### From the Governor's Desk

### **November is Rotary Foundation Month**

Each year the world of Rotary can be tracked monthly by various themes. Each month is different, and November is Rotary Foundation month. And so, we hold our annual Foundation Dinner event in November, and this year the People of Action Foundation Dinner will be on November 16<sup>th</sup>. All are invited to attend!

I recently was able to hear Sushil Gupta speak about the Rotary Foundation. Sushil is a Rotary Foundation Trustee, and he spoke at some length about the future of the Foundation. He noted that an endowment of \$1 billion has been achieved, so that the foundation will be forever stable going into the future. He spoke about the incredible generosity of Rotarians, including an amazing \$16 million dollars that was donated last year by the Districts (including ours) in Zones 28 and 29.

But Sushil spent the most time talking about what *can* happen <u>after</u> Polio is eradicated. Rotarians have been in the Polio fight for more than 30 years, and we all need to be reminded that even when Polio is eradicated (after 3 years of no new cases) we will still need to engage comprehensive vaccination for another decade. Even so, the dialogue at the highest levels of RI is turning to how we can define and make plans for the next major Rotary and Rotary Foundation goal.

He referenced the 6 Areas of Focus, but his emphasis was on the goals. World peace. The end of disease. Clean water for everyone. Safety and health for every mother and child. Education. Prosperity.

Three decades ago the leaders of RI thought it would take only a few years to eradicate Polio, with this incredible new vaccine and the energy of Rotarians around the world. I doubt that anyone thinks that world peace or clean water for all can happen in just a few years. But it drives home the point:

There is no other organization in the world which can even lay claim to the privilege of dreaming that such things might be possible. None other than Rotary, which is about to do the near impossible – to eliminate a disease from the face of the earth forever.

And it is your support of the Rotary Foundation, through the annual fund-raising dinner, through your commitment to Polio, your contribution to annual giving, and your support of Rotary overall, which makes these dreams even possible to consider.

I encourage you to attend the People of Action Foundation Dinner on November 16. I urge you to make room in your charitable giving for a donation to the Rotary Foundation this year. I ask you to step up your current commitment to Rotary by increasing your annual gift.

Without you there would be no Foundation. Without the Foundation there could be no such dreams. Make a generous gift to make a generous difference.

Thank you for all you do for Rotary and the Rotary Foundation.

#### Is Polio Relevant?

I was on my own at the district meeting this Spring when I ran into a Rotarian from a neighboring club, and we got into a spirited discussion about the Millennials and asked the question "Is Polio Relevant?" I thought about it, and really besides the fact that my Uncle Marc had it and I had to get a shot, it was kind of an historical myth.

We had the distinct pleasure of listening to Dr. Martha Lepow, M.D., a professor of Pediatrics, Albany Medical



College & former Chief of Division of Infectious Diseases speak about polio and her role in developing the polio vaccine. The Southern Rensselaer County Rotary had put together a video "Club Making Polio History — A Pioneer's Story" (https://youtu.be/-

8902ksDXM4), which took polio from an abstract concept and made it a real disease with real children who were suffering through

powerful imagery. And I really think I saw a photo of my Uncle in the hospital.

So, I decided to ask my mom...

I am going to turn the narrative over to my mother (Rotary Club of College Station, TX) who was really just a baby while my Uncle Mark was going through his battle with the disease.



"My brother, Mark, contracted polio before I was a year old and he had just turned four. It took my Mother four hours by bus to visit Mark at Sunnyview Hospital in Schenectady, New York while neighbors watched me. He was there for about eleven months with part of the time spent in an iron lung to help him breathe

When Mark came home he had heavy encumbering braces on both legs. He received daily physical therapy to strengthen the paralyzed muscles and those muscles which had atrophied to aid him in relearning how to walk again. My Mother had to learn how to perform the daily therapy and diligently spent the entire morning every day performing the necessary physical therapy.

Daily Mom would hoist Mark up onto the dining room table and perform the therapy. The dividend was that Mark was ultimately able to walk with the aid of a heavy brace on his left leg and special shoes of different sizes. He walked with a very pronounced limp, because of the effects of the paralysis on his left leg. His right leg became very strong due to compensating for the loss of muscle strength on the left side.

Whenever Mark needed new shoes we had to visit the orthopedic Doctor and get the new specifications for a new brace. Then we went off to Grinders Shoes in Columbus, Ohio where Mark would be fitted with the two different size shoes and the brace would then be installed on the shoe according to the prescription. That would take hours. Then we would return for the fitting of the shoes and the brace and again. It took a great deal of time to get it just right.

The brace on Mark's left leg made Mark different from the other kids and the bus ride to school became a nightmare. Bullies had fun kicking Mark's brace and he would fall and have a very difficult time standing up. In all fairness, the bullies had no way of knowing all that Mark had endured to get to the point he was at, the hard work, the pain, the tears, the discouragement, but I knew.



At the age of five I was finally able to ride the bus and go to school with Mark. When I saw what was happening something inside me blew and I kicked the bullies in the shins just like they did to Mark. I was protecting my brother who was unable to defend himself. I got in trouble with the school authorities. Mom called to school and she had to calm me down. I

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was still angry at the bullies for kicking Mark's legs out from under him. At the age of five after seeing how much harder Mark had to work to walk again I could not understand the (Continued on next page.) lack of feeling and meanness of those bullies! Ultimately, I was not in trouble and the bullies never messed with me or my brother ever again.

During Mark's teen years he understandably did not want to wear the brace and did not, but upon high school graduation he needed surgery to help his left foot straighten out. It had atrophied. He had extensive orthopedic surgery and got the final cast off right before college.

