#### From the Governor's Desk

An ounce of prevention...

You've heard the saying: An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure! Well, Rotary's been on the forefront of prevention for many decades now, and the leadership at Rotary International and District 7190 are rightfully focusing on prevention in many ways, both big and small.

December is Disease Prevention and Treatment month on the Rotary Calendar. Of course, we all know about Rotary's commitment to end Polio forever, and this month we'll have Rotarians up in Glens Falls to enjoy a hockey game with the Adirondack Thunder on December 9th to raise both awareness of and funds for Polio Plus. Have you ever wondered what the Plus is in Polio Plus? Well, the framers of the polio effort also included other treatable diseases in the Plus category, like diphtheria, whooping cough, measles, and several other diseases that are eminently vaccine-preventable. And, while the emphasis has been squarely on polio, there are throughout the world many large-scale Rotary sponsored efforts to prevent these other diseases.

Even locally we are working on numerous projects to prevent disease right in our own backyard. Several clubs offer information and service projects aimed at Lyme Disease, and one club has taken over the local DARE program in collaboration with the Sheriff's Department. No less important are the many clubs which participate in hunger related programs, like weekend backpack efforts, so that kids who are better fed can be healthier, concentrate harder and miss less school.

I also know that several clubs are starting to talk seriously about tackling opioid abuse, and that is a big, big complex topic. If your club's interested in this issue, please reach back to me; I'd like to connect the interested clubs up for a deeper conversation.

All of this great work notwithstanding, prevention takes on many forms. Certainly, disease treatment and prevention are critical topics, but there are several versions of prevention which are important also. How about these?

Let's prevent Rotarians from drifting away from our clubs. Getting a new Rotarian to join a club follows the

sales process: it takes about ten good prospects to bring in one new member. In comparison about 25% of new Rotarians leave a club within a year for reasons which mostly can be controlled. Why do Rotarians drift away? The biggest reason is that they are not engaged meaningfully in the life of the club, and this is something which we definitely can control.

Let's prevent irrelevance. Rotarians do incredible work, and it is all good. But this does not mean that all of the work we do is perceived as relevant. Has your club leadership recently had a meaningful conversation about the relevance of the club's service initiatives? How does the community benefit? Have community leaders been asked to identify what the community actually needs the club to be doing? This effort alone can effectively prevent the perception that Rotary is no longer relevant.

Let's prevent resistance to change. Rotary is starting to change. Leadership at the top of Rotary International has recently taken steps to accelerate change. Our clubs are beginning to adopt change, and that starts with taking some time to think through what's important to the culture of the club. Can those important things be made more relevant? More engaging? Can "how" we do "what" we do be improved for the good? By the way, most clubs which are making significant changes are reporting good results in membership and vibrancy.

District 7190 is on the right track. We continue to be more gender balanced (34.5% now, still with a ways to go). We are gaining in racial and ethnic diversity, though this needs much work and careful thought. And, we are getting very busy being more innovative, dynamic, and responsive. Dynamic innovation makes progress in the two other categories easier. As we become more responsive to our communities our clubs' racial and ethnic composition should look more like the communities we serve. As we are more innovative and dynamic we increase the ability to attract <u>and</u> retain the kinds of members we want, who share the vision and ideals of Rotary.

Maybe the phrase should be: an ounce of prevention YIELDS a pound of cure. Let's cure all of our ills, real and perceived. Thank you for the incredible work you do.

## How to Donate Stock to the Rotary Foundation

With the stock market regularly breaking records at the closing bell, many of your investments are likely worth more today than what you originally paid for them.

Time to sell? If you do, you might have to pay capital gains taxes. There's a better option that provides you with valuable tax incentives as well as the satisfaction of supporting a cause close to your heart: Give your stock to The Rotary Foundation.

When you give the Foundation appreciated securities that you've owned for more than one year, you will receive two tax benefits:

- You are entitled to a federal income tax deduction based on the current fair market value of the securities, regardless of their lower original cost.
- You will be exempt from paying capital gains taxes on any increase in value—taxes you would pay if you sold the stock.

#### Reap the Rewards

To realize full tax benefits from your gift, keep the following IRS guidelines in mind:

- Donate long-term appreciated property. For short-term assets (owned one year or less), only the amount you originally paid is deductible.
- Watch the ceiling. The gift deduction for longterm capital gain property is limited to 30 percent of your adjusted gross income in the year of your gift, but the excess is deductible over the next five years.

