Rotary International President Ian H.S. Riseley and his wife, Juliet Riseley (a past district governor), will be joining us on Friday, May 4 as we kickoff our 2018 Rotary Summit. It is a special occasion when Rotarians from New England and Quebec have an opportunity to hear RI's president speak live. His charm, wit, and incredible ability to engage the audience will be a highlight of the weekend.

Riseley will share his vision for Rotary, his goals for this Rotary year, and how we, as Rotarians, and friends of Rotarians, can increase the positive impact we have in the world.

Riseley emphasizes that meaningful partnerships with corporations and other organizations are crucial to Rotary's future. "We have the programs and personnel and others have available resources," he says. "Doing good in the world is everyone's goal. We must learn from the experience of the polio-eradication program to maximize our public-awareness exposure for future partnerships."

Riseley is a chartered accountant and principal of Ian Riseley and Co., a firm he established in 1976. Prior to starting his own firm, he worked in the audit and management consulting divisions of large accounting firms and corporations. His firm specializes in income-tax and management advice for individuals and small businesses. He has a master's degree in taxation law and graduate diplomas in accounting and income tax.

Riseley has been a member of the boards of both a private and a public school, a member of the Community Advisory Group for the City of Sandringham, and involved in Sea Scouts and sporting groups, as well as honorary auditor or adviser for a number of charitable organizations. His honors include the AusAID Peacebuilder Award from the Australian government in recognition of his work in East Timor, the Medal of the Order of Australia for services to the Australian community, the Distinguished Service Award and the Regional Service Award for a Polio-Free World from The Rotary Foundation.

A Rotarian since 1978, Riseley has served as treasurer, director, Foundation trustee, and member and chair of numerous RI and Foundation committees. He and Juliet are Major Donors and Bequest Society members of The Rotary Foundation. They live on seven hectares at Moorooduc, where they practice their personal philosophy of sustainable and organic living. They have two children and four grandchildren.

Travis Roy Foundation

Travis Roy was a freshman at Boston University when his life was changed forever. He could have chosen to feel sorry for himself, not talking to anyone or doing anything - just sitting there, hopeless. However, he chose to persevere and to make a difference.

Through his talk, Travis tells his story in his own words. He tells people that a positive attitude and setting goals for yourself can make a difference - and inspires everyone to do it. No matter what happens in your life, you can be an inspiration to others!

The topic of Travis' presentation revolves around the following theme: There are times in our life when we choose our challenges, and other times when the challenges simply choose us. It is what we do in the face of those challenges that defines who we are, and more importantly, who we can and will become.

By sharing his story and lifelong dream of becoming a Division I college athlete, Travis conveys firsthand the determination and emotional high of overcoming a self-imposed challenge. He will share the experience of having his dream ripped away, and the reevaluation of his goals to face the challenge that ultimately chose him.

Travis' presentation will share his thoughts on the following:

- Who you are at the core is really what helps you through life's challenges, chosen or not
- Having a passion will drive you to do great things, when you set the necessary goals
- Taking pride in everything you do makes most anything possible
- Having a positive attitude will bring you through some of the most difficult days of your life

Whether you are dealing with today's financial struggles, a health issue, or a personal problem, Travis will help you realize that regardless of our challenges, we still maintain the ability to laugh, cry, and, most importantly, enjoy the people around us, while achieving our highest goals.

Write2Read Project

Dubbed the "original Champion sparkplug" by His Honour, Steven L. Point, the 28th Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia, Shirley-Pat Chamberlain (nèe Gale) is an energetic passionate literacy advocate with infectious good cheer. She is committed to service above self in the pursuit of Aristotelian real good.

Shirley-Pat is driven by an insatiable curiosity and passion for changing the world around her. She has been committed to social action literacy initiatives and community development innovation in rural and remote British Columbia in both indigenous and non-indigenous communities.

Shirley-Pat's first experience with Rotary was at the age of 15 through a Four-Way Test essay competition. She reconnected with Rotary through her mom, who is also a Rotarian, in 2008. Her Rotary story is one of truth telling, discovery, mentorship and adventure.

It has led Shirley-Pat to use the Rotary International Project model in her own backyard to work and partner with indigenous people and communities through the Write2Read project. This has led to two amazing honours: she been formally adopted by Tl'esqox, the Toosey Indian Band; and has received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Award in 2012 for outstanding volunteerism.

Shirley-Pat will share her Rotary story in the hope that it will encourage others to join, show up and do good with likeminded people - to become Rotarians.

Shirley-Pat has an undergraduate degree in history and classical languages and literature and masters of education in leadership studies. She is currently a doctoral candidate at the University of Edinburgh's Centre for Canadian Studies, exploring the role of civil society organizations in indigenous social citizenship.





Razia Jan 2018 Rotary Summit at Mount Washington | May 4 - 6



Razia's Ray of Hope Foundation

Razia's Ray of Hope Foundation would not exist without the spirit, vision, and tireless efforts of its founder and president, Razia Jan.

Razia has worked for many years to forge connections between Afghans and Americans. Her humanitarian efforts are honored in American First Lady Laura Bush's 2016 book We Are Afghan Women.

Born in Afghanistan, Razia moved in 1970 to the United States. The proprietor of a small tailoring business in Duxbury, Massachusetts, for 20 years she served as president of the town's Rotary club. In the aftermath of September 11, Razia rallied her adopted New England community to send more than 400 homemade blankets to rescue workers at Ground Zero.

