

Our purpose is strictly educational. Clubs are surprised when we visit and the first thing we do is congratulate them on their overall historical giving to the Foundation with a tag line: And no one is asking you to dig into your wallet today!

It has been interesting to field questions as we make our presentations. People are asking about grants, Paul Harris recognition for endowment gifts, options for steering an endowment commitment to one or another of the areas of focus for grants or polio eradication, using an IRA to make a tax free gift, and many other subjects. One person said, somewhat facetiously, "wish I could get a \$1,000 plus return for a \$25,000 investment" and was surprised to learn Rotary could do that for him with a Charitable Gift Annuity!

At any rate, our presentation turns out to be a good introduction to the Rotary Foundation in general and many members appreciated the opportunity to get some questions answered! "ONE ROTARY SUMMIT" CONFERENCE IN CANANDAIGUA

Rotarians from District 7120 gathered recently in Canandaigua to participate in the One Rotary Summit Conference. The training conference explored a variety of issues including membership growth, public image in the community and Rotary service projects. The summit was designed to help Rotary leaders explore and understand the synergy between membership, a public image program and Rotary's humanitarian projects in advancing Rotary's worldwide service efforts.

The conference utilized small discussion groups supported by facilitators. The format allowed attendees to discuss their club's projects and how they utilize a public outreach program to inform the community of what Rotary does. This helps stimulates public interest in Rotary and support for Rotary service projects.

The participants discussed the role and impact of social media, print media and worthy service projects in sustaining the growth of Rotary's membership. They discussed the financial support the Rotary Foundation provides, both locally and internationally, in supporting projects that improve the quality of life and the health and safety of others.

Past District Governor (PDG) Norma Madayag-Reilly (Newark Rotary) was Chair for the conference.

Rotary District Governor Dr. David Hannan (Newark Rotary) welcomed the attendees and encouraged their participation in the exchange of ideas. He noted that Rotary was a force for good in the world and expressed his hope that the attendees will leave the conference with a better understanding of how they can function as effective leaders.

The District 7120 Public Image Chair, Tom Brown (Elmira Rotary), spoke on the need for a strong public image program in making people aware of what Rotary does in their community. PDG Tom Rogers (Canandaigua Rotary), Chair of the District Foundation Committee, discussed the importance of supporting the Rotary Foundation and the many service projects and programs throughout the world, including those in local communities, that are made possible through the generosity of Rotarians. It is the Rotary Foundation that makes possible service projects that have a meaningful and sustainable impact both locally and internationally.

Two attendees at the conference, Meg Huff (Bloomfield Rotary) and Karen Parkhurst (Victor – Farmington Rotary), discussed how the Rotary Foundation is instrumental in supporting projects that are critical to improving the health and well-being of people in need throughout the world.

District 7120 Membership Chair PDG Scott MacDonell (Clifton Springs Rotary) discussed the importance of membership growth in expanding Rotary's capabilities to serve others. In his presentation, Scott included video remarks by Rotary International President Mark Maloney on the importance of membership development to the future of Rotary.

The conference concluded with PDG Norma Madayag-Reilly asking each of the working groups to make verbal presentations to the entire group concerning what they discussed in their sessions and what they have learned from the experience. Participants were encouraged to return to their club and share at least one new idea from the conference that would facilitate expanding their membership and increasing their club's ability to serve others.

FARMINGTON SUPERVISOR SPEAKS TO VICTOR - FARMINGTON ROTARY

Peter Ingalsbe, Town Supervisor of Farmington, spoke to a recent dinner meeting of the Victor - Farmington Rotary Club. The supervisor noted that Ontario County is the second fastest growing county in New York state, second only to Saratoga County. The fastest growing area in Ontario County is the Victor – Farmington area.

Farmington is home to approximately 11,000 residents. Once a slumbering rural township, the town is now experiencing a rapid growth in population as well as a growing commercial sector, much of it along State Routes 332 and 96.

In his presentation Supervisor Ingalsbe discussed a myriad of issues and outlined the growth of the town over the past 50 years. He traced the modern era of town development from the 1960s when Finger Lakes Racetrack and the New York State Police Troop E Headquarters were established in the township. This necessitated the development of the town's sewer system as well as a water treatment plant. Subsequently, the town has experienced a steady growth in population as developers moved forward with residential and commercial projects.

During the presentation Rotarians asked numerous questions on subjects involving many of the issues that have resulted from the rapidly expanding population base in the Victor – Farmington area. These topics included traffic congestion, walking trails, commercial development, police protection, fire and ambulance coverage and the ability of the Victor Central School system to adjust to the expanding population. The bags were destined for the low-income children at Wilson Commencement Park/Sojourner House in Rochester.

The school offers a unique environment of academic rigor, creativity, and entrepreneurial spirit, where students are inspired to become thinkers, innovators, and compassionate agents of social and technological change.

During their senior year the students are required to complete a project entitled "Being the Change", designed to increase their own level of self-achievement and advance their commitment to future career ambitions. One of the goals of the innovative high school is to build an ethic of service and citizenship into the core academic curriculum.

Miss Caparco had the students introduce themselves to the Rotarians and each student spoke briefly on their future career plans. This will be the V-F's club's second year of working with the school on class programs and projects. The poppies were constructed by veterans who volunteered under the guidance of the metal trades instructor at the Mount Morris Career and Technical Education Center,



BATH ROTARIANS CLEAR ROADSIDE **OF LITTER**

Three times a year Bath Rotarians don orange safety vests, work gloves, and heavy footwear to pick up litter along the on and off ramps of I-86 Exit 38, as part of New York State's Adopt-A-Highway program.

At the end of September Bill White, Bath Rotary Club's Adopt-A-Highway Chair was joined by Terry Bilancio, Al Johnson, and Cheryl Muller to clear the above-noted area of litter. During the month of July, Bilancio, Johnson, Muller, and White were also joined by fellow Rotarians Joe Latham, Robin Lattimer, and Mike Slovak to clean the same area.

For several years the local Rotarians have participated in this program which not only helps to provide an aesthetically pleasing roadside but also provides great satisfaction to the Rotarians themselves. "Taking part in this highway cleanup program is just one example of how Rotarians apply the principle of 'Service Above Self' to promote pride in their community, remarked White. "We are most pleased that we are able to extend a helping hand to keep America beautiful."

Legislation to formalize New York State's Adopt-A-Highway program which encourages individuals, organizations, or businesses to clean up highway roadsides was passed in 1990. Approximately 5000 miles of the state's highway roadsides have been adopted; the segment of highway, designated for each group, is usually about two miles in length. In addition to the pride that the adopters themselves feel, the New York State Department of Transportation erects a blue and white Adopt-A-Highway sign within the group's designated segment which acknowledges the adopters. Today all fifty states have some type of Adopt-A-Highway program because there is a need for litter free highways in spite of the reality that roadside beautification simply cannot compete with highway safety for diminishing public funds.

The Adopt-A-Highway program supports one of Rotary's primary purposes, i.e., a global network of volunteers who provide humanitarian service. The members experience the fulfillment that comes from giving back to the community. Community Service is one of the Five Avenues of Service which represent Rotary's philosophical cornerstone and the foundation on which club activity is based. 




