From the Governor's Desk

Many of us in the Northeast United States affiliate September with back-to-school. Parents post photos of their children in "first day" poses. College students have moved into their dorm rooms. Some of you reading this may be students yourselves, engaging in a new course of study.

Rotary is committed to learning and literacy; in fact it is one of our Rotary Foundation areas of focus. In our District, many clubs support this area through scholarships, little free libraries, or dictionary distribution. Thanks to Rotarians, young learners are improving their literacy skills and enriching their educational opportunities.

This fall also marks the return of Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE). Youth exchanges between Rotary clubs began in Europe in 1929. The first United States exchanges began in 1939 as short-term programs between California clubs and clubs in Latin American countries. Youth exchange programs expanded to the East Coast in 1958 and instituted the full-school-year long exchange format. The first multi-district program was formed in 1962 with several East Coast Rotary districts. RYE became an official Rotary International program in 1972, with the vision to create a more interconnected and understanding world. Prior to the pandemic disruption, RYE had grown to include over 80 countries and 9,000 students annually.

Many people, even non-Rotarians, know about RYE - it may be one of the best-known Rotary programs. As a former Rotary youth exchange student, I may be


biased about the value of RYE. But, I am sincere in my excitement about students having these opportunities once again! I know RYE offers lessons which can influence your life in unimaginable ways.

Perhaps you know a young person who would make a great ambassador. Sometimes all they need is a push from a Rotarian to begin their journey on the exchange student path!

BACK TO COOL – The ABCs of CNY Rotary

It's September, and throughout our region, students will be returning to school. We want to take this opportunity to help explain the framework of CNY Rotary.

One of the biggest (or smallest) changes in CNY Rotary is the structure of the leadership team. Since our area will be much larger, we thought of ways to make the job of the District Governor less daunting. Here is what the transition team envisions:

CNY Rotary will be led by a board of directors. This board will be comprised of a President (District Governor), President Elect (DGE), President Nominee (DGN), President Designate (DGND, non-voting), Immediate Past President (IPDG), 2 Past Presidents at Large (2 iPDGs), Finance Chair. This board will act in a collaborative manner to run the business of CNY Rotary.

We chose these titles to be more relatable to both Rotary members and non-Rotarians. Rotary International will know our President as our District Governor, just as they will recognize CNY Rotary as District 7180 (or whatever number we are assigned).

There will be additional opportunities for regional service in CNY Rotary. The new structure will have committees you will recognize, such as finance, public image, membership and the like. We will also include Area Representatives (Assistant Governors) to assist clubs in achieving their goals.

With our combined resources, we hope that clubs feel empowered and supported in the imperative work they are doing in their communities locally and abroad.

What is Oktoberfest? Oktoberfest (to be celebrated on September 24th this year) is a free community event presented by the Glenville Business Professional Association (GBPA) and is sponsorship funded. This event draws crowds of more than 10,000 people annually. It features a car show, helicopter rides, German food, food trucks, fireworks, harvest sale area for vendors, and much more.

Who's involved? 7 local Rotary Clubs, (Scotia, Glenville, Niskayuna, Rotterdam Sunrise, Schenectady

East, Schenectady, and Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake) are splitting the cost of a \$1,000 Gold Sponsorship. This sponsorship includes a 4'x4' Rotary sign (logo) on the grounds and will feature said logo on the Oktoberfest event website, in the Daily Gazette ads, in all social media posts, on the event flier, and on the back of the event tee shirts.

Also included in this sponsorship are exhibit spaces. I have requested that our exhibit spaces be combined in a full corner section. Here we will be able to fit our Clubs' displays and flags, set up a Shelter Box, have a Gift of Life area, and a selling area for whatever the Clubs would like to sell/promote i.e., popcorn, roasted nuts, picture taking opportunities, informational fliers, etc.

I am very invested in this event because that's the day the *Glenville Rotary Doggie Paddle Fundraiser* kayak journey begins. Paddling the kayak will be Glenville Rotarian Jimmy Thomas. This event is raising funds to aid veterans with their companion dog expenses. There will be plenty of media present (TV, newspaper, etc.) and if the weather is good, likely a crowd exceeding 10,000 Cpeople. It would be so cool to have 100+ Rotarians there in Rotary shirts getting this type of coverage!

My goal is to have Rotary seen as the large active, organization it is instead of 3 people in one booth, 6 in another, 2 in a third, etc.

I envision several picture boards displaying photos of our work done at various Club projects near and far. They'll portray our improvements from various local parks and playgrounds to water purification systems installed in Haiti. Also featured will be our fundraising Ziti Dinners, Pancake Breakfasts, Nisky Day participation, and Corn Hole tournaments, etc. These pictures will show our hard work, our fundraising efforts, and the fun we have in the process. We will present Club summaries, including their meeting date(s) and time(s) along with overall information to give to prospective members.

