#### COVID UPDATE

**December 10, 2021**

This morning NY Governor Kathy Hochul reinstated a statewide mandate for wearing masks at indoor public events beginning Monday, December 13. This applies to Rotary meetings, fundraisers, and projects that are held indoors at a public facility. THERE IS NOT AN EXCEPTION FOR EATING FOOD. There is an exception for events where all participants provide proof of vaccination, i.e. the digital Excelsior Pass or the CDC vaccination card. This will be enforced by county health departments. This mandate is in effect at least until January 15, 2022.

Here are the options for Rotary clubs:

- Hold virtual meetings.
- Hold hybrid meetings at a public facility where those attending in person provide proof of vaccination (as referenced above).
- Hold in person meetings at a public facility at where those attending provide proof of vaccination (as referenced above).
- Hold in person meetings at a non-public facility. (Check with your county health department to ascertain their concurrence that the facility is "non-public.")

Please reach out to your meeting facility manager and your food vendor as soon as possible in order to maintain a good working relationship with these people.

Despite the "COVID fatigue" which we are all experiencing, it is truly important for clubs to continue meeting and serving our communities. It is also important, whether or not we agree with Governor Hochul's decision, that Rotarians comply with these directives to protect our members and to maintain a favorable public image in our communities.

An initial fee and an additional annual renewal fee, in addition to your vehicle registration renewal fee, will be billed for the plates every two years when you renew your registration.



#### **GLOBAL GRANT OPPORTUNITY**

Rotarians from District 7120 participated in a Rotary Friendship Exchange to District 4670, in southern Brazil in February 2020. While there, we visited a local park and lake in Canela - that is the main area of recreation and relaxation for the youth and adults of Canela. Due to leakage of sewer waste into the lake there is a strong offensive odor in the air, which leads to declined use of park facilities, playground, soccer field and basketball court and walking trail in the park. There is no swimming in the lake due to pollution.



The Global Grant is for a Sewer Collecting Ring around the lake so all the refuse from the houses around the area can be collected before it drains into Canelinha stream and Canela Lake, diverting the water to the new water treatment plant that the town is building. The goal is no polluted water will pour into the lake.

To accomplish this, Global Grant donations from the clubs in District 7120 are needed with a goal of \$20,000 by December 15, 2021. Total cost of the construction of a sewage separator network in the sub basin of Canelinha stream is estimated at \$83,600.00 US Dollars.

Once the project is executed, the quality of life for everyone in Canela will be much better, much safer and healthier.

# GRANT MANAGEMENT SEMINAR (GMS) for Global & District Grants in the 2022-2023 Rotary Year

To participate in Rotary Foundation Programs including Global and District Grants during Rotary each year, a club is required to become certified/re-certified and accomplish the following four tasks:

- 1. Each club President-Elect and Foundation Chair, or their representatives, are required to complete a district-sponsored Grant Management Seminar (GMS) or the Rotary.Org Learning Center online course.
- 2. Club president and president-elect must sign a Memorandum of Understanding (Club MOU) per The Rotary Foundation.
- 3. Club president and president-elect must sign the District 7120 Addendum to the Club MOU, which is available on District 7120 website.
- 4. Each club must adopt the document retention and financial management policies required by the MOU.
- 5. Additionally, clubs must have donated \$25 average per capita in the 2020-2021 Rotary year in order to qualify for grants in 2022-2023. (Next year that amount increases to \$35.)

In 2020-21 and following, participants may complete an online course offered by Rotary International. The course includes 9 modules that can be completed at the participant's own pace. There is a recertification module for those who completed the online course in a prior year. A participant can save and leave the site and pick up their training later at their own pace.

The course can be accessed as follows:

#### Note many browsers and phones/tablets/laptops work a bit differently.

Sign into "My Rotary" at Rotary.org (You may create an account if you do not already have a My Rotary account.) Click on "Learning & Reference" header at mid-top of the page, then "Learning Center," then "The Rotary Foundation" View box.

A list of courses will appear.

At the left on the 2nd row of courses, click on "Grant Management Recertification 2021" or "Grant Management Seminar."

Enroll in one of these courses. The Recertification Course is only for those who completed the online course last year, and **NOT** for those who completed a live or Zoom District course in the past.

The Grant Management Seminar has 9 modules. Each module has a learning test at the end.

