From the Governor's Desk Our own Rotary Experience

Dear Rotary Members of District 7190,

The Rotary experience is not the same for everyone who interacts with our organization, our district and our clubs. As I have been making my way around the district between visits to clubs and club events, I have been modifying my speech as I learn more. I am sharing thoughts and ideas of the things I am finding are working for clubs. Perhaps my largest discovery has been the club cultures and how wildly different our clubs are. Some clubs are very business-like and efficient. They accomplish a lot and work together to tackle challenges within their community or focus area. This is a good model. It is a perfect fit for many and there is certainly nothing wrong with it.

There are other clubs that are truly tight knit friends. This connection has been incredible and inspirational to witness. Confucius said "Choose a job you love and you will never work a day in your life." I am going to relate that same thought to these clubs. The work they are doing doesn't seem like work at all since they are all great friends completing tasks to support a similar passion.

I saw an incredible example of this recently at my visit to Salem, NY Rotary Club. Three of their charter members, Charlie Perry, Jim Carrolan and Al Cormier have been serving their community together since 1967! They still make sure to get to their meetings and are an active part of the club. Thank you very much, Gentlemen.

For many of us, when we spend time with friends and family those minutes seem to fly by exponentially faster than when we are completing a task that is not our favorite (i.e., dishes, laundry, paying bills, outdoor chores, etc.). While there are necessary tasks that need to be completed to run our clubs, please keep in mind these tasks could be completed in a different manner than they had been before. For example, your club could adopt the RI Bylaws instead of maintaining your own. Or you could split the work with another club by co-hosting service events and fundraisers or one club becoming a satellite club of another existing club.

When members consider leaving our organization, the experience they have is the most heavily weighted factor when determining their future. This experience is broken down into 5 concentration areas in an article on Volunteer Pro. They include competency, participation efficacy, group integration, organizational support, depending on age and perception of voice. In a post on volunteerhub.com it said, "Studies have shown that the average volunteer commits 52 hours a year to volunteerism, and each hour is worth around \$29.95. Based on this data, losing just one volunteer could result in a loss of over \$1500 in value annually."

No matter the value, in many cases we are losing good hearted Rotarians. Rotary International president elect, Stephanie Urchick delivered a speech at the 2023 International Assembly, saying we need to make our clubs irresistible. When she delivered this speech she asked, "Think back to the first club meeting you attended, what were your first impressions? What kept you around? Now, think about how someone with fresh eyes might see your club meeting." She went on to say "If they (Rotary members) feel that sense of belonging, they feel the love, they find themselves irresistibly drawn to the

meetings we hold and the service we do, then our job becomes easy. We can worry less about growing and sustaining clubs. And focus more on pointing these people of action in the right direction."

So, this year we have introduced district social events. Once a month, we are meeting up somewhere throughout our district to recognize our friendship, realize the strength we have, share ideas and support one another. My hope is this revitalizes some of these long standing friendships, sparks new friendships and energizes us all when we go back to our clubs. Our first social event "Rotary night at the Joe" was well attended. A big thank you to Larry Jones (Glenville Rotary) and Dawn Vavala (Twin Bridges Rotary) on coordinating that event. We also have many events coming up. We will have a Rotary Balloon Festival night on Thursday, September 21st and our Rotary Foundation Dinner on Thursday, November 16th. Please keep an eye on our district website (Rotary7190.org) and your email for more details.

While we are not all the same and some of these ideas may not work for every club, the legacy of our clubs deserve to be etched in the history of each of our communities for all time. We have so many incredible people and I feel very lucky and grateful to have each of you in our district. Thank you for everything you do.



Schenectady Rotary Scores with Cornhole Fundraiser for City School

Schenectady Rotary's recent "Cornhole for a Cause" was a resounding success, bringing together over 200 participants from across the Capital District for a day of friendly competition and community camaraderie. The cause, building a Community Resource Room at Schenectady's Keane Elementary School, will make a significant impact on the lives of students, their families, and the broader community.

Sponsorships played a pivotal role in making the tournament an unforgettable experience for everyone involved. Attendance exceeded expectations and players were awarded over \$4,000 in payouts! There was extensive media coverage leading up to the event and live interviews with both Channel 6 and Channel 10 news. Moreover, the entertainment provided by DJ Cassius, the thrilling raffles, and the diverse array of vendors enhanced the overall experience, making it an event to remember and making a lasting difference in the lives of over 285 families.

Thanks to the work of Schenectady Rotary Club, students and families from Keane Elementary are one step closer to having greater access to wrap-around services as envisioned by the Schenectady City Schools Community Schools Initiative, a program that provides students and their families with access to mental and medical health services, food, clothing, childcare, transportation and enrichment programs. It all fits in with Schenectady Rotary designated focus on educational

200 cornhole players at <u>Schenectady's Rivers</u> <u>Casino & Resort</u> for "Cornhole for a Cause." For those who aren't familiar with the sport of cornhole, it is a game that uses wooden platforms with a 6-inch-wide hole at the top and corn bags. Players take turns throwing corn bags into the hole, earning 21 points to win.

The event raised \$20 thousand overall through club efforts such as small fundraisers, sponsorships and vendor fees, according to Lisa Jackson, <u>Schenectady Rotary Club</u> president. "The cornhole tournament was our primary fundraiser for the community schools project," said Jackson. Though dollars raised from sponsorships, vendor fees and raffles that started ahead of time and wrapped up at the tournament.

According to Jackson, Schenectady Rotary Club has a long history of partnering with the City School District. "The school is at a rough spot and kids at Keane need help. The families need services, and we want to be part of that", she said. "There's no reason that Keane students can't have equal opportunities, Schenectady Rotary is doing what we can to level the playing field for them. We want them to have advantages proven to result in success in the classroom and in life. Planning for the actual physical improvements at Keane have already begun.