#### The Passing of a Rotary Giant-George Frost

On Monday, October 30, 2017, District 7190 and the Rotary world lost a giant. George Frost was the personification of "Service Above Self." It's true all clubs have Rotarians who are giants. Their contributions and sacrifices exemplify our Rotary ideals. The loss of any giant is always a sad occasion. However, George Frost was unique. His passing leaves a gap that will be impossible to fill. District 7190, his community and the world was transformed by his presence and will be forever altered by his absence.

He joined our organization at the young age of 28 in February, 1956. Three years later he became president of the Rotary Club of South Glens Falls. For over 55 years he maintained perfect attendance until physical infirmities prevented the continuation of this magnificent record. In 1970, he took on the responsibilities of being District Governor for District 719, as it was known then. At age 42, he was the youngest Governor ever to lead the district and one of the youngest governor's in the Rotary world at that time.

Since then, George's advice, guidance and steady hand have been instrumental in making him one of the most respected and influential contributors to the progress and growth of the district. These actions alone would be remarkable. Yet George's commitment to service did not end there. His participation at the Zone, Foundation and Rotary International level brought him recognition and honors including the Service Above Self Award, (Rotary International's highest acknowledgement), the Distinguished Service Award, the Citation for Meritorious Service, along with becoming a Major Donor to the Rotary International Foundation. In 2011, he was appointed as the Rotary International Presidential Representative to District 7850 speaking on behalf of R.I. President Ray Klinginsmith. There are very few areas of Rotary, where George Frost did not have an impact. His love of Rotary touched the student exchange program, the GSE teams, Rotary Leadership Institute, membership development, Foundation work, Ambassadorial exchanges, polio eradication, hundreds and hundreds of committee, PETS, club, district assemblies, zone and other vital meetings, meals and conferences. The list is endless. If it had to do with Rotary, George was there willing to help.

To say Rotary was important to George is an understatement. But it wasn't his only passion. As a lifelong Boy Scout, George was 11 years old when he began his journey in scouting. Only the lack of a Lifesaving Merit Badge prevented him from becoming an Eagle Scout. This goal eluded him until 2013, when he was made an Honorary Eagle Scout. By then he could add the Eagle badge to his other tributes of the Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope and Distinguished Eagle, the Good Scout Award (2010), and the prestigious Cliff Dochterman Award presented by Rotary International which recognizes exemplary service to both Rotary and the Boy Scouts. George said, "Scouting, like Rotary, is a great vehicle for doing good and bringing about positive change." He added, "I think it's a great way to help kids become leaders; teach them respect for others, themselves, fellow scouts and the community. Just follow the scout code. Do that and you can't go wrong."

And then there was his service to the community. He graduated in 1950, with honors, from Northeastern University with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. He served two years in the U.S. Army

Signal Corp during the Korean War. In 1960 he became chairman and CEO of Rist-Frost Associates, consulting firm. He was a licensed engineer in several states and a retired member of the National Society of Professional Engineers. Over the 36 years he worked at Rist-Frost, George won numerous awards for innovative engineering designs including the American Consulting Engineers Council Community Service award. In 1996, he was appointed by Governor Pataki to the NYS Employment Relations Board, a position he held until 2006. George was also president of the South Glens Falls Central School District Board of Education, Director Emeritus of the Arrow Financial Corporation, chairman of the board for Glens Falls National Bank, past president of the Glens Falls Country Club. He received the J.Walter Juckett Community Service Award from the Adirondack Regional Chamber of Commerce, served as a trustee for the Glens Falls Hospital, receiving the NYS Trustee of the Year award in 1995. These are only a few of the recognitions too numerous to list.

In his spare time, he was a Lector and Eucharistic Minister at his church along with being a past Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus. And George always had time to play the game of golf. A sport he loved as much as his other activities.

But probably the best thing he ever did was marry Beatrice McDermott in 1952. The two of them recently celebrated their 65th anniversary. While Bea maintained an active career raising their family, she too, has contributed significantly to their overall success. Although small in physical stature, she stood at George's side, keeping tabs on him, encouraging him and making sure their lives were filled with love. There are many, many, Rotarians who have enjoyed spending time with George and Bea at the hundreds of social and family get-togethers. They truly are an unforgettable couple.

If the hyphen between the date of birth and the date of our death represents all we accomplish in life, George Frost spent his time making sure he left the world a better place. I once heard a description of a person as having the heart of a servant. I cannot think of a better way to remember George Frost, than as a person who lived his life as a gentle, caring Rotarian who put service to others before himself

"Charlie Grose (District Governor 1967-1968) ate, lived and slept Rotary. He attended any and all kinds of meetings everywhere he could. He kept himself involved well into his 90's. Anytime someone needed a volunteer, his hand always went up. I guess he probably was the biggest influence on me, to say raise your hand whenever you can." George Frost interview December 2003