Upon completion of the "Grant Management Seminar", you will be able to print a completion certificate for each module and for the entire course. Please email only the entire course certificate to trogers@frontiernet.net.






#### Palmyra-Macedon



## BATH ROTARY CLUB SALUTES VETERANS DAY

On November 11th, Veterans Day, the Bath Rotary Club held its weekly club meeting via Zoom and in-person at the party barn of Tess McKinley, the club's President-Elect. At this meeting the local club members recognized those Bath Rotarians who had served their country in one of the U. S. Armed Forces. Those veterans present led all in attendance in the Pledge of Allegiance. Nancy Latour, Bath Rotary Club Past President, who was in charge of the programs for the weekly meetings in November, called upon those veterans present to speak about their experiences in the military. Their stories, varied and personal, had one common theme: the opportunity to serve their country and the respect they have for all military personnel – past, present, and future. At the conclusion of their presentations, many of the other Rotarians present shared stories related to military members they knew or had encountered.

Those veterans who were present and shared their experiences were: Larry Bates, Arkansas Air National Guard, June 1954 – June 1957 and U. S. Air Force, June 1957 – June 1961; Terry Bilancio, U. S. Air Force, 1963 – 1968; Joe Latham, U. S. Army 1970 – 1976 and cook in the Army Reserves; Mike Slovak, U. S. Army Reserves, July 1972 – June 1978; Don Snyder, U. S. Army, 1953 – 1955. Also recognized for their service but unable to attend the meeting were: Al Johnson, Connecticut Army National Guard, 1961 – 1962 and U. S. Army Reserves, 1963 – 1967; Greg Schultz, past active member and present honorary member of the Bath Rotary Club, U. S. Army Dental Corps, 1968 -1972 (inactive duty) and U. S. Army Dental Corps, 1972 – 1974 (active duty). A hearty round of applause was extended to all of these men for their outstanding service, i.e., past military service and present Rotary service to their community, country, and the world.

Veterans Day, originally called Armistice Day, is an official United States public holiday, observed on November 11, which honors the service of all U. S. military veterans, i.e., those who have served in the United States Armed Forces. It marks the anniversary of the end of World War I; the major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month in 1918.

Due to Covid restrictions the meals were offered as a carry-out meal instead of being served in the Great Hall of St. Thomas Episcopal Church as has been done prior to the pandemic. The warm, tasty meal consisted of a large portion of a homemade casserole with layers of turkey with cream of chicken soup and garlic powder, mashed potatoes with cream cheese and sour cream, and dressing. Also in each tote bag was a serving of green bean





casserole as well as a small bunch of grapes, jellied cranberry sauce, apple strudel bites, and a bottle of water.

Nancy Latour, Bath Rotarian, who coordinates this project for the local club stated that the service club has budgeted money for its yearly participation. However, she noted that a parishioner of St. Thomas had anonymously donated funds for this special meal. Helen Monroy, a St. Thomas parishioner and Chairperson of the Red Door Community Kitchen, stated that in 2013 the idea of this project evolved out of many group meetings held at the church's annual meeting. After programs and services offered in Bath were assessed by Monroy and a group of other parishioners, they recognized the need to create a soup kitchen. Other churches and agencies in the community made financial

contributions to the base funding and have hosted the meal program over the years. The church gladly accepts monetary and food donations for the Red Door Community Kitchen program.

This year the Bath Rotary Club will sponsor teams to provide and serve the free meals every fourth Wednesday of the month from 11:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. while teams from St. Thomas Episcopal Church will prepare and serve the meals on the other Wednesdays of each month.

"No one in America should ever go hungry," stated Vicki Anderson, Bath Rotarian who consistently helps with the program. "I am pleased to say that the Bath Rotary Club supports the Red Door Community Kitchen which provides food for the less fortunate. The Rotarians are proud to provide and serve a healthy and sustaining meal



to those in need. We also enjoy not only the fellowship we experience with those who come for lunch but also with our fellow Rotarians who work the project."

The participation in the Red Door Community Kitchen allows the Bath Rotarians to continue their involvement in community service projects and to display dedication to the Rotary International motto of "Service Above Self".

The club presented a "Rotarian in Action" award to Solitaire Murphy for her














#### Geneva Rotary
