Redefining "Every Rotarian, Every Year"

The official definition of "Every Rotarian, Every Year" is the goal for every Rotarian to make a contribution of any amount to The Rotary Foundation every year. Certainly, we all share an obligation to do just that, at whatever level we are comfortable (or better yet: a trifle uncomfortable). And just as certainly, being a Rotary club member and *not* supporting the Foundation would be, well, like believing in beautiful gardens but never watering the lawn.

That's because The Rotary Foundation is the overarching funding mechanism for the humanitarian work that Rotarians do. It's because The Rotary Foundation is uniquely organized so that we – the donors – have incredible discretion over how the funds are spent. And it's because The Rotary Foundation is aces when it comes to fiscal soundness: Check out Charity Navigator, the leading independent rating organization for non-profits. You'll quickly discover that The Rotary Foundation earns high points in all metrics, earning it a tippy-top score of 68.57 out of a possible 70.

Even so, this District – typical of too many Rotary Districts -- counts fewer Rotarians who *give* to the Foundation each year than club members who do *not* give. Invite a few members of your club, perhaps some interactors, as well as a faculty member or two from your local high school and join us this coming Monday at Falmouth High School at our 5th annual districtwide competition. So if your president-elect is wearing a pin that reads, "*first class*," he or she truly is, and now you k

And it's not just our presidents-elect who are stepping up to the EREY challenge. All Rotarians who registered for our Frugal Feast in celebration of World Peace and Understanding Day this past February contributed a small amount to The Foundation and can now call themselves EREY Rotarians. In fact, throughout the District, clubs are taking EREY seriously and the results are being noticed: Sanford-Springvale and York have already achieved 100% participation in Foundation giving. Oxford Hills also made that mark, but then welcomed new members (a good reason to fall short on EREY!), and now have some more work to do to catch up. And running close behind, really close to EREY status but not quite there yet, are Bath, Breakwater-Daybreak, Freeport, and Fryeburg.

What about your club? Or maybe the question should be, what about you?

It's critical to recognize that Every Rotarian, Every Year is about more than a financial donation. It's about what it means to be a Rotarian. Every Rotarian, Every Year is what we do when we all pitch in to read a book to a child, or provide a meal to an elder or clean drinking water to a community half a world away. Every Rotarian, Every Year is what gives our movement of 1.2 million Rotarians the power to make history. Every Rotarian, Every Year is a way of life, a way to sum up what it is that we as Rotarians are and what it is we do. Every one of us. Every moment of the year.
