Rotarians have used community grants to begin community gardens, build walking paths, start new literacy projects, and help support new food bank projects. Investigations into international projects to begin a sustainable agriculture project in Guatemala, provide books in Nigeria, and help clean water for an orphanage in Cambodia received Springboard Grants. What new project could one of these grants help your club begin? Application forms and grant criteria are posted on the district website. Applications are due by June 1 for funds available in the 2014-15 Rotary year. A panel of club Foundation Chairs screen the applications and recommend projects for funding to our District Foundation Committee. These grants are possible as a direct result of our support of The Rotary Foundation. How can the Foundation help your club change lives?
