With gratitude for you and all you do to support your clubs, our district and our Rotary Foundation throughout the year,



Meet CNY Rotary Update Fall Leads the Change

Dear Members,

This is the time of year when we reflect and give thanks for all we appreciate. The CNY Rotary steering committee would like to thank all of its members and all of the Rotarians who have stepped up to help on transition teams. The work they are doing is key to the future of Rotary in our region and will ensure that CNY Rotary provides top-notch support to all of our clubs. While we have teams for the six main areas of the district off and running, we will continue to build out teams that can help ideate additional committees that will be needed. We have received some inquiries through our website from people wanting to get involved, and encourage more of you to reach out and see where you might fit in. You do not need to have past district experience to be part of the CNY Rotary planning team. And remember, being on a transition group does not obligate you to serve on the committee when CNY Rotary becomes official in July of 2024.

The task of building something new and exciting is a very rewarding way to serve your fellow Rotarians.

We also want to share some answers to questions we've received about CNY Rotary. You may have been asking the same questions as well.

Q: Will the district make our clubs join together if we are a small club?

A: The decision for two small clubs to become one would solely rest on the leaders of those clubs. CNY Rotary will not tell clubs what to do any more than the current districts do. The role of the district is to offer support and resources. If clubs are considering merging, they could reach out for help with exploring the idea, working out the logistics, and promoting the new club in their communities.

Q: Will the District Governor really be able to visit ALL the clubs once we are CNY Rotary?

A: Visiting every club is a tradition in Rotary, but it is not a rule. Some clubs appreciate one-on-one time with a district leader, others find it inconvenient to fit into their schedules. Some would prefer leadership to help with a project instead. The goal will be to reasonably accommodate clubs, as well as incorporate some special events that bring multiple clubs together for a district visit. As with many aspects of creating CNY Rotary, it will be an opportunity for new traditions to be created. Feel free to start imagining those now (as in Imagine Rotary!).

Q: How can one person lead a district this size?

A: That would be a tall order! That's why the new structure of CNY Rotary will be led by a board, instead of an individual. Of course we all subscribe to "Service Above Self," but we will also be adopting the classic phrase, "many hands make light work." The committees that lead our district today will be larger under CNY Rotary to ensure there is plenty of support and access to resources for all clubs. We hope many of you will be stepping up to lend your expertise, grow your Rotary IQ and get involved.

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World Polio Day

World Polio Day was marked at a Schenectady City Council on Monday, October 24 when a contingent from Rotary District 7109 were presented with a resolution recognizing October 24, 2022, as World Polio Day in the City of Schenectady. 7109 District Governor, Denise DiNoto, spoke about the need to encourage polio vaccination for children, especially in NYS which is currently experiencing a spike in the disease. This effort was organized through the efforts of Schenectady Council member and Schenectady Rotarian Carmel Patrick and Schenectady Rotary Polio Chairperson Judy Nocera. Not long ago, US Citizens thought the scourge of Polio was eradicated in all but the deepest, darkest corners of undeveloped countries. However, with a new strain having cropped up across the United States, the issue is closer to home. Rotary District 7190 comprises Rotary Clubs in 9 counties in upstate New York - Albany, Fulton, Montgomery, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Schoharie, Warren, and Washington.

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SOKONI WOMEN'S WATER PROJECT

The Lake George Rotary club is teaming up the the Rotary Club 9212 of Karura, Kenya for a water tank project. Listed below are the needs and the tank request. information will also be handed out at the Foundation dinner.

Background:

The Sokoni water project is located in Gwassi, Homa Bay County, Kenya (see link map for exact location). <u>Location for Sokoni Water Project around this area</u>

Homa Bay County performs below the (Kenya) national average on most socio-economic indicators. Poverty is prevalent in the county and manifests itself in other socio-economic outcomes such as poor nutrition, health, under 5 child mortality and education, as well as a lack of access to basic services. The HIV/Aids prevalence within Homa Bay, Suba Subcounty is also among the highest in Kenya.

