It was a great honor - and a huge surprise - to learn that clubs and individual Rotarians named me the sponsor of El Calvario School in Guatemala. Most of you know that since 2007 I've worked to develop and implement a program to bring books and basic school supplies to rural schools in Guatemala. Most importantly, this program provided training in the process of literacy instruction for elementary teachers. These children and their teachers are near and dear to my heart. Being the *patrocinadora* is a very special honor for which I am so appreciative.

Many of you have asked about the school. El Calvario is one of two public primary schools in the small town of Xenejoc. It is about 90 minutes from Guatemala City - an agricultural area with the most magnificent views of several volcanos. Most of the families grow corn and beans, their primary food and income source. It is a large school: 550 children (grades 1-6) and



16 teachers. Children start first grade, but many drop out each year because they have not been successful, their parents can't afford to send them to school, or just don't see the value. This is changing. When I started at the school there were about 90 children in grades 5 and 6. This year, there are 140 students in those grades!

I've worked at El Calvario for three years and it is definitely a success story. The principal is active, involved, and enthusiastically supports the program and his teachers. Though there is little in the classrooms except old desks and a chalkboard, they are clean and neat. They plant flowers all around the school grounds and keep them watered and weeded. After each of our seminars, the principal calls a meeting so the teachers can explain what they've learned to the others. They try everything we ask them to do - and the results show. The kids love to read and every time we arrive at the school, they run out and ask "did you bring more books?"

Not all our schools (currently 46) have been this successful, but each are making gains: kids are learning to read and they want to read. And if they learn to read, they have access to all kinds of information so they can make their own, informed decisions. Long term, children will grow up to be able to make a living and care for their family.

I thank you from the bottom of my heart for this honor - and for what your support will mean for these children, their education, and their future. Rotarians do change lives - through your generosity you will change the lives of these teachers, children and their community. And for that, I am grateful.
