As a Rotarian, when I think of the October calendar, I think of World Polio Day-October 24.


Polio eradication was significantly affected this year with the announcement by the World Health Organization (WHO) that the African region is now free of the wild poliovirus.

However, polio caused by the wild virus is endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan. According to the Rotary International website, to eradicate polio, multiple high quality immunization campaigns must be given priority. "Even during the Covid-19 pandemic, it is necessary to keep children vaccinated against polio while also protecting health workers from Covid-19 and making sure they don't contribute to its transmission."

On October 24, Rotarians will focus on World Polio Day.



Rotary: Open for Business?

Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery "in person," or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that "I can't breathe" feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.

SOCIAL DISTANCE of at least 6 feet radius is important, excepting your family. Your family is your household. Your third cousin, once removed, is not family; nor is your daughter-in-law or your nephew, unless you live in the same household.

Stay safe, Rotarians. Live to serve another day!

- The Rotary Club will make a resolution at a regular meeting of the club naming one suggested candidate.
- The selected candidate from the club will complete the DG Application for 2023-2024 available on the next page.
- The club's secretary or executive director will sign the application and mail the application by Thursday, October 15, 2020 to Patrick Stack, 79 Northcliffe Drive, Rochester, NY 14616 or email to pkroc@outlook.com.

A prospective candidate should NOT contact any member of the Nominating Committee*, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. Prospective candidates should contact the District Governor Nominee Ralph Brandt at rbrandt601@aol.com with any questions.

Per District 7120 "Policies and Procedures", pgs. 3-4, a Nominee for District Governor must have the following minimum qualifications:

- Served a full term as a Club President and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Be physically fit and able to withstand three rigorous years plus a fourth year as Immediate Past District Governor (IPDG);
- · Be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- NOT be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Have the support of his/her club.

Additional information on the roles and responsibilities of District Governor (DG), District Governor-Elect (DGE) and District Governor-Nominee (DGN) can be found on the District 7120 website in the Policies and Procedures document, pgs. 3-5.

The Nominating Committee will review all fully completed applications received by the deadline of October 15, 2020 and select the top three (3) candidates. The Chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the top three (3) candidates to schedule each for a personal interview with the entire Nominating Committee. The spouse or partner of each candidate is highly encouraged to attend the interview.

Facing the challenges of COVID-19, Rotary clubs and partner organizations are finding new ways to support access to education

Recognizing that education is a pathway out of poverty, Rotary and other organizations have made significant progress in increasing access to learning in communities around the world.

Now, the COVID-19 pandemic is threatening to erase many of those gains. More than 91 percent of students worldwide have been impacted by temporary school closures, according to the United Nations. By April, close to 1.6 billion young students were out of school.

Some experts fear school closures and the loss of some family incomes could keep children out of school indefinitely. "We have worked so many years to get kids in school, get them enrolled, and get them to stay in school," says Carolyn Johnson, a Rotary member from Maine, USA, who helps Rotary clubs design grants that support education. "This is going to put those efforts back

"Parents who were already on the edge about sending their kids to school are just going to throw up their hands and not do it," she adds. "They are literally starving and need the money their kids can bring in working."

Mary Jo Jean-Francois, Rotary International's area of focus manager for basic education and literacy, believes that the pandemic's impact on education will continue long after the development of a COVID-19 vaccine.

"Many kids are at a high risk of never going back," she says. "That is a huge concern for the education community."

Education is no easy task

The UN Sustainable Development Goals, a blueprint for creating a more just world, has named "quality education" as its fourth goal. One target of that goal is ensuring that by 2030, all children have the means to complete a "free, equitable, and quality primary and secondary education."

It's a monumental goal. Even in the best times, educating children is far more complex than just getting them into a classroom. Are the teachers regularly trained? Do the children have access to proper nutrition? Are they physically healthy and well enough to learn? Does the school have adequate sanitation? Is there a safe, reliable way for teachers and children to get to school? Are there issues at home? Can parents help with homework? Does the family's need for income mean the child is working instead of being at school?

The school closures, job losses, and need for physical distance have further complicated things.

Fortunately, Rotary has a history of tackling the world's most challenging issues. Members, some with years of experience in education, are addressing the needs that lie ahead.

In Guatemala City, Guatemala, Rotary clubs are partnering with clubs in the U.S. and Canada to help children and their families who live off what they find in the city's huge garbage dump. The project is just one example of organizations pivoting to meet the challenges imposed by the pandemic, including supporting remote learning.

Community Garden

The Rochester Latino Rotary Club planted a garden that was dedicated to the late Father Laurence Tracy for his work over 40 years with the Latino community. The garden at St. Michael Church on North Clinton Avenue in Rochester is available for the community at large. It has a bench that provides a place to sit and meditate or just rest in a nice environment. Dedicated on November1, 2012, the garden is maintained by club members who weed, plant, and apply mulch every year.

Over two Saturdays on August 29 and September5, club members and volunteers worked to prepare it for the upcoming fall. This time, the bench was painted in addition to the weeding and planting. and the application of black mulch. The club feels it is important to care for the environment and contribute to the upkeep of an area often affected by urban blight.

Fr. Tracy, as he was known in the community, was an honorary member of the club. In 2012, he was awarded the Luisa Baars Service Above Self Award, one of many awards he received over his many years of service. He was a dedicated priest who certainly went above his duties in order to serve those in need. Upon his death, a center to provide assistance to individuals affected by addictions was established next to the church. His donations made it possible. It is staffed by the executive director and volunteers. The Fr. Laurence Tracy Advocacy Center has already served many individuals with referrals, counseling, clothing, and food. It offers hope in an environment that respects the dignity of every human being








Canandaigua Rotary Club Awards Business of the Year

In case you do not know the background on the Adopt-A-Highway program, Elaine Tears, Bath Rotary Club Public Relations Chair, has provided the information below. She stated that she, herself, did not know the details about the program until she became involved with Rotary.

Legislation to formalize New York State's Adopt-A-Highway program which encourages individuals, organizations, or businesses to clean up highway roadsides was passed in 1990. Approximately 5000 miles of the state's highway roadsides have been adopted; the segment of highway, designated for each group, is usually about two miles in length. In addition to the pride that the adopters themselves feel, the New York State Department of Transportation erects a blue and white Adopt-A-Highway sign within the

group's designated segment which acknowledges the adopters. Today all fifty states have some type of Adopt-A-Highway program because there is a need for litter free highways in spite of the reality that roadside beautification simply cannot compete with highway safety for diminishing public funds.

HLRC DISTRIBUTES DICTIONARIES TO HCS THIRD GRADERS


IN A PANDEMIC MANNER