One of his dreams was always to take ROTC in College. Unfortunately, he had not had physical therapy and was not able to participate in the program. This emotionally crushed him and seemed to have magnified all the issues with having a disability.

This emotionally crushed him and seemed to have magnified all the issues with having a disability. He did work productively for many years and then later in his life he was stricken with what was referred to as "post-polio syndrome." It was like the polio virus had returned. And after hearing Dr. Lepow's talk it apparently had returned. He needed to be revaccinated for the polio virus!



This point had never been stressed. Mark spent nearly the last year of his life on a ventilator in one of the two hospitals in Florida with the Mark contracted MRSA from the hospital. It went to his heart and that was the end of his life.

Polio is a terrible, debilitating disease that causes paralysis and life- long symptoms. All of this can now be prevented by the polios that have been developed. I have been a Rotarian for over 28 years and have always been a spokesperson for stamping put polio. Let's get this job done so children do not have to live with the after effects of paralysis for their entire lives! Help Rotary stamp out polio forever."

So, in answer to my own question "Is Polio Relevant?" ... Well it most certainly was to my family. I am proud to be part of the organization that created a world where polio is NOT so relevant to others. I cannot wait to see what we do next!!!

### Help Rotary Win the Fight Against Polio

## Here are the top 5 reasons to **END POLIO NOW!**

- 1. **The human cost**: If we choose to control polio rather than eradicate it, polio could rebound to 10 million cases in the next 40 years.
- 2. **Its achievable**: We have the tools to end polio and the means to reach all children. The new bivalent vaccine successfully target the two remaining strains of polio in one dose.
- 3. **It's a good investment**: An independent study published in the medical journal estimates that the \$9 billion global investment in a poliofree world will net an economic benefit of \$40 to \$50 billion over the next 20 years.
- 4. It strengthens the system: Our polio eradication efforts have established an active disease surveillance network in all countries that is being used for other health interventions such as measles vaccinations, deworming tablets, and mosquito bed nets.
- 5. **It sets the stage**: The ability to reach all children with the polio vaccine is proof of concept that we can succeed on our next major global health initiative.



### **Why History Matters**

"This will make history."

RI President Walter Head December, 1939

On December 8, 1939 three Rotary clubs were tied together by a relatively new invention referred to as "the sister of radio." That evening, Rotarians from Schenectady, Albany and Troy, New York gathered at their respective meeting places, to sit before a small 9 inch TV screen encased in an ornate wooden cabinet. The audience of several hundred members smoked their cigars and finished their meals waiting for the enchanting hour of 7 p.m. when the General Electric Company planned the first public test of a new transmitter for station W2XB which later became WRGB, named for its founder Walter Ransom Gail Baker. Although the station had been experimenting with TV broadcasting since 1928, in 1939 it was one of a handful of stations approved for commercial operations.

Sitting in a small hot studio at GE's headquarters in Schenectady were several nervous Rotarians including Paul Harris, Rotary's founder, Ches Perry, the RI general secretary and Walter Head, the RI president. They were going to be the first Rotarians to use the new medium in an attempt to spread their message to the waiting crowd. If successful, the screening would unite the three distant cities into one continuous network. It was also a great opportunity to demonstrate the capabilities of television before a group of business and community leaders that the Rotary clubs represented. Salesmen were posted at each site to explain the mystery of the latest electronic marvel and perhaps sell a couple of sets.

For roughly one hour, the Rotarians were amused by feats of magic, music and the, "hope that together Rotary and radio and television may help to develop this world neighborhood into a world brotherhood."

Today, the sister of radio has become a worldwide communications and entertainment powerhouse touching almost every individual on earth. There aren't many areas of interest, political views, or personal preferences not covered by a TV station, channel or program somewhere. And these different tastes include Rotary.

Rotary's involvement with television did not end in 1939. Although it took many decades before the full potential of the small screen was understood and utilized by Rotary. Today a large number of clubs use the media to promote our motto of "Service Above Self."

Both in the United States and around the world programs about Rotary and the good works the clubs do

are aired. Mostly on public access channels everything from fishing derbies to fund raising auctions are presented to local communities, introducing them to our organization. One Rotary club in Canada has run a bingo game on local television generating several thousands of dollars in revenue that are given back in the form of service. There are quite literally hundreds and hundreds of subjects that can and are being addressed through the use of television.

But the experiment doesn't end here. Televisions step-child, the Internet, through Facebook, YouTube, and a host of other "social media" systems have opened up new horizons in getting the ideas of Rotary to new people. Rotary International has a site on YouTube that offers hundreds of videos suitable for use on local TV.

Perhaps one of the best applications of the information highway is a site developed by Rotary District 5240 called We Are Rotary (Wearerotary.tv). Under the auspices of Past District Governor Wade Nomura there are several professionally produced programs dealing with a diverse range of Rotary topics. What I find amazing is they are using this format to save different club histories.

Recently (June 2017) they devoted 30 minutes interviewing Sylvia Whitlock, the first woman Rotary Club president of the Duarte, California club. She described some of the 11 year struggle of the Duarte Club's efforts to allow women into Rotary that resulted in the historic U.S. Supreme Court's decision

in 1987. It was a unique way to save the actual thoughts and words of a person who was instrumental in that action. I highly recommend visiting the site to see for yourself how the power of the internet can be harnessed. The sad news is only 37 visits were registered at the site before me.

In 1905, when Rotary was formed there was no radio. By 1939, Paul Harris and a few other visionaries understood that in order to foster Rotary's ideals they needed to grasp the means of communication. Television was a novelty in 1939, just as the internet (Continued on next page.)


was 20 or 30 years ago. This all has changed. With so many conflicting concepts available we need to fight for our beliefs of fellowship and service in a world that often has forgotten what those words mean. We need to go forward into the future, while remembering the past.
