Dynamic Management Tool

- Defines a shared commitment
- Provides long-term direction
- Creates a framework to establish goals and objectives
- Optimizes use of resources

The Visioning Process

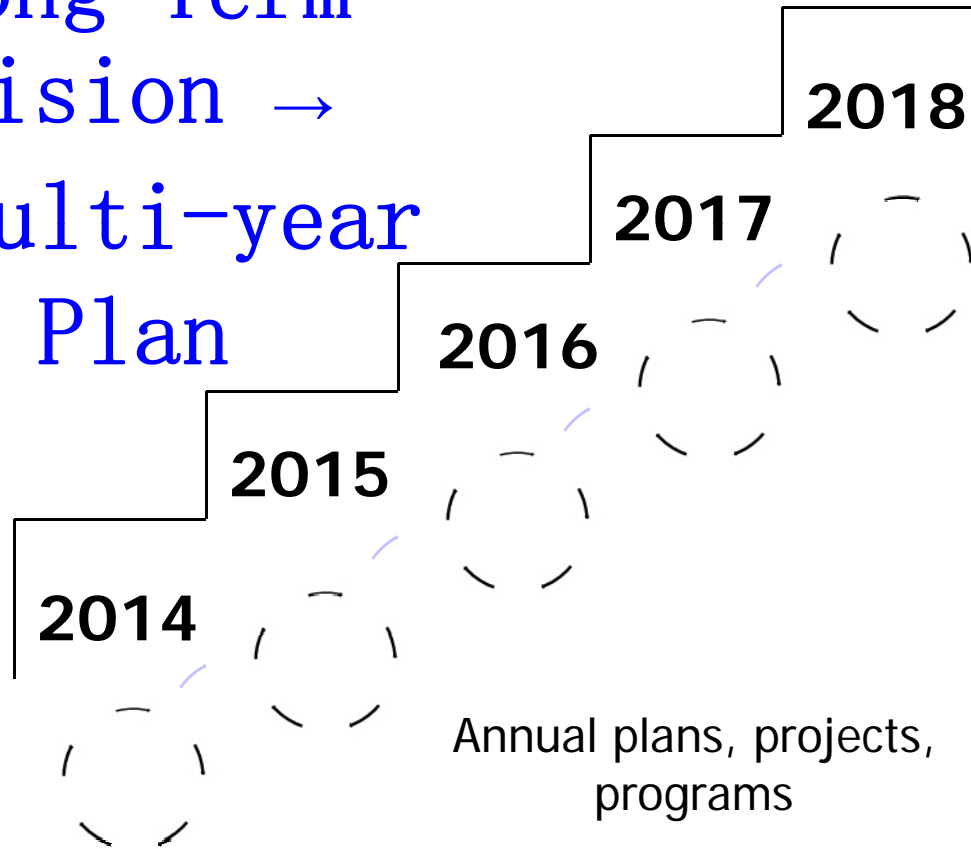
- Be bold and think outside the box.
