LITERACY IS THE TICKET OUT OF POVERTY!

Dear Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors, and Friends of Rotary,







14 Days in England:

Rotary Friendship Exchange District 7120 – District 1190



Have you ever traveled and asked yourself "How do the locals REALLY live? What makes this community thrive?" Have you ever wanted to truly learn about the many aspects of a culture—through friends that live there, rather than the hurried conversations of busy hotel clerks, overworked cab drivers, or waiters? Have you ever tired of living solely on restaurant food and sleeping in a succession of hotel rooms when you travel?

In June 2019, eight District 7120 Rotarians and their spouses were fortunate to get those questions answered as part of a Rotary Friendship Exchange (RFE) team to the Lake District of England. The RFE program is designed so that Rotarians and their families carry out reciprocal visits, living for a few days in the homes of Rotarians and their families in other countries. By doing so, it advances international understanding, goodwill and peace through person-to-person contacts across national boundaries.

This RFE team consisted of team leaders, Bill and Helen Gormont of the Greece Rotary Club; Bob Howard of the Bloomfield Rotary Club and his wife, Barb; Lisa Norwood from the Rochester club; Mary Ann Mady, of Penfield Rotary, Jean McMillan of Wayland Rotary, and Dianne Sloan, from the Palmyra-Macedon club. The team was able to make lasting friendships and gathered ideas for other international activities and service projects.



District 1190 covers the counties of Lancashire and Cumbria in the far northwest of England, which stretches from the Scottish border in the north to the edge of the metropolitan areas of Manchester and Liverpool in the south. It was an unseasonably cold and rainy spring, with temperatures during the two-week visit ranging from 45 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit. The landscape also varied, from sheep farms to beautiful lakes and mountains to market towns and manufacturing areas. Local Rotarian hosts treated the team like family as they shared their communities, their Rotary projects, their events and celebrations.



Highlights of the trip included:

- Visits to tourist spots such as Henry Wordsworth's house, Castlerigg Stone Circle, Keswick Market, Surprise View, Ashness Bridge, and Honister Slate Quarry;
- Seeing the ruins of centuries-old castles and Hadrian's Wall, which once marked the border between Scotland and England.











- Walking the fells to take in scenic views of Derwentwater, Ullswater and Crummock Lakes, while mingling with Herdwick and Swaledale sheep and observing colorful flowers.
- Practicing pouring a "perfect pint," a skill that came in handy when the team spent several hours volunteering at a beer and banger festival, a fundraising event for a local Rotary club;

 Traveling to Lockerbie, Scotland, to honor the memories of students from the University of Rochester, and two Rochester-area residents who were killed by terrorists when Pan Am Flight



103 exploded over and crashed into the town on December 22, 1988. The team laid a wreath at the memorial with the following note: While there, the RFE team members met a couple of women from Syracuse, as well as Colin Dorrance, a police officer who witnessed the explosion and was one of the first emergency



responders at the crash scene. (The flight was en route from London to New York. All 243 passengers and 16 crew members were killed as well as 11 Lockerbie residents. In 2003, Libya admitted some responsibility for the bombing that brought down the plane and paid compensation to the victims' families.)

- Learning about efforts to reintroduce ospreys into England after becoming extinct in the 1840's.
 The first new birds were bred in 2007 and there are now 20 pairs breeding in England;
- Discovering England's role in the Atlantic slave trade by visiting Whitehaven, the last mainland
 town in Britain to be attacked by America's navy. This failed attack led by John Paul Jones in
 1778 attempted to set the town's entire fleet of ships on fire. The RFE team was presented with a
 copy of the honorary pardon Jones received in 1999 for his raid on the town.

Plans are underway for exchanges with South Africa and Australia in the coming year, and we will be hosting an inbound 11-person team from Brazil, October 10-22, 2019. 




Exchange Student Returns

This special camp for children of the Southern Tier, founded in 1963, is sponsored by the members of ten local Rotary Clubs. In addition to the Bath Rotary Club, the Canisteo, Chemung County Sunrise, Corning, Elmira, Elmira Heights, Hornell, Horseheads, Prattsburgh, and Watkins-Montour Rotary Clubs fund the weeklong event so that no camper is charged to enjoy this special place.

"Camp STAR is a great opportunity for the campers to feel like a kid. They are at a place where their disability does not matter," stated Kris Earl, Camp Star Director. "Along with the enjoyment the campers receive, the parents get a little bit of respite. Often they are the sole caretaker for their children. They can rest at ease knowing their child is well cared for during camp time."

On July 15 four members of the Bath Rotary Club, Nancy Latour, Robin Lattimer, Cheryl Muller, and John Stranges, participated in the Camp STAR Benefit Golf

Tournament at the Indian Hills Golf Club. Tournament organizers estimate that the event raised more than \$10,000 for the camp. On Thursday, August 15, the Bath Rotarians provided the campers and staff with a picnic of grilled hotdogs and hamburger/cheeseburgers, chips, fruit cups, and a beverage. 
