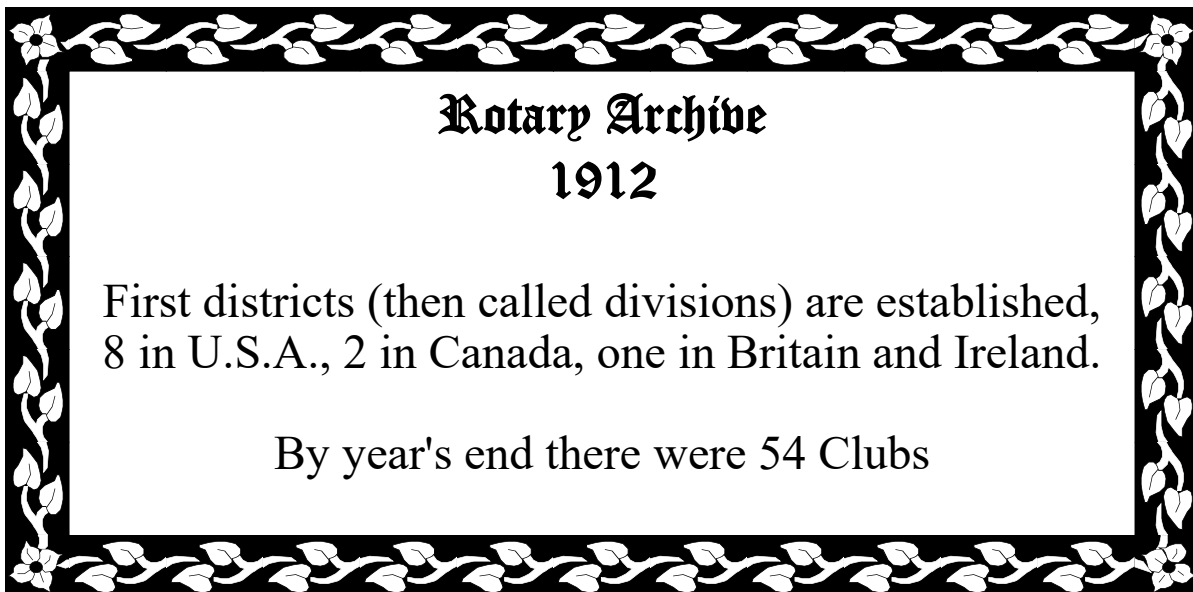
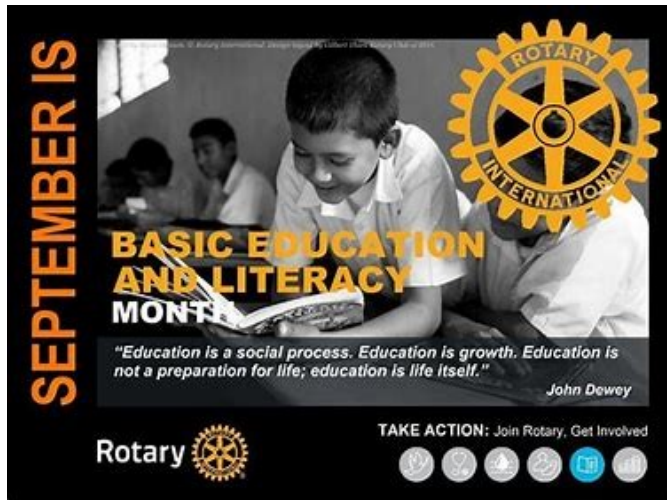

Rotary: Open for Business?

Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery “in person,” or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that “I can't breathe” feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.

SOCIAL DISTANCE of at least 6 feet radius is important, excepting your family. Your family is your household. Your third cousin, once removed, is not family; nor is your daughter-in-law or your nephew, unless you live in the same household.

Stay safe, Rotarians. Live to serve another day!

If you are interested in being considered a candidate:

- Discuss with members of your Rotary Club.
- Each Rotary Club will consider any and all interested Rotarians in good-standing with the club.
- The Rotary Club will make a resolution at a regular meeting of the club naming one suggested candidate.
- The selected candidate from the club will complete the DG Application for 2023-2024 available on the next page.
- The club's secretary or executive director will sign the application and mail the application by **Thursday, October 15, 2020** to Patrick Stack, 79 Northcliffe Drive, Rochester, NY 14616 or email to pkroc@outlook.com.

A prospective candidate should **NOT** contact any member of the Nominating Committee*, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. Prospective candidates should contact the District Governor Nominee Ralph Brandt at rbrandt601@aol.com with any questions.

Per District 7120 "Policies and Procedures", pgs. 3-4, a Nominee for District Governor must have the following minimum qualifications:

- Served a full term as a Club President and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Be physically fit and able to withstand three rigorous years plus a fourth year as Immediate Past District Governor (IPDG);
- Be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- NOT be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Have the support of his/her club.

Additional information on the roles and responsibilities of District Governor (DG), District Governor-Elect (DGE) and District Governor-Nominee (DGN) can be found on the District 7120 website in the Policies and Procedures document, pgs. 3-5.

