MEET DAZE, COMPANION SPECIALIST AT MARY BRIDGE CHILDREN'S FOUNDATION

Rotary Clubs of Pierce County have been partnering with Mary Bridge Children's Foundation for 25 years on the Courage Classic, a 175-mile bike ride over 3 mountain passes, to benefit children of abuse.

The following story is told through the point of view of Mary Bridge's newest staff member, Daze the Facility Dog, who works with children of abuse every work day.

the newest member of CAID, the Child Abuse Intervention Department at Mary Bridge Children's Hospital in Tacoma, WA.

You are my heroes and role models because you too have been at the side of abused children, giving them courage, for the last 25 years.

I've been told about the history of this challenging threeday bicycle ride and how 100% of the fundraising is dedicated to healing victims of child abuse through the permanent endowment established by Rotary.

This year marks a milestone the 25th Courage Classic three-day ride. I love these kids, and I love that you continue to support them by riding, by volunteering, or making generous gifts.

The aim is to keep them from living in the streets while they find a way to earn a living.
