They will also meet and work with the inbound team of youth musicians from various tribes (shown in photo) who are part of the Youth Passionate Organization headquartered out of Kampala. The teens will visit our District later in the spring to participate in a Friends Forever conflict resolution program.

The Selection Committee received many applications from qualified applicants and thanks everyone who participated in the project, which is designed to be an expanded version of Group Study Exchange, for Rotarians and Rotary family members.