The Nominating Committee will review all fully completed applications received by the deadline of October 15, 2020 and select the top three (3) candidates. The Chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the top three (3) candidates to schedule each for a personal interview with the entire Nominating Committee. The spouse or partner of each candidate is highly encouraged to attend the interview.

What it's like to survive through two pandemics

Sixty-five years ago, in 1955, I was diagnosed with [polio](#). I was two years old, so I was unaware of what it meant to have been infected with the poliovirus, but I became more aware of it in subtle ways as I got older. And at some point, I understood what my mother meant when she said I was “one of the lucky ones.”

My mother came from Jersey City, New Jersey, and she sounded like it all her life, aided and abetted by a daily regimen of unfiltered Kool cigarettes. She drove a supply truck as a civilian during World War II and delighted in telling a tale about a GI who tried to “get fresh” with her when she gave him a lift back to the base. When she told him she was married and her husband was deployed overseas, he said, “Baby, what’re you saving it for — the worms?”

She stopped the truck and told him, “Ride in back, buster!” I have no doubt that she used an expletive, although she never employed one in the retelling, Jersey accent notwithstanding. But she still thought “saving it for the worms” was the funniest line she had ever heard. She was a woman who could take things in stride, the quintessential “tough cookie.”

But there was one recollection that could unravel my mother like no other — the one that involved her youngest son being diagnosed with polio and the palpable fear that stalked parents across the country during the summers of the early 1950s. She could not stop her voice from cracking when she spoke about that time. That, along with her warnings about staying out of “[polio puddles](#)” after it rained, shaped my awareness of how frightening the epidemic had been.

Among my childhood memories, getting the oral polio vaccine is as vivid as the [classroom drills](#) that taught us to seek safety under our desks in case of a nuclear attack. While I can now joke about how sturdy school desks must have been back then, there’s no amusement in my recollection of lining up outside the local firehouse for the [Sabin sugar cube](#) — that was serious, important business. I knew it then, and I know it now.

My appreciation for having survived polio faded away over time, but returned in force about 12 years ago when I began writing for [Rotary magazine](#). I had assumed polio had been [eradicated](#) — or, more accurately, I didn’t think about it. I have since had the opportunity to get to know, and be awed by, some of the Rotarian volunteers who are working to achieve that goal.

Jennifer E. Jones makes history, becomes first woman named Rotary president-nominee

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history.

Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her.

Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact.



"As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that *our ability to adapt* would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history," Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness this historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. "I believe that diversity, equity, and inclusion ... begins at the top and for us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of forty — these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

"I had a wonderful experience," he said, though admitted to brief moments of homesickness. The son of Meghan and Rick Hauser is the second family member to study in Japan. Meghan was an exchange student there during high school, too.

Levi found the culture surprisingly similar to the U.S. His homes—he had 4 host families—were 90 minutes west of Tokyo. He was struck by the numerous old temples and shrines everywhere amid modern buildings in compact cities. He was accepted by most school peers though not all. He said youth don't hold the nuclear bombings of Nagasaki and Hiroshima during World War II against Americans but older generations could be so inclined. Family meals consisted of rice and bone-in fish mostly, a taste for the latter he would develop in time. They ate at chair height tables and on the floor at low tables.

The nation had one of its warmest winters and least amount of snow. In late February, the first positive case of novel coronavirus occurred. Numbers rose but no one worried, said Levi. But the prime minister closed schools. Only 3 exchange students remained in the school, the rest returned to their homelands. Levi was still there when schools reopened June 1 with all wearing masks. Upon entering school, students remove their shoes and don slippers. Teachers move from classroom to classroom rather than students and there are ten minutes between those classes. For fifteen minutes after school, students are required to clean. Levi joined a drum club, the only freshman among seniors in it,

allowed because he was an exchange student.

He attended weekly Rotary meetings as well as pre-trip gatherings stateside where he befriended other Americans heading abroad. Levi began studying the language well before traveling to Japan and hopes to continue becoming proficient. One outdoor excursion had him climb an 8,865-ft. mountain. He earned his Japanese diploma and a certificate of attendance.

Levi was back in the States on July 9. As for four boxes of stuff he shipped home via boat four months ago? Not here yet. "I will never forget things I learned and the strong bonds I developed," said Levi before thanking Perry Rotary Club for sponsoring his exchange experience.

GENEVA ROTARY CLUB AWARDS \$8,895 IN GRANTS TO TEN LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS FOR PROJECTS

The Rotary club annually awards grants, but this year was especially challenging because the club was unable to hold its annual Service Above Self fund-raising dinner due to the COVID-19 pandemic. President Dave Cook said the club decided to go ahead with the grant program even though less money was available because there are so many deserving projects in the community.

