#### From the Governor's Desk

By now, most of you have heard about the case of paralytic polio discovered in Rockland County earlier this year. It was the first case of polio in the United States since 2013. Wastewater samples show the presence of the virus now in New York City, Rockland, Orange and Sullivan Counties.

Rotarians know the importance of vaccination in disease prevention, particularly when it comes to polio. As an organization, we are committed to the eradication of this disease. We are used to discussing it as a disease that happens in other parts of the world, but without a commitment to vaccine adherence it can appear right at our door.

October 24 is World Polio Day and thanks to the Internet, you don't have to travel far to participate. Rotary International is hosting virtual events on their social media sites. You can host a watch party with your friends and club members. Or, maybe you want to be more active. Organize a walk or bike ride for your local community to raise awareness and funds. Perhaps you will invite a speaker to address your club and talk about the efforts to end polio now. Last week at the Schenectady Rotary meeting, they put purple baskets on the tables to collect change from meeting participants. Thanks to the generosity of members and guests, more than \$60 was raised for polio!

#### Meet CNY Rotary Update Fall Leads the Change

Happy Fall! Summer road construction is wrapping up, but construction of CNY Rotary is underway. As we prepare this newsletter, many of the CNY Steering Committee members are participating in the Zone 28/32 Learning to Lead training in Toronto. We are enjoying the chance to listen to Rotary International leaders and network with others who have engaged in the work we are completing.

#### Festive Pumpkin Pie with Spiced Nut Crust

"For your new food section, attached is a delicious recipe for pumpkin pie that I clipped out of a Syracuse newspaper over 40 years ago, and have been making it ever since (and it's easy). It's timely with Halloween and Thanksgiving coming right up." Susan

#### Mix in a large bowl:

16 oz. can of pumpkin 14 oz. can sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated; low fat is fine) 2 eggs 1 tsp. ground cinnamon ½ tsp. ginger ½ tsp. ground cloves ½ tsp. salt

#### Ingredients for the crust:

½ cup of butter
1 cup of unsifted flour
¼ cup of firmly packed light brown sugar
1 cup of finely chopped pecans or walnuts (or a combination of both)

Melt butter on stove or in microwave. Add the melted butter to the rest of the crust ingredients. Mix well. Pat on the bottom and sides of a 9-inch pie plate. (This is fun, and children also enjoy doing it.)

Pour ingredients into the prepared crust Bake at 350 for app. 40 minutes, testing for doneness by inserting a knife near the middle to see if it comes out clean. It's a good idea to put tinfoil around the top of the crust before the pie is baked.

Delicious with vanilla or eggnog ice cream or whipped cream.

#### **10th Global Citizen Festival raises \$2.4 billion in pledges**

NEW YORK — The 10th anniversary of the Global Citizen Festival, which included performances from Metallica, Mariah Carey and Usher, generated more than \$2.4 billion in commitments to fight extreme poverty and disease.

European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, U.S. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, Barbados Prime Minister Mia Mottley and others addressed the crowds gathered in New York's Central Park and Black Star Square in Accra, Ghana, for nine hours Saturday.

"Amidst all the doomsday messages we hear today, hope lies in the fact that millions of citizens are rising up to take action, more than any other point in history," Global Citizen CEO Hugh Evans said at the event. "Ending extreme poverty is not a partisan issue, and those most in need cannot be treated like political pawns. Our job is to not let our leaders forget that."

What makes Global Citizen Festival different from other fundraisers is that tickets for the event are not for sale. To attend, supporters must volunteer time to take various actions – from signing petitions and calling or messaging world leaders on social media to address certain issues – during a six-week campaign. This year's campaign generated more than two million actions, more than doubling the previous record for the advocacy nonprofit.

International leaders announced new policies at the festival, influenced, in part, by Global Citizen supporters. French President Emmanuel Macron confirmed that he would reallocate 30 percent of his country's Special Drawing Rights reserves with the International Monetary Fund to the world's poorest countries, specifically in Africa, to help them fund projects battling extreme poverty and climate change. The governments of Ghana and South Africa announced the formation of the \$1 billion African Prosperity Fund, to finance infrastructure, technology and sustainability projects across the continent.

Rotary International President Jennifer Jones announced a \$150 million, three-year commitment to fight polio through the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, part of the service organization's work against the disease since 1985.

"Quite honestly, until everyone is protected, no one is protected," Jones told The Associated Press in an interview. "And we see now with the state of emergency being declared in New York and the case of vaccine-derived polio that has entered here, it's close to home. I think it's a little bit of an alarm bell to a lot of people who thought, 'Well, this is something that's gone. Why do we even need to immunize our children?""

Jones said she wanted to announce Rotary International's new commitment at Global Citizen Festival's 10th anniversary because the organization made a similar announcement at the first festival.

"They have millions and millions of Global Citizens and we have 1.4 million citizens who are people of action, who are doing things every single day in the field," Jones said. "So the ability for us to take our activated populations and showcase that we want to help and help people understand what they can do to make a difference, it's just a great synergy between our two organizations."
