

Rotary: Open for Business?

Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery "in person," or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that "I can't breathe" feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.


SOCIAL DISTANCE of at least 6 feet radius is important, excepting your family. Your family is your household. Your third cousin, once removed, is not family; nor is your daughter-in-law or your nephew, unless you live in the same household.






Holiday Spirit with Elmira Rotary and Diven School

Rush Henrietta Rotary




At a recent Canandaigua Rotary meeting Al Walker was honored with a Paul Harris Plus 1 Fellowship.





VICTOR – FARMINGTON ROTARY CLUB "GIVING TREE" RETURNS FOR 32ND YEAR

Thirty-two years ago, the Victor – Farmington Rotary Club began a community tradition when they established the Rotary Giving Tree at (then) Wades Market in Farmington. Rotarians filled the tree with 3x5 cards containing a Christmas wish of someone who might otherwise be forgotten during the holiday season. The shoppers could then use the card as a guide and return a gift under the tree for the recipient.

The recipients include shut-ins, senior citizens in care facilities, low income families, needy students, and veterans, etc. Rotarians daily pick up the gifts and take them to a central location where they are sorted and prepared for delivery during the week before Christmas.

Several years ago, Tops Market took over the facility that had formerly been Wade's Market, but the tradition lived on. Tops has continued the partnership with the Rotary Club and has joined

Newark Rotarians Receive High Honor



The American Dream is that dream of a land in which life should be better and richer and fuller for everyone, with opportunity for each according to ability or achievement. This is the basis of the story of Newark Rotarians Helmuth and Hannelora Reinhardt who were honored recently with the club's annual Service Above Self award.

The American dream came true for Hannelora and Helmuth who lived in the same village, in what is now known as Croatia, formerly Yugoslavia. Both of their families were of German descent, so when the Nazi occupation reached the Balkans in 1944, they were uprooted to refugee camps—Hannelora to Austria and Helmuth to Germany. After World War II, they were able to avoid returning to Yugoslavia. Hannelora emigrated to the United States directly from Austria in 1951, spotting the Statue of Liberty from her ship on Christmas Eve. She spent 2 years in Cincinnati before moving to Wayne County.

Helmuth's family was ordered by Russian troops to return to Yugoslavia, but instead opted to go to Salzburg, Austria. From there he emigrated to Windsor, Ontario, Canada in 1955, and on a chance visit by Hannelora they met and kept in touch, marrying in 1957. They moved to Newark in 1959, and Newark welcomed them as part of the community.

Hannelora has been a Rotarian since March, 1988. Not only was she the first woman active member, she was also the first woman Club President in 1995-96. She has served as Newark Rotary Club's Foundation Chair, as a member of the District 7120 Nominating Committee, and was the District's Group Study Exchange Team Leader on a six-week mission to the Philippines in 1990. Outside of Rotary, Hannelora has served as President of the United Way of Wayne County, the Candy Apple Preschool Center, and the ARC of Wayne Foundation, as well as on the Boards of the United Way of Greater Rochester and Newark-Wayne Community Hospital. She has been honored by the New York State Department of Mental Hygiene for outstanding volunteer service in Christian Education programs for the mentally handicapped at Newark Developmental Center from 1971-1976, and in 1983 she was one of six honorees, chosen from 108 nominations, for the YWCA "Tribute to Women in Industry and Service" Award.

The Finger Lakes Times once described Helmuth Reinhardt as "Mr. Reliable." due to his 50 + years of perfect attendance at Rotary meetings, and over 20 years of service on the club's board of directors.

How proud he was to become a Rotarian in March, 1969, and went on to serve as the 75th club president in 2001-2002, and has chaired several club committees including the Gift of Life program to fund heart surgery for children with congenital heart defects. Helmuth also chaired a Global Grant project that raised more than \$10,000 for the purchase of a van for the delivery of food and medical supplies in Argentina.

Outside of Rotary, Helmuth has served several years on the Wayne County American Red Cross Board and as Chairman of the Redeemer Lutheran Church. He has volunteered with the Wayne County Home Meal Service, and has served on the Town of Arcadia Tax Review Board.

The Reinhardts were nominated for the Newark Rotary Service Above Self award by club members Michele McManus and Sharon SanAngelo.,

The Victor – Farmington Rotary Club held its annual community service awards dinner at the Ravenwood Golf Club on the evening of November 18th.




Award recipient Darlene Cowley addresses Rotarians at dinner

BATH ROTARY CLUB PROVIDES FUNDS FOR THANKSGIVING DINNERS

As in past years, the Bath Rotary Club participated in the Greater Bath Area Thanksgiving Project. Cheryl Muller, club treasurer, presented a check for \$1185.00, of which \$750.00 came from the club treasury and \$435.00 was donated by some individual club members, to Bob and Mary Dunham, two of the project co-chairs. "We are thrilled by the large donation made by the Bath Rotary Club and its support of the project for the past 15 years," Bob Dunham remarked.

As a result of the coronavirus pandemic, the organizers of the project had to change the procedure for distribution of food this year. Participating church families, civic and fraternal organizations, banks and credit unions, local businesses and stores, professional office personnel, and many other caring and supportive individuals were asked to make a monetary donation. Those who preregistered for food were given a Save-A-Lot gift certificate to buy everything needed for a bountiful Thanksgiving dinner. The amount of the gift certificates varied, based on the size of a family - small, medium, or large. In addition, each family was given a shopping list as a guide to help them select the food items that had been distributed in the past. When the people picked up their gift certificates outside Turning Point in Bath, they were also given a meat selection, provided by the Food Bank of the Southern Tier.

At its weekly, club meeting on November 19 Bath Rotarians enjoyed a program on the history of the Greater Bath Area Thanksgiving Project, presented by the Dunhams. During the presentation they recounted that in the early 1970's several choir members of the Centenary United Methodist Church in Bath learned that a few families in the church might find it financially difficult to buy food for a traditional

Thanksgiving dinner. Thus, other members of the church family provided those families with everything needed for a delicious Thanksgiving meal. In the next few years additional baskets were provided for other church families, and soon the idea spread to providing the same for other needy families in the community. The project continued to grow, and by November 1996 eighty baskets were prepared and distributed.

Eventually the project grew so much that the local parishioners realized they could not continue the project alone but also did not want to see the project end. Thus, they reached out to many community organizations, businesses, churches, and individuals to encourage them to become involved. The location for the distribution of the food items also had to change due to space from the Fellowship Hall of the local church to Turning Point on Liberty Street in Bath. By 2011, three hundred twenty-two families throughout the Greater Bath Area were given food for a bountiful Thanksgiving dinner; the numbers continued to grow with four hundred seventy-eight families served in 2019. At one point a group even baked six hundred fifty loaves of bread at the Betty Kay Bakery in Bath!

If there is money left over from the Thanksgiving project, the organizers plan to sponsor again the Cold Hands, Warm Hearts Project, in which preregistered families may be able to receive gift certificates to Save-A-Lot and/or Family Dollar.

At the conclusion of their presentation to the local Rotary Club, Bob Dunham remarked, "Many people have volunteered over the years to help make this mission project possible in the Greater Bath Area. I think that the key idea that motivates everyone who supports the project is that we are to love our neighbors as ourselves. On behalf of Holly and Jim Gleason, the other co-chairs, and Shawn Stenquist at Turning Point, Mary and I would like to thank all donors for their continued kindness, care, concern, and generosity."