The organizations receiving grants and their projects are:

- Geneva Community Lunch Program, meal program, \$1,000;
- Jim Dooley Center for Childhood Learning, playground equipment, \$1,000;
- Geneva Reads, healthy readers project, \$1,000;
- Smith Center for the Performing Arts, Covid cleaning equipment, \$1,000;
- St. Peter's Community Arts Academy, tuition assistance, \$1,000;
- Thrive to Survive, support for adults with cancer, \$1,000;
- Geneva Public Library, internet access kits, \$945;
- Geneva Center of Concern, freezer, \$800;
- Geneva Historical Society, history programs, \$700; and
- BluePrint Geneva, bicycle project, \$450

Cook explained that generous donors to the fund-raising dinner, even though it did not take place, let the club keep the money for the grant program. Corning Rotarians Volunteer with Salvation Army's Shepherd's Table

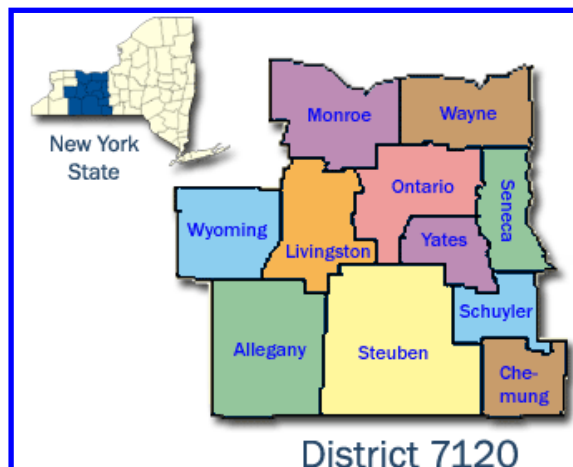

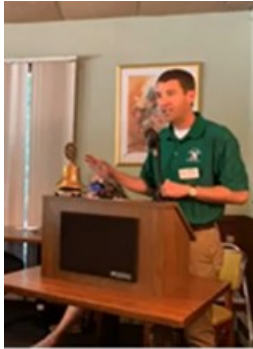

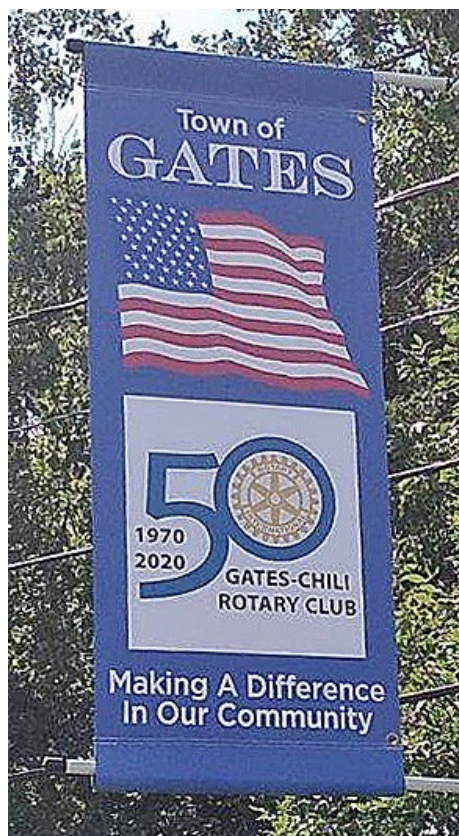
While planning is in the early stages, the Fairport Club will have members involved in some of the demolition and construction work needed to complete the project.

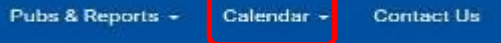

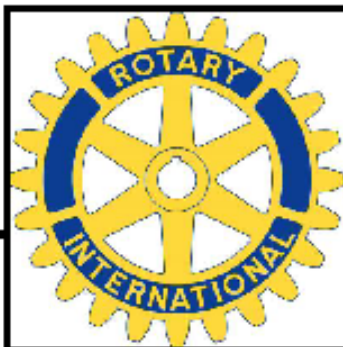

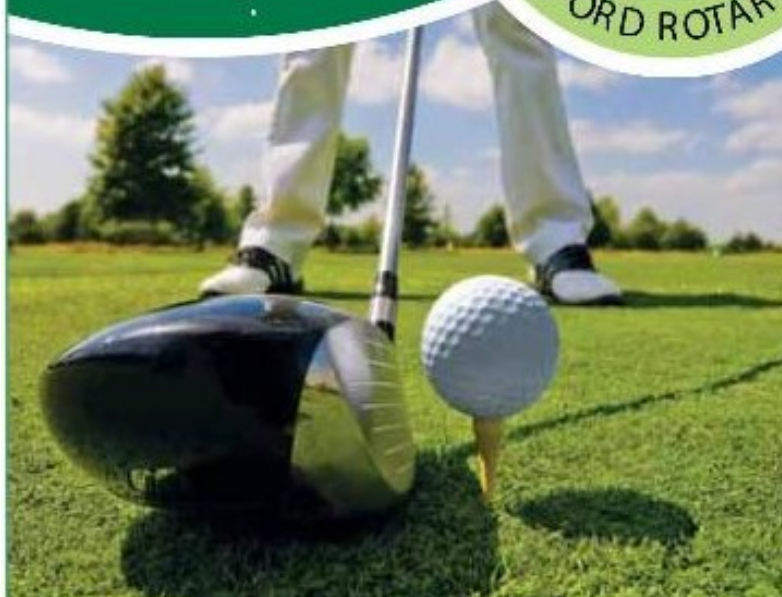