DG Denise is in agreement that a combined Club presence at this event is exactly what RI and the District are trying to achieve in promoting Rotary's public image. Please join your fellow Rotarians for a HUGE community event that promotes Rotary.



PDG Larry Receives Presidential Recognition

Jones Honored by White House for Volunteer Efforts

Larry Jones, 63, was honored by the White House earlier this month for his volunteer work.

Jones, of Glenville, was awarded a 2022 President's Volunteer Service Award for his efforts on behalf of ShelterBox USA, a global disaster relief organization that provides emergency shelter and household supplies to individuals around the world who have been forced from their homes by disaster or armed conflicts.

"I was a little surprised," Jones said of when he heard the news on a conference call with ShelterBox. "Then they explained what it was. And I was like, this is really cool. But I've been low key about it, because it's not about me. It's about the organization."

Jones, a retired financial adviser, became involved with Shelterbox through the Rotary International, which partners with ShelterBox. Jones is currently a Rotary Shelter-Box Ambassador, and he has served as a District Governor for Rotary District 7190, as well as president of the Glenville club.

In his leadership role, Jones helps steer local fundraisers for Shelter-Box. Each box costs about \$1,000 to fill, and Jones estimates his local Rotary district, which has 41 clubs and roughly 1,000 members, has supported more than 500 boxes since 2000. Jones said his local district has funded more than 30 boxes in the past two years.

With the support of Jones last year, ShelterBox provided supplies to 143,000 people in 11 countries, or 28,600 households, including its largest response to date in the Philippines to Typhoon Rai last December, according to ShelterBox.

Started in 2000 in the United Kingdom to help people in Haiti following an earthquake, ShelterBox provides family-sized tents and essential tools to start repairing and rebuilding homes. The organization's kits and boxes also contain items that help transform shelter into a home, such as cooking sets, solar lights, blankets, water filtration and mosquito nets. These items enable families to recover following a disaster, providing a way to keep communities and families together.

Since its founding, Shelter-Box has responded to more than 300 disasters — earthquakes, volcanos, floods, hurricanes, cyclones, tsunamis and war — in more than 100 countries. ShelterBox was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2018 and 2019. ShelterBox USA is based in Santa Barbara, California.

Jones said one of his favorite stories is about a Palestinian man who was displaced and lived with his family in a ShelterBox tent for more than two years. Now he is an employee of Rotary International.

"That's an amazing story," Jones said.

Jones said the boxes and supplies have been used to help Ukrainians following Russia's invasion. In response to the crisis in Ukraine, District 7190 has raised about \$18,000, specifically for ShelterBox, Jones said.

The President's Volunteer Service Award is a special recognition presented by the White House. It is part of a national program created in 2003 through the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation for individuals of all ages who contribute at least 100 hours to volunteer activities.

"By sharing your time and passion, you are helping discover and deliver solutions to the challenges we face — solutions that we need more than ever. We are living in a moment that calls for hope and light and love," President Joe Biden's letter reads. "Through your service, you are providing all three."

Schenectady Rotary Student Exchange Program

Schenectady Rotary has a long history of engagement in one of the key programs of Rotary Rotary Youth International the Exchange program. The Exchange Program furthers one of goals international Rotary's for peace cooperation. Through the program, high school aged youth are provided a year-long experience living and attending school in another country. Host families (Rotarians and non-Rotarians) host the students as if they were their own children. Students attend a public high school and participate fully in that school's activities. One of the wonderful and egalitarian aspects of the program is that students and their parents do not pay for this program, besides purchasing travel insurance and an open-ended plane ticket. There is no direct cost to the student or to the student's family. Host Rotary clubs provide a monthly stipend for spending money. For several years, the Niskayuna and Schenectady Rotary Clubs have collaborated on hosting a student and our current student will also have "two clubs." Typically, Rotary International prefers that the students experience two or three host families throughout a year's time. A shared arrangement like the one we have with Niskayuna helps us to better provide host families and to share finances.

Maria "Ines" Roche is the Schenectady and Niskayuna Rotary Club's 2022-2023 Exchange Student. She goes by the name of Ines (pronounced EEE Nehs, with an emphasis on the first syllable). She will be staying with Lisa and Milan Jackson's family for the first part of her visit here and she will be attending the Schalmont High School.

Ines is fifteen years old, and she is from Tres Arroyos, a city of about 62,000 people in the Province of Buenos Aires, Argentina. She is interested in sports,

especially hockey and volleyball. She will be arriving on August 21st.

