

### **Rotary: Open for Business?**

Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery "in person," or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that "I can't breathe" feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.

SOCIAL DISTANCE of at least 6 feet radius is important, excepting your family. Your family is your household. Your third cousin, once removed, is not family; nor is your daughter-in-law or your nephew, unless you live in the same household.

Stay safe, Rotarians. Live to serve another day!

### Red Creek Rotary Provides Bi-lingual Lending Library ABCD Migrant Center

As Earnest Hemingway once said, "There is no friend as loyal as a book." However, in the age of Covid, finding a literary friend is not that easy.

While everyone wants to enhance the quality of their children's education, for working families, making the trip to the local library can sometimes be daunting. Even more so, if the families are part of the seasonal labor working in the fields to support the local agricultural industry.

To help ensure that the students at the ABCD (Agri-Business Child Development) Migrant Head Start have ready access to age-appropriate books, the Red Creek Rotary has donated a bi-lingual and Spanish library to the Church Street facility.

"I think it gives our students a different variety of books in a situation that is not intimidating," said ABCD Director, Jaclyn Pizzarello-Lenahan. "This is great for the older kids."

Pizzarello-Lenahan said that it is especially difficult for the parents and children who travel with the migrant stream. Given the pandemic, she said, it was important for the students to have access to books. Like all schools in the area, the center has gradually gone through the reopening process after the March lockdown and is using a mix of in-person and virtual classes. In a normal year, the center has around 55 preschool students and around 110 summer students.



At this point the collection includes over 90 bi-lingual and Spanish books including some favorites including "Mama Goose" and "Star Wars: El gran Libro de la Galaxia." Rotarian Karen Haas, who created the book list and catalogued the collection, initially solicited suggestions from Fair Haven Librarian Allen Tompkins and Red Creek High School Librarian, Merrilee Witherell. The staff at ABCD also reviewed the list and offered suggestions.

"The agricultural workers do so much for our community," Haas said. "We chose books that were highly rated for our targeted age group of 5 to 10. We chose bilingual Spanish/English books as well as books in Spanish only."

Haas said many of the titles are also popular children and youth titles.

This is the second year that the Red Creek Rotary has partnered with the center. In 2019 the Red Creek Rotary worked with the staff and parent's group to rehabilitate the playground in front of the center.

This project included replacing some of the gravel areas with sod and handicap accessible ramps.

The Red Creek Rotary, a fixture in Red Creek since 1941, has a long history of supporting the schools and community projects. The Red Creek Rotary was aided in the project with a grant from Rotary District 7120 and the Rotary Foundation. Rotarians Pearce and Liz Sloan donated the bookcase and Rotarian Virginia Kendrick-Bowser provided a book-nook. The Red Creek Rotary is currently meeting on the first and third Tuesday of the month at 6 p.m. at the Fair Haven American Legion. Everyone is welcome.

The Rotary Club of Corning is dedicated to serving the critical needs of the local community during the pandemic, as evidenced by the Club's recent donation of \$5,500 to the Corning Painted Post School District for the purchase of 70 Wi-Fi hotspot devices. These devices will be deployed throughout the community to enable families without adequate Internet access to support virtual schooling at home.

"We were fortunate enough to reopen this fall in a hybrid model which allows our students to be in the classroom two days a week if their family chose this option," says Michelle Caulfield, Superintendent of Schools. "Unfortunately, about 260 of our families do not have adequate Internet service. This makes it incredibly difficult or impossible for their students to attend school virtually the other three days a week. This inequity is not something we can allow to happen in our district or community."

"We are working with several community partners to help us resolve this inequity. Thanks to the generosity of Corning Rotary, we are now able to provide Internet access to 70 families, in addition to the 47 families we have already addressed."
