

The Council on Resolutions meets online each year. Representatives from all of Rotary's districts worldwide vote on resolutions proposed by clubs, districts, the RI Board of Directors, and Rotary of Great Britan and Ireland. as well as urgent enactments proposed by the RI Board.

The results of this year's vote can be found at the below link.

The Council in Legislation is scheduled to meet April 2022 in Chicago. Every three years, Rotarians meet at the Council on Legislation to review and vote on proposed changes to the legislation that governs Rotary. They consider enactments, which change Rotary's governing documents, and position statements by the RI Board.

District Historian's Report

Delmar

Chartered December 18, 1957: 64 years of service. Within a couple of weeks of the chartering of the Corinth Rotary Club, then District 255 witnessed the handiwork of Charles Cameron and Charles Oliver of the Albany Rotary Club, in the creation of a Rotary Club in Delmar. The headline of the Albany newsletter "The Capital Cog" proclaimed, "Delmar Rotary Club Organized." The article indicated," After months of planning and meetings, a group of business and professional men of the Delmar-Elsmere-Slingerlands area gathered at the Delmar Methodist Church on Thursday, November 14, 1957 and organized a new Rotary Club. Our congratulations to our newest offspring. We are mighty proud of it and will follow it with keen and parental interest as it grows and flourishes.

Chartered on December 18, District Governor Frank Hines wrote in his newsletter on January 7, 1958, about the special dinner held at the Center Inn to celebrate the event. "It was a wonderful evening and congratulations to the Albany Club. The Lansingburgh Roto-Tones did give a fine performance and they were enjoyed by everyone present.... The proudest man in the hall was the secretary of the Albany Club, Lowell Gypson, Sr.- seeing his son [Lowell Gypson Jr.] installed as president of the new baby club. We extend our best wishes for success to the new officers and directors of the Delmar Club."

In 1958, the former District 255, that was established in 1954 by combining the nine counties of the capital area, was changed to district 719. There were no changes in the geographical dimensions of the district.

In the summer of 2002, District Governor Fred Carvin was approached by Charles "Chuck" Chera, a former Rotarian, who explained the idea of starting a club in the Clifton Park, Halfmoon and southern Saratoga county area. He knew a lot of ex-Rotarians who found it difficult making morning meetings in this suburban region. Believing he could attract many of these past members back, Chuck proposed breaking the pattern of breakfast clubs by starting a new lunchtime meeting.

Working with special representative Richard Hodge and district secretary Anne Cargile, Chuck was able to have a provisional club running by September 2002. A couple of months later, the group was able to apply for a permanent charter by the end of November. Sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Latham, Malta Sunrise, Cohoes and Shenendehowa, the issuance of the Rotary International Charter was granted on December 5, 2002.

A Chartering dinner was held at the Comfort Inn Suites in Clifton Park on January 18, 2003. At that dinner, club president Chera spoke, "The primary objective of Twin Bridges are to serve the community through local projects and activities, build and foster fellowship and support the tenets and programs of Rotary International." He continued saying his main goal is, "to get people in the various degrees of fellowship. You grow personally from fellowship."

Rotarian Flavors from Around the World

This is an opportunity to continue to experience the tastes of Rotary from around the world. Below, you will find recipes reprinted from the **Rotarian Flavors of the World Cookbook** (Morris Press Cookbooks 2011). Enjoy!

Appetizer

Crab Won Tons (page 19)

From the region of District 7620 / USA

1 (8-oz.) can Pillsbury Refrigerated crescent dinner rolls or 1 (8-oz.) can Pillsbury crescent recipe creations refrigerated seamless dough sheet

1 (3 -oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened

34 cup chopped cooked crab meat

1 tablespoon chopped green onion (1 medium)

1/8 to ¼ teaspoon ground red pepper (cayenne)

1 egg white, beaten

Heat oven to 375 degrees F. Spray cookie sheet with cooking spray. Unroll dough on work surface (if using crescent rolls, pinch seams to seal); cut into six rows by four rows to make 24 squares. In small bowl, mix cream cheese, crab meat, onion and red pepper. Spoon about 1 teaspoon crab mixture ½ inch from one corner of one square. Starting with same corner, fold dough over filling and tuck end tightly underneath filling; continue rolling to within ½ inch of opposite corner. Lightly brush exposed corner with egg white. Roll moistened corner of dough over roll; press to seal. Place on cookie sheet. Brush with egg white. Repeat with remaining squares and filling. Bake 10-15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from cookie sheet. Serve warm. Makes 24 won tons.

Salad

Xoriatiki (page 57)

Greek Village Salad

From the region of District 2470, 2481 / Greece

- 1 onion
- 1 green bell pepper
- 5 ripe tomatoes
- 1 cucumber
- 2 tablespoons sliced olives
- 2 tablespoons capers
- 1 tablespoon fresh chopped oregano
- 1/3 lb. feta cheese, crumbled
- ½ cup olive oil
- Salt

Cut the vegetables into slices and mix in a salad bowl. Top with the olives, capers and oregano and cover with crumbled feta cheese. Pour the olive oil evenly over the top. Serves 6.

Vegetable

Sweet Potato Fritters (page192)

From the region of District (not listed)

2 cups finely grated sweet potato

¼ cup chives

½ cup crumbled feta cheese

- 4 beaten eggs
- 2 green onions, chopped fine
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- ½ teaspoon salt (more if desired according to taste)
- ½ cup oil for frying

Combine all ingredients, except for oil, and mix well. Drop by spoonful's into hot oil until crisp on both sides. Serve with cocktail sauce.

Dessert

Mixed Fruit Sauté (page 188) From the region of District 9350 / Angola

- 4 bananas, peeled and sliced
- 4 mangoes, peeled and cubed (opt.)
- 1 pineapple, peeled, cored and cubed
- 3 oranges, peeled and cubed
- 3 tablespoons coconut oil
- ½ cup white grape juice
- 34 [teaspoon?] ground coriander

In a wok or large skillet, sauté all ingredients until thick texture occurs. Serve over vanilla ice cream. Garnish with fresh raspberries and orange zest.

Main Course

Sauerbraten (page 141)

From the region of District 1930-1950 / Germany

- 1½ cups cider vinegar
- 3 cups water
- 2 medium onions, coarsely chopped
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 lemon, cut into 8 wedges
- 1 teaspoon whole black peppercorns
- ½ teaspoon whole cloves
- 5 lb. top round roast
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- ¼ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup beef broth
- 2/3 cup packed dark brown sugar
- 34 cup gingersnap cookie crumbs

Combine vinegar, water, onions, salt, bay leaves, lemons, peppercorns, cloves and bring to a boil. Cool. Place beef in bowl. Pour marinade over. Cover and chill 2 days, turning beef every 8 hours. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Remove beef from marinade and reserve the marinade. Place beef in roasting pan and roast beef until tender, about 2½ hours. Transfer beef to carving board; cool. Pour any accumulated juices from roasting pan into marinade. Strain marinade and reserve 2 cups; discard the rest. Fry the flour in oil in a heavy large skillet. Stir over medium heat until dark brown, about 10 minutes. Gradually mix in 2 cups marinade. Boil until thick, stirring often, about 8 minutes. Mix in sugar and cookie crumbs. Bring mixture to a boiling point. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Turn off heat. Slice beef and arrange in baking dish. Pour sauce over meat and serve. If preparing a day in advance, preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Bake beef until heated through, about 15 minutes and then pour warmed sauce over it.