Ines will be attending our Rotary Club meetings when her school schedule allows and will be a speaker at least once during the Rotary year. Our Rotary District also supports and plans events for all the students. If you are wondering how you can get involved, the possibilities are endless! A few suggestions are the following:

- Consider hosting Ines as a second or third host family. Remember, however, that she will need to remain in the Schalmont School District. There is also an application process to be completed.
- 2. Do you know of a current Schalmont student or teacher who would make a wonderful host family? Tell them about the program and ask them to contact me (Ellen McHale), President Nick Clay, or Lisa Jackson. Prospective host families make an application and then are interviewed by Rotarians. You don't have to have children in the home, although that is preferred.
- 3. Ines is interested in sports, and she specifically mentions hockey and volleyball in her application. Do you have tickets to the Union College Hockey matches? Maybe you have never been but would like to treat a young person to the game!
- 4. Is your family planning a "staycation" or is planning to attend a local event or cultural offering? Experiencing other families and their activities and interests is a great way for a young person to learn more about the country or the region. Rotary does not allow the student to freely travel, or to travel overnight with someone who hasn't undergone a background check, but local travel is definitely allowed. If you are planning a special event, consider asking lines to come.



5. Maybe you have a larger idea that can include all of the Exchange Students. For example, the Lake George Club hosts the entire student group for a weekend in Lake George Village. If you are interested in helping to arrange for a

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larger Exchange Student event, please let me know!

A few things that I and my family have done/attended with prior Exchange Students, which might spark some other ideas:

- · apple picking
- regional Fairs such as the Altamont Fair or the Cobleskill Sunshine Fair
- Live at the Lakehouse free theater in Albany's Washington Park
- A day trip to the Adirondacks.
- A day of boating, hiking, cycling, or other outdoor activity.
- A professional or college sporting event hockey, baseball, etc.

As you can see, there are lots of opportunities to engage with Ines! All it requires is a willingness to share an experience that you are already planning, and to make sure that it doesn't conflict with plans that the Jackson family is making. The more we welcome Ines into our Rotary Family, the better her year will be.

Hankering because that's the only word that truly describes why anyone has a desire to go to a fair, unless you're in 4H and have calves to display, hogs to race or recipes to be judged. It is rather odd that in this day and age folks still subject themselves to being voluntarily judged, so I will refrain from judging their motives. (But I will go out on the proverbial limb and say that competing is better than just being handed a participation trophy.)

So, why was it, you ask, that I found myself 'hankering' to attend the Altamont fair? Fair question (pun intended) because I truly couldn't answer that question myself until I had arrived. Once we arrived it was like stepping back in time. Back to a time when life was simpler. A time when folks (yes, folks) allowed themselves to eat calorie laden foods offered at local fairs without worrying if their cholesterol would spike or their arteries clog. A time before keto, gluten free, and low carb anything. (I didn't say it was a healthier time, just a more familiar and comforting time.) A time when folks didn't carry hand sanitizer or act weary if anyone got too close. A time when we were free to laugh and mingle and enjoy life. So, if you miss any of these things consider attending a county or state fair next year. It's good for the soul.

This leads me to the recipe change-up this month. While at the Altamont Fair, I received a (free) packet of recipes for this year's winning recipes. Bingo! I thought I would share some of these first-prize winning recipes with you, and I was even a little enamored that they were mostly all handwritten. Very retro, I felt until... I got home and saw that I could barely read most of them for a variety of reasons. I guess that explains the 'free' part. (Ah, 21st century technology would have come in handy here. But I can't have it both ways.) So, a couple of the recipes that I could read I have reproduced here for your enjoyment and so that you too can step back in time, even for a moment. Enjoy.

Dill Pickle Pasta Salad

1 box (16 oz.) rotini pasta

1/3 cup dill pickle juice (from the pickle jar)

2 cups chopped baby dill pickles

1 block (8 oz.) Colby Jack cheese, cubed small

1 small white onion, finely chopped

Creamy Dill Dressing:

1 cup mayonnaise

½ cup sour cream

1/3 cup dill pickle juice (from the pickle jar)

2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill (or 1tablespoon dried)

¼ teaspoon salt

¼ teaspoon pepper

Cook pasta (per directions on the box).

Drain and put in large mixing bowl.

Add in juice, pickles, Colby cheese, and onion.

Stir all dressing ingredients together and add pasta.

Refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

Sausage and Cheese Bread

1 lb. pork sausage

¼ cup chopped onion

¼ cup Parmesan cheese

½ cup grated cheddar cheese

1 egg

½ teaspoon hot sauce

1 teaspoon each salt and pepper

Dash of red pepper flakes

2 cups Bisquik

2/3 cup milk

¼ cup mayonnaise

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Spray a 9x5 inch loaf pan.

Crumble sausage into skillet with the onion and cook until brown. Drain and cool.

In large bowl combine egg, cheeses, hot sauce, salt and pepper. Mix well.

Add baking mix, milk, and mayonnaise. Stir.

Add sausage and onions into the mixture. Mix just until blended.

Pour into loaf pan and bake 45-50 minutes. Serves 8 Rest in pan for 10 minutes.
