six African nations. Care-





givers are found for the children and they are connected to medical and legal services.

RFFA also pulls together Matching Grants and mobilizes Rotary

Clubs to get involved. This has resulted in \$250,000 donated to pay for school fees, uniforms, supplies, food, and work is ongoing. Through the ANCHOR partnership, 118,000 orphans and vulnerable children have been provided care and support.

The AIDS Action Group also promotes Orphan Rescue. For only \$450 your donation supports one at-risk child in an African community for an entire year. During that time, the children attend school, study, learn. The funds pay school fees, school uniform and shoes, school supplies, a mosquito net, some nutritional support, and other incidentals that are necessary to attend school. Without this support, these children would not be able to attend school or learn to read.

Rotarians For Fighting AIDS is filling a vital, necessary gap in the one of the primary needs for these orphan children.



## Kennebunk Portside Celebrates by the Numbers


Kennebunk Portside celebrated its 20th anniversary last month, and took the opportunity to reflect on all that it has accomplished over the years.

- Over the past decade the club has raised \$313,779, or almost one-third of \$1 million (not including in-kind donations) in general fundraising.
- Over the past seven years,
   \$57,989 has been invested in
   Community Service, \$56,566
   in International Service, and
   \$37816 in Vocational Service.



- Part of that is the \$24,195 that has gone toward scholarships and teacher grants.
- Thanks to the club's work, 1500 children in South Africa now have three wells, which account for an estimated 4.6 million drinks of water annually.
- The club is also responsible for recycling 223,423 bottles and cans over the past four years, and serving 1,393 meals over the past six years.
- And since its inception, club members have donated \$80,419 to the Rotary Foundation, and the club has named 50 Paul Harris Fellows!

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
