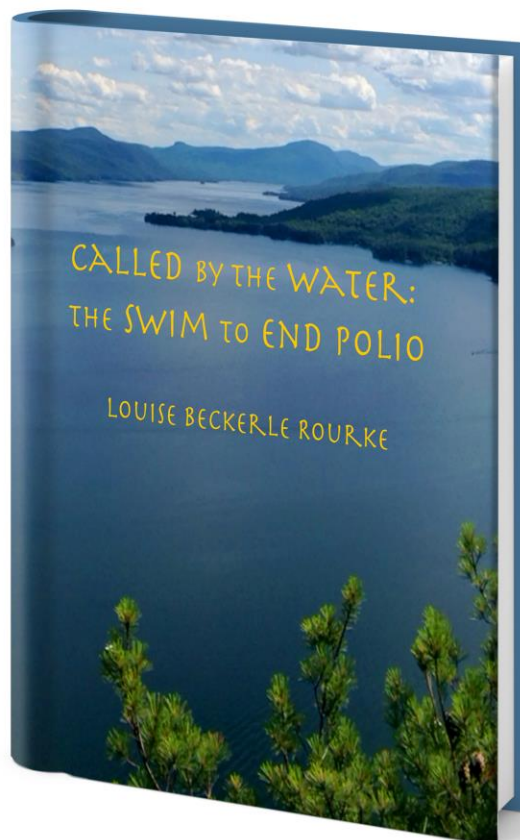

Masks for Malta

Malta Sunrise Rotary is kicking off a town-wide "Stop the Virus" campaign to fight off the contagious Covid 19 virus. Rotary President Larry Levine reports that Rotary is contacting forty Malta businesses and supplying each with free emergency masks for customers who wish to do business but left home without their face masks. "There is no reason to turn away a customer who has left their mask at home," Levine said. In addition to the masks, posters are being placed in the windows of businesses throughout the town.

The masks are a three-ply, high density layered screening system, Levine said, "If you are wondering if the mask you currently use is effective, a simple trick can help you. Try blowing out a candle while wearing your mask. A good mask should prevent you from extinguishing the flame."

Malta Rotarian and former Saratoga County Public Health Director Helen Endres advises people to wear masks in all public settings particularly when social distancing of 6 or more feet is difficult to maintain, such as grocery stores, pharmacies, and gas stations. Endres said the virus that causes COVID 19 spreads from person to person, mainly through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. The spread of the virus is more likely when people are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet). Many people are "asymptomatic" which means they have been infected with the virus but don't have symptoms. The masks in conjunction with minimal close contact with others will help to stop the transmission and spread throughout the community.

Burnt Hills Ballston Lake Rotary Club Saves 'Books for Troops' by Steve Caine

For ten years, retired school teacher Ms. Ellen Keegan, the founder 'Books for Troops' and a group of dedicated volunteers, collected books of all genres, and sent them to troops and veterans all over the world. When the Burnt Hills Ballston Lake (BHBL) Rotary club learned about this initiative, members decided to collect books and donate them to 'Books for Troops'.

In early October, when a couple from BHBL Rotary went to deliver the books the club had collected, they discovered 'Books for Troops' was going out of business because they had lost the storage facility that had been given to them. This unfortunate circumstance at first created a situation where thousands of books donated to 'Books for Troops' would go to a commercial book dealer, eventually to be sold, as opposed to going to the troops and vets they were intended for. And, secondly, the books BHBL Rotary had collected were for the moment in limbo with no known place to send

them. Fortunately, a BHBL member knew Ms. Keegan's contact information. The club decided that if there was something they could do, they wanted to help.

Ms. Keegan was extremely pleased to know the club wanted to do something. The situation was tenuous. Within a little over a weeks' time, a commercial book dealer was going to come and collect whatever 'Books for Troops' still had, which was reported as 3,000 books. Three thousand books, intended for the troops and veterans were going to go to a commercial book dealer! The club had to act fast! BHBL club members immediately decided that individual members would make contributions. They rose to the occasion. In just a week's time, BHBL Rotary members collectively donated \$1,300, enough to save and ship 3,200 'Books for Troops' books and the 280 books the club had collected. They are being shipped to 17 military hospitals serving recovering troops, veterans, and their families!

Members of the BHBL Rotary Club were gratified that they could in some way support the men, women, and their families who have made significant personal sacrifices for our country.

Drink

Apple Cider Drink (page 8)

From the region of District 6440 / USA

- 2 sticks cinnamon
- 1 tsp whole cloves
- 1 tsp whole allspice
- 2 quarts apple cider
- ½ cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 orange, sliced

Place cinnamon, cloves and allspice in a double thickness of cheesecloth; bring up corners of cloth and tie with a string to form a bag. Place cider and brown sugar in a slow cooker; stir until sugar dissolves. Add spice bag. Place orange slices on top. Cover and cook on low for 2-5 hours. Remove spice bag before serving.

Salad

Cranberry Apple Salad (page 35)

From the region of District 7910 / USA

- 1 (3 oz) raspberry Jello
- ½ cup boiling water
- 1 can whole cranberry sauce
- 3-4 Granny Smith apples

Dissolve Jello in boiling water. Peel, core and shred apples. Mix into cranberry sauce. Add dissolved Jello. Pour in a Jello mold.