Razia's efforts expanded to include sending care packages to U.S. troops in Afghanistan. Through her involvement in the military's Operation Shoe Fly, she coordinated the delivery of more than 30,000 pairs of shoes to needy Afghan children. Her handmade quilts commemorating September 11 have been exhibited at Madison Square Garden, the chapel at the Pentagon, and at fire stations in New York and Massachusetts.

Razia has received many awards for her humanitarian work, including a 2012 CNN Top 10 Hero award, the 2007 Woman of Excellence award from Germaine Lawrence Inc., multiple Rotary Club International Peace Awards, and certificates of appreciation from the Army Corps of Engineers and the American Legion. She has spoken on women and children's issues at venues across the United States as well as in Europe and Afghanistan. In 2014, Razia was named Social Innovator by the Lewis Institute at Babson College and in 2015 she was awarded a Woman of Action award from Rotary International at the United Nations in New York City. In 2016, she was honored with Rotary International's Service Above Self Award.

Razia has served as a member of the Interfaith Council, the No Place for Hate Committee, and Jordan Hospital's board of directors.

Today, in order to continue her humanitarian work, school administration, fundraising efforts, and spending time with family, Razia travels between Afghanistan and the United States.

Watch What Tomorrow Brings, the award-winning documentary from Principle Pictures that tells the story of Razia Jan and the Zabuli Education Center — where students and teachers are making possible what was once unthinkable.



Teamwork made this happen thank you District 7850!



James Douglas Former Governor of Vermont



James H. Douglas served the people of Vermont as governor for more than 35 years. He was elected to the Vermont House of Representatives after graduating in 1972 from Middlebury College. He became assistant majority leader in his second term, and majority Leader in his third term at the age of 25. He was executive assistant to Governor Richard Snelling in 1979 and 1980.

Jim was elected as Vermont's Secretary of State in 1980, a post he held for 12 years. He was elected state treasurer in 1994, serving the people of Vermont in that role for eight years. Under his leadership Vermont's, bond rating came to be the best in New England - and one of the highest in the nation.

He successfully sought the office of governor in 2002, and was re-elected in 2004, 2006 and 2008. During his tenure, he focused on strengthening the state's economy, reducing the cost of living in Vermont, and protecting the state's natural environment.

He advanced groundbreaking health reforms that have made Vermont a model among the states in health care. And, he worked to strengthen the relationship between Vermont and Quebec and the other Canadian provinces.

While serving as governor, Jim was chosen for leadership positions by his colleagues. He served as president of the Council of State Governments, twice as chairman of the New England Governors' Conference, and chairman of the Coalition of Northeastern Governors, and chairman of the National Governors Association. In February 2010, President Barack Obama appointed him cochair of the Council of Governors.

Jim Douglas is now an Executive in Residence at Middlebury College. He serves on the boards of several local companies, and on the Governors' Advisory Council of the Bipartisan Policy Center in Washington, DC. He continues as town moderator for Middlebury, a post he has held for 30 years. He and his wife, Dorothy Douglas, have two sons and two grandsons.

Jane Swift Former Governor of Massachusetts



Jane M. Swift was born in North Adams, Massachusetts. She received her bachelor's degree in American Studies from Trinity College in 1987.

Jane's career as an elected official began in 1991 at age 25, when she was the youngest woman ever elected to the Massachusetts State Senate. She quickly became the youngest woman in senate

history to hold a leadership position, rising to assistant minority leader.

Governor Paul Cellucci appointed her as director of the state Office of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulation in 1997. She became governor on April 10, 2001, when Governor Cellucci resigned to become the U.S. Ambassador to Canada.

Elected lieutenant governor in 1998, Jane worked as "co-governor" with Cellucci to stimulate economic growth, impose fiscal discipline, improve public education, and enhance the quality of life for working families. She led the Cellucci-Swift administration's effort to improve the state's public education system through strong accountability and high standards for schools, teachers, and students.

As lieutenant governor, Jane instituted meaningful remediation programs for struggling students and helped parents access more information regarding their children's schools. She worked hard to provide tax relief to Massachusetts families, reducing the state income tax through a ballot initiative overwhelmingly approved by voters. In one of Jane's first official acts as governor, she signed the "No-New-Taxes Pledge," and filed legislation to expand the state's earned income tax credit to help low-income families keep more of their hard-earned paychecks. She championed solutions that provide a guaranteed college education for foster children and enable state employees to better balance the demands of work and family.



Arie Voorman Gates Foundation



Arie Voorman is a Program Officer at the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, where he works with mathematical modeling groups in the fight against polio. Much of his work has focused on combining diverse data sources to predict poliovirus outbreaks, and to develop and evaluate strategies to mitigate those risks. He also works on improving the ability to detect polio, particularly

through testing sewage networks for poliovirus, so that outbreaks can be detected and stopped early. Arie is based in Seattle, but has traveled widely in support of the polio program, to Pakistan, Nigeria, Cameroon, and elsewhere. Before starting work at the Gates Foundation in 2014, he earned his PhD in Biostatistics at the University of Washington, developing machine learning methods to understand how genetic sequences influence the risk of disease.

We are "This Close" to eradicating polio from the face of the earth. In 1985 Rotary International launched PolioPlus, the first and largest internationally coordinated private-sector support of a public health initiative.

For the past 10 years, Rotary and the Gates Foundation have partnered together to End Polio. Since 2013, the Gates Foundation has matched every \$1 Rotary commits to polio eradication 2-to-1.



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
