



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April 19th marks the 156th birthday of Rotary founder Paul Harris. Rotary was founded in 1905 by Chicagoans Paul Harris, Gustavus, Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey. Our founders came together to join in fellowship, and later to provide service to the community. From the start they met weekly for lunch with the intent to help each other in business. The group spearheaded their first community project in 1907 and by 1910 had expanded to 16 clubs.

From these humble beginnings, Rotary International has grown to be one of the world's largest service organizations with over 1.4 million members across 46,000 clubs in 167 countries, with the expansion to the inclusion of women to full membership in 1989. Rotary brings together professional leaders to provide humanitarian services, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and to advance goodwill and peace around the world.

In the heart of Rotary's global network, we find a commitment to building a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change. This commitment extends beyond mere words and these values are woven into the fabric of our organization and how diversity, equity and inclusion are truly core values of any Rotarian:

1. **Diversity**: At Rotary, we understand that our strength lies in our differences. We celebrate the contributions of people from all walks of life, regardless of age, ethnicity, race, color, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sexual orientation, or gender identity. Strategic Planning Workshop


The Rotary District 7120 Strategic Direction/Planning Committee assists and guides the development and updating of the strategic direction of the district and its Rotary clubs.



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LETTER OF COORDINATION

Subject: Spring 2024 Environmental Project

Submitted by Gary Anderson

1. BACKGROUND. Each year, the district Environmental Action Committe sponsors a fall and spring project. This year the District Governor has expressed a desire to combine the annual spring Great Lakes Watershed Clean-Up with a project to plant Milkweed in unused areas to encourage the Monarch Butterfly population. Milk weed is a main source of nourishment for the beautiful and endangered species, but its habitat has been diminished due to development in many places.

2. OBJECTIVE. To continue the district's ongoing efforts to keep the Great Lakes Watershed in out area and related watersheds clean and to increase the population of Milkweed in the district.

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3, EXECUTION

a. Each club is asked to select a clean-up project area during the Earth Day (22d) or a time of their choosing as well as identify unused area where Milkweed can be grown and plant seeds.

b. As always, the clubs will be asked to decide where their efforts are best spent.

c. Clubs are asked to provide their own resources in their areas, but the Environmental Action Committee will assist with answering questions and inter club coordination.

4. LOGISTICS. Clubs will provide their own resources, but some suggested sources of Milkweed seeds are listed below:

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:

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COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and POLIO

COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and Other Respiratory Diseases:

The U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention has revised its guidance for when to stay home and when to return to normal activities after respiratory infections including COVID-19, Influenza, and RSV.

- 1. Individuals should stay home and away from others, including people they live with who are not sick, if they have respiratory virus symptoms that are not better explained by another cause. These symptoms include fever, chills, fatigue, cough, runny nose, and headache.
- 2. Individuals can go back to normal activities when, for at least 24 hours, both of the following are true: a.) Symptoms are getting better overall, and b.) They no longer have a fever, without the use of fever-reducing medication.
- 3. When going back to normal activities, individuals should take added precautions over the next 5 days, including taking additional steps for cleaner air, hygiene, masks, physical distancing, and testing when they will be around other people, especially older adults, young children, and those with weakened immune systems. Children under 2 should never wear a mask.
- 4. Keep in mind that people may still be able to spread the virus that made them sick, even if they are feeling better, so it is important to take extra precautions after resuming normal activities.
- 5. If individuals develop a fever or start to feel worse, they should stay home and away from others again. They should use the same criteria for returning to normal activities as when they first had symptoms and take added precautions over the next 5 days.
- 6. There is additional guidance for healthcare workers.
- 7. Additional information is available at CDC.gov and health.ny.gov

POLIO:

- A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
- 3. There were 12 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2023, the last in Pakistan on October 24, 2023. No cases have been identified in 2024.
- 4. I will be giving a detailed presentation on the PolioPlus Campaign of Rotary International at the District 7120 Training Assembly in Canandaigua on Saturday, April 13.

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Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio
430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017
\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide

Rotarians who currently have the old Rotary plates and want to switch to the new one should call the DMV Custom Plates Unit at 518-402-4838, Monday through Thursday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The Rotary International plate is also available with the International Symbol of Access (ISA) (formerly "handicapped" plates) on it for any registrant with a disability who qualifies for such a plate. Any individual qualifying for an ISA must contact the Custom Plates Unit at 518-402-4838 before submitting their application.

Personalized custom plates at an extra fee (you pick the characters, i.e., "RTRY"), and custom plates that include the Symbol of Access for individuals who qualify, are also available.

BATH ROTARIANS VOLUNTEER AT FLSPCA

On March 15th Bath Rotarians Brandi Graham, John Gould, Mike Slovak, and Terry Bilancio along with Terry's wife, Barbara, volunteered their services for two hours at the Finger Lakes SPCA in Bath.

When Tess McKinley, Bath Rotary Club Immediate Past President, proposed the project to the club, she stated, "Most of the work will involve doing laundry and folding the laundered items. However, there will also be an opportunity to walk through the site and cuddle with some cute animals." The Rotarians folded a room full of blankets,

sheets, and towels; there were many giant bags of folded laundry at the end of the two hours.

The FLSPCA helps reunite families with lost pets and provides adoption services for hundreds of dogs and cats. The shelter admits homeless animals from various sources and provides veterinary care, socialization, and enrichment opportunities for the shelter orphans while they await adoption. It also provides rescue and care of a small number of other animals which have been received from animal cruelty cases or other crisis situations.

Michael Hopkins, Executive Director of the FLSPCA, Inc. and a retired priest from St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Bath, was a former Avoca Central School student of Bath Rotarians Elaine Tears and Bill White. Hopkins, who recently spoke at a weekly Bath Rotary Club meeting, remarked that the FLSPCA speaks for those who cannot speak for themselves. Rotary is also connected to the FLSPCA since Nancy Latour, Bath Rotary Club Secretary, serves as Secretary/ Treasurer of the FLSPCA Board of Directors.