The water project was initiated due to lack of **clean water** despite the fact that Gwassi is located near the shores of Lake Victoria - one of the largest fresh water bodies in Africa. Fetching water, which is the responsibility of the woman, is a time-consuming activity that takes almost a whole day preventing women from engaging in other activities. Women have to walk up to 15 kilometres to obtain one 20 litre-can of water that they carry back home on their heads. The water fetched has to cater for all domestic needs. The number of trips is determined by the need for water in each household, therefore the women spend most of their time fetching water, denying them time to engage in education or income generating activities including improved farming. The burden of carrying water has a negative effect on their health and the lack of exposure to education diminishes their self-esteem. Young school girls are not spared as they have to help their mothers to fetch water, resulting in poor education grades for girls. The water they use is also not fit for domestic consumption hence exposing the community to waterborne diseases.



This situation has led to a dependency culture because the women have few skills and no time to apply themselves to any economic activity.

The project is registered as **Sokoni Women's Development Initiative (SOWETE)** for good governance and accountability.

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Specific Objective:

To provide safe, clean and adequate water by assisting each woman to acquire a 10,000 litre water tank to enable them harvest rainwater for their domestic use.

SOWETE works with women's groups within the community through a community participation model where the women are encouraged to save money from their local economic activities. This money is then used to purchase water tanks for each household within the women's group. To encourage the women further, SOWETE has committed to provide one additional water tank for the group for every tank they are able to purchase themselves.

Therefore, for every water tank the women's group purchase for themselves they receive one more tank. Each tank costs Ksh. 85,000.00, (including transport and installation fees).

The current phase of the project has seven women groups each consisting of an average of 25 women. Each group agrees on the target number of water tanks to save for during a one year period. The money is saved in a 'home bank' (see photo) due to lack of banking facilities. Once the goal has been set, the group determines the amount of money each woman must save within the agreed period (on average Ksh.10,000.00 (USD100) per year). The women do menial jobs to raise the money required, including:

- Fetching water from the lake to sell to nearby schools
- 2. Cutting and preparing raw sisal fibre for sale.
- 3. Crushing stones to make ballast for sale.
- 4. Small businesses such as selling sugar and paraffin in small quantities.
- 5. Rearing and selling chicken.
- 6. Selling of fish in small quantities.

During the long rains in March – May, assuming that the rains are consistent, it takes only one week to completely fill a 10,000 litre water tank; and the water harvested is sufficient to sustain domestic needs for one household for approximately 6 months up till the short rains in September. Having a water tank also means that the women can use the time saved from not fetching water for other activities that generate income, and also educational activities to improve their skills. Their children, in particular the girls are also able to stay in school and gain a formal education as they are no longer expected to help with fetching water.

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Request:

Fundraising for the matching tanks have previously focused around Alice Kirenge's family and friends. The project has so far provided 112 water tanks. However, due to the demonstration of success, it has attracted more women hence an increase in the demand.

SOWETE now seeks for Rotary partnership through the **Rotary Club of Karura** in District 9212 to provide **Ksh. 4,845,600 (USD \$40,375.00)** for the purchase of the **57** matching tanks (see spreadsheet below) in order to provide a total of 201 women with tanks in the first phase of the project. SOWETE is also seeking longer partnerships for matching the women's future fund-raising efforts so that all women in the County can get water tanks and therefore access to clean and safe water.

Autumn Soup

"This is a delicious, quick and hearty, tried-and-true
Betty Crocker classic and longtime family favorite."
Barb

1 lb. ground beef

1 cup chopped onion

4 cups hot water

1 cup each: cut up carrots, celery, potatoes

2 teaspoons salt

½ teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon meat extract

1 bay leaf

Pinch basil

6 whole tomatoes, chopped (or 1-8 oz can tomato sauce)

Brown beef in large soup pot. When browned, drain excess rendered fat. Add onions, cook 5 minutes more. Add water, carrots, celery, potatoes, and seasonings. Mix thoroughly. Bring to boil, cover and simmer 20 minutes. Add tomatoes (or sauce); cover and simmer 10 minutes, or longer.

Remove bay leaf before serving.

Serve with your choice of small pasta or rice.

Makes 6 servings.