Soup

Black Bread Soup with Fruit (page 30)

Leivasupp

From the region of District 1420 / Estonia

- ¾ cup raisins
- ½ cup plum brandy
- ½ cup sugar
- 5 cups water
- 6 slices black sourdough bread, crusts removed, toasted
- 2 small tart apples, peeled, halved and sliced
- ¾ cup fresh cranberries
- ¾ cup pitted dried prunes
- ¾ cup cranberry juice
- 1 piece (inch) cinnamon stick
- 3 cloves, whole
- Zest of 1 lemon
- Whipped cream for garnish

Soak the raisins in the brandy for 20-30 minutes. In a soup pot, bring the water and sugar to a boil over high heat. Add the bread and then reduce the heat to low and simmer until the bread just begins to dissolve. You may remove the bread with a slotted spoon and push it through a sieve, or use a food processor for a pulse or two. The bread should not be pureed, but grainy. Put the bread back in the pot. Add the raisins with their soaking liquid, cranberries, cranberry juice, apples, prunes, cinnamon stick, lemon zest and cloves. Bring to a boil and then reduce the heat and simmer, covered, until the fruits are tender. Taste the soup and add more sugar, if desired. Cool, then refrigerate for at least 2 hours. Remove the cinnamon stick and cloves before eating. Serve the soup in serving bowls with whipped cream.

Main Course**Chicken in Wine** (page 111)

From the region of District 1640-1790 / France

3 oz. butter
 1 T oil
 3½ lb. oven-ready chicken
 1 large onion, thickly sliced
 ¾ lb. carrots, thickly sliced
 1 T fresh thyme leaves
 Salt
 Black pepper
 1 bay leaf
 1¼ cup Muscadet (wine)
 1¼ cup fresh chicken stock
 1 lb. button mushrooms
 4 egg yolks
 Freshly grated nutmeg

Heat the oil and half of the butter in a large casserole or pan. Add the chicken and fry for a few minutes on all sides. Remove from the pan and set aside. Place half the onions and carrots in the casserole, then place the chicken, breast side up, on top. Cover with the remaining onions and carrots. Add the bay leaf, thyme, salt and pepper, then pour over the stock and wine. This should cover half of the bird. Add more stock if necessary. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 40 minutes. Add the mushrooms, then turn the chicken over. Continue to simmer, covered, for a further 30 minutes. At the end of the cooking time, remove the chicken to a warmed serving platter. Lift out the vegetables with a slotted spoon, remove the bay leaf and arrange the vegetables around the chicken. Keep warm. Return the casserole to a high heat and boil rapidly for 5-8 minutes to reduce the liquid. Meanwhile, melt the remaining butter in a pan and lightly fry the remaining mushrooms. Sprinkle over the other vegetables surrounding the chicken. Keep warm. In a bowl, beat the egg yolks together with the nutmeg. Add a little of the cooking liquid to the eggs; mix well, then stir into the casserole. Remove from the heat and stir once. **To serve:** pour a little of the sauce over the chicken and serve the rest separately.

Casserole**Squash Casserole** (page 90)

From the region of District 6840 / USA

1½ lbs. yellow squash (fresh or frozen)
 1 cup oleo or margarine (or real butter)
 ½ cup chopped white onion
 ¼ cup chopped green bell pepper
 ½ cup mayonnaise (use mayonnaise as salad dressing gives it another taste that many may not like)
 ½ cup grated sharp cheddar cheese
 1 cup sliced water chestnuts
 1 egg and 1 tsp sugar
 Buttered bread crumbs, about 1-2 cups depending on preference

Cook squash, sliced, in hot lightly salted water for 8 minutes and drain. (Let drain while other ingredients are assembled.) Place back into the pot. Sauté onions and bell pepper in 1 cup of oleo (or margarine or real butter). Add cheese and chestnuts into the onion mixture in pan. Whip 1 egg and 1 teaspoon sugar together and add to squash mixture. Add the mixture of onions, bell pepper, cheese, chestnuts and egg and sugar mixture with the squash. Place into a 1½ quart casserole (lightly buttered or sprayed with Pam). Top with bread crumbs (1/2 cup may be enough, depending on preference). Bake at 350 degrees F for 30 minutes. Serve hot. Serves 6-8 persons.

Dessert**Pumpkin Cheese Cake or Bars** (page 183)

From the region of District 6270 / USA

Crust:

- 1 package cake mix (spice cake mix was used here, but yellow cake mix or carrot cake mix will also work)

- ½ cup melted butter

This can be done in a springform pan or a 9 x 13-inch pan. Mix together and press firmly in bottom of pan.

Filling:

- 1½ lbs. cream cheese, softened: 3- 8 oz pkgs (Used here: low fat or mix of the 2 types.)
- 1 (14 oz) can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 (14 oz) can pumpkin [Not pie filling]
- 4 eggs
- 1 T pumpkin pie spice

In large mixer, beat cream cheese and sweetened condensed milk on high speed 2 minutes, scraping bowl as needed. Add pumpkin, spice and eggs. Beat 1 minute longer or until smooth. Pour over prepared crust. Bake 55-60 minutes in cheesecake springform pan or 30-35 minutes in 9 x 13-inch pan. Run knife around edge of pan to loosen. Cool completely on wire rack, then chill for 2 hours or overnight.

**Bread****Zucchini Bread** (page 185)

From the region of District 6270 / USA

- 1 cup oil
- 3 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups zucchini, shredded
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 cup nuts, chopped
- 3 cups flour
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp baking soda
- ¼ tsp baking powder

Mix well. Grease and flour 2 loaf pans. Pour mixture into pans. Bake for 90 minutes at 350F.
