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



And clubs have been doing a lot more than just writing checks: This District has organized service trips that provide people-to-people support in the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Nigeria and India.

Our youth programs are setting the stage for even more peace-building in the generation to come. Three new Interact clubs in schools that haven't had them previously have been started this year by Brunswick Coastal, Damariscotta-Newcastle and Kittery, and these clubs join our two-dozen ongoing ones in helping to introduce our Interactors to the responsibilities – and the fun – of service above self during those impressionable teen years. Meanwhile, our Youth Exchange students – as well as all those who they touch – are discovering just how personal global relationships can be. At the Peace Forum in Berlin last winter I met a just-returned Youth Exchanger who said that she met peers from all over the world during her year in Australia. Now, she said, when she hears of a disaster in Sweden or Swaziland or Sebastopol, her immediate thought is how her friends who live there will have fared through the crisis. A generation of young people with such personal concern for their global neighbors will do much to heal the fabric of our broken world!

Yes, it's been a remarkable year. We started off last July 1 with a Changeover officiated by President Sakuji, and we are ending it with our District Conference keynoted by Rotary International vice president-elect Anne Matthews. But the most important components to a successful year are not the senior Rotary leaders we host, but YOU.

This District harbors so much talent. So much life-giving, peace-bringing talent. It's been an honor to serve as your District Governor, a blessing to have the opportunity to participate in the activities of your clubs, to learn more about your projects and fundraisers and to share your successes. It's been a joy to spotlight your talent and the extra-special Rotarians behind some of your projects at District events including the just-completed District Conference. Of course, no Rotarian does what we do for the reward; we do what we do because it's service we are passionate about and work that we believe needs to be done. But as volunteers, the only reward we receive is recognition. And the highest form of recognition is that which comes from one's peers.
