Happy April!




SAVE THE DATE: SATURDAY, APRIL 24, 2021 GREAT LAKES CLEANUP INITIATIVE!

Rotary: Open for Business?

Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery "in person," or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that "I can't breathe" feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.





New Fairport Rotarians



Corning Rotary Announces Winners of 2021 Scripps Regional Spelling Bee

CORNING, NY — The Corning Rotary Club is pleased to announce Joseph Rajaratnam, 9, of Corning, NY took first place in the Scripps Regional Spelling Bee held Saturday, March 27, 2021. Joseph, a 3rd grader at Chemung Valley Montessori School in Elmira, NY, is the son of proud parents Samuel Rajaratnam and Uma Yoganathan. As champion, Joseph will represent our region in the 2021 Scripps National Spelling Bee Thursday, July 8, at ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World Resort near Orlando, FL, which will be broadcast in primetime on ESPN2.

This year's Regional Bee format was a little different from past years. Rather than competing in person, spellers took an online spelling and vocabulary test. The test consisted of 45 words and spellers had 30 minutes to complete it. Joseph was the only speller to have a perfect score. Words he had to spell correctly included azulejo, which is a kind of glazed, colored tile, and tumulus, which is an ancient burial mound.

Joseph prepared for the Regional Bee by going over the "Words of the Champions" list, word by word, learning the spelling. After learning the spelling, he then used the Spelling Bee app to learn the vocabulary for the words. For his efforts, Joseph received a first-place trophy as well as a copy of *Words from the Champs, a book by Sriram and Jairam Hathwar, local brothers who won the National Spelling Bees in 2014 and 2016, respectively.*

Natalie Dang, 11, a 6th grader at St. John the Evangelist School in Binghamton, NY, won the second-place trophy. McKenzie Calderwood, 14, an 8th grader at Prattsburgh Central School, earned the third-place slot, receiving a travel mug. All participating spellers received a medal, a T-shirt, an insulated lunch bag, a journal, a tote with the Spelling Bee logo, some fun pens, and sunglasses.

In addition to the Corning Rotary Club, this year's sponsors included the Bath Rotary Club, Corning Credit Union, Corning Natural Gas, Corning Rotary Literacy Committee, COVANEX, and ServU Credit Union. These Regional Bee sponsors will cover Joseph's travel expenses to Orlando, FL.

That was part of the message of Kristin Rechberger, CEO of Dynamic Planet, delivered alongside co-speaker Dr. Enric Sala, CEO of Pristine Seas, an author, and Explorer in Residence with National Geographic. They travel, write, educate and dive oceans around the world to work with small communities on how protecting the indigenous species is good for health, their economies and futures. Only 7% of the oceans and 30% of Earth's lands are protected. Scientists say that 30% of the oceans must be preserved by the year 2030 or the incredible healing powers of Nature won't be able to save countless species.



The cost so far? \$140 billion annually, the amount of money the world spends on video games each year! Dr. Sala said plastics pollution is so pervasive that microplastics are found in most species from the Arctic to Antarctica--and even in snowflakes. Their pandemic travel restrictions enabled our Rotary Club to listen, learn, ask questions, and simply marvel at this power couple. Zoom also allowed many guests from near and far to join the session!






Fairport Rotary

COVID-19 Can't Stop Rotary From Building Schools in Nicaragua

The trip was set, the plane tickets purchased, and the accommodations arranged. A group of eager volunteers were ready to embark on another adventure together to the country of Nicaragua to build a school. Like the construction projects that came before, the school was to be located in a remote mountainous region, a place which would be difficult to travel to, and difficult to build there. Despite these challenges and obstacles, a far greater adversary was looming, unbeknownst to the volunteers when they purchased their tickets, COVID-19 was making its way across the Atlantic.



The 2020 trip never occurred but the money raised, all \$15,310 was sent, and construction went forward as planned and a beautiful new school was built for the children of the community of El Chote. The school may not have been constructed through back breaking work by Rotarians this time, but the cost was shouldered by generous donations which began with a hefty \$2,000 from our Avon club, and continued support from the Rochester Rotary Charitable Foundation. A large bulk of the donations for the El Chote school were received through individual donations of eight Avon Rotarians which amounted to \$5,600. Significant contributions were also received from members of the Honeoye Falls-Mendon club. While life was in lockdown here in the states this past summer, the residents of El Chote were

gathering together to celebrate the completion of their new school for the children. The before and after images, beautifully illustrates the impact that these efforts are making.

Fast forward to today, and even though we have been living under COVID-19 for over a year, the necessary funds to construct in the community of Los Jobitos have been raised (almost entirely.) Rotarian efforts with the Cornatine Road Rally and the on-line auction enabled the club to once again donate to the effort. Individual members have once again contributed mightily. Approximately thirty families live in the community of Los Jobitos, which has no electric energy or potable water. There are presently two buildings at the school site, however this is not nearly enough space for the students who attend. Roughly seventy children go to school there, many coming from the surrounding communities of La Chocoya and La Orqueta. Students in grades pre-K through fourth grade utilize the two structures, while eighteen students in grades 5-6 have a tent, which is neither comfortable or safe for them. Any donation large or small, makes a difference and is greatly appreciated.

It is in the surrounding area of the town of El Sauce, located in the municipality of Leon, where the schools have been constructed. The community has received a tremendous level of support from the greater Rochester region over the years. The people living there have expressed their gratitude and appreciation for how our Avon club has supported them. From school construction, to the latest donation supporting the Casa Materna, Avon Rotary continues to make a difference in the lives of others throughout the world. By these service efforts Rotary opens opportunities and change lives in the process. Although we have been unable to travel there over the past three years, your fellow Rotarians who have traveled there, have witnessed first-hand the difference these efforts are making.







The Rotary Clubs of Livingston County will Participate in the Rotary Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup which is a joint initiative between Canadian and American Rotary clubs bordering on the Great Lakes. Rotary District 7120 - which includes Livingston Clubs- will clean up public access areas in the Lake Ontario watershed to include the Genesee River and Finger Lakes. This will be done in conjunction with the Conesus Lake Association's annual lake cleanup.
