Rotary: Open for Business?

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Many Rotary clubs are transitioning from pandemic Zoom to recovery "in person," or at least hybrid, meetings. Questions remain. What is safe? What is responsible? What is fair to all concerned?

Who among us Rotarians would want to be responsible for transmitting CoVid-19 to another person? Imagine the consequences if a Rotary meeting or event proved to be the epicenter of disease transmission in a community.

Heed the warnings! Don't defy the health advisories! Those over 65 years old and those with diabetes, obesity, respiratory disease, and immune conditions are at increased risk. Masks and hand sanitizer work.

MASKS should cover both your mouth and your nose completely and fit snugly enough over your nose, around your cheeks, and under your chin so that the front of the mask sucks in toward you when you inhale. Adjust your mask before the meeting and then leave it alone! If you are not comfortable with this, if you feel claustrophobic, if you have that "I can't breathe" feeling with a mask on, then stay home and practice with it on! You will adapt. If your mask keeps slipping out of position, you've got the wrong mask. Do not remove your mask when speaking. Just project your voice more loudly. Do not remove your masks for pictures. Smile with your eyes!

HAND SANITIZER should be readily available at any meeting. Use it before and after touching any common use items at a meeting: tabletops, laptops, keyboards, hand-held microphones, podiums, money, and ticket stubs. These fomites can carry infectious particles for a short period of time. Resist touching your face.

MICROPHONES on a stand are better than the hand-held versions. Project your voice loudly and keep the microphone from contacting your mask.


SOCIAL DISTANCE of at least 6 feet radius is important, excepting your family. Your family is your household. Your third cousin, once removed, is not family; nor is your daughter-in-law or your nephew, unless you live in the same household.

Rambling On Rotary—February

February is Rotary Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month. On February 23 we also celebrate the 116th anniversary of the founding of Rotary. In the February issue of Rotary Magazine, RI President Knaack commented, "Rotary Opens Opportunities to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace, ... our ultimate mission." And I would add implied within his message, we are called to advance understanding, goodwill and peace within our community and our country.

At the inauguration of President Joseph Biden on January 20th of this year, Amanda Gorman, the nation's first-ever youth poet laureate recited her poem, "The Hill We Climb". I was inspired by her words and her passionate delivery.

The new dawn blooms as we free it

For there is always light,

If only we're brave enough to see it

If only we're brave enough to be it

I believe Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution and "The Hill We Climb" are in concert with each other, especially for us as Rotarians.

There has been a lot of turmoil in our country and our world, especially these past 12 months. COVID-19 has raised the stress level in our homes, community, country and world. But, as we have previously recognized, it has also resulted in opening some doors of opportunity. We have learned how to communicate differently in our quarantined world and this has opened opportunities to share in different ways. We have had guest presentations at some our meetings zooming in from Brazil, California and Canada ... opportunities we never have really experienced in the past.

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Unfortunately, some of the new means of communicating have nurtured misinformation and mistrust. It is incumbent upon all of us, especially as Rotarians, to recognize truth and participate in respectful discourse with others and not fuel the embers of anger. We grow when we engage in respectful conversation from differing perspectives which can resolve conflicts and result in broader peace. We need to look beyond the sound bites and seek the truth before we engage in and further misinformation. By proactively engaging in truth-telling rather than rumor-spreading we can prevent conflict and promote peace. "In all we think, say or do, is it the truth, is it fair to all concerned, will it build good will and better friendships, and will it be beneficial to all concerned?" When we can say "yes" to this, we will truly be advancing "understanding, goodwill and peace" in our community, our country, and our world. Our Service Above Self motto requires us to work for peace and integrity. The Rotarian Code of Conduct states that (in part) "as Rotarians, we will act with integrity and high ethical standards, that we will deal fairly with others and treat them with respect, and that we will maintain a harassment-free environment." When we live and act in this way, we will build peace that will lead to resolving conflicts. We will joyously greet each new dawn for its new light that we know it will always bring. As Rotarians, I am convinced that we are brave enough to see that light AND that we are brave enough to BE that light for our community and our world. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.

Adopt a Grandparent

Tamika Turner was devastated when her grandparents died. "They were like parents to me," she said. She visited her grandmother in the nursing home every Sunday but noticed that not everyone had visitors. She wanted to find a way to honor her grandparents' legacy. When Tamika's friend, who worked at a nearby retirement community, mentioned how disappointed the residents were that their annual holiday gift exchange was cancelled, she saw this as her opportunity. "I said, 'Why don't we get them all adopted?'"

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For over six years, Tamika has been raising funds in the community to "Adopt a Grandparent" at a nursing home twice a year. She does this during the holiday season and Valentines' Day. Adopting each Grandparent costs \$15, which goes 100% into their gift. She partners with local businesses, individuals and service clubs alike to make sure every grandparent can get adopted. "I don't want to leave anyone out," she says. The gift is made with feedback from the facility on what the residents need. Usually it contains a handmade card, fluffy socks, hand and foot lotion and a nice chocolate or candy. The idea is to let each person know that someone cares, that they matter and that they are not forgotten, especially during these trying pandemic times.

For Valentine's Day, the Spencerport Rotary Club sponsored 30 gifts to be distributed to the residents at Wedgewood Nursing Home in Spencerport.

What can your club do? With enough funding Adopt a Grandparent can reach more seniors and more than just one facility per holiday and expand beyond these two holidays "If we had more hands to help I could do it year-round," Tamika says. "Not everyone can give \$15, but everyone can help," says Tamika. There are volunteer opportunities to help put together the gifts, to hand them out and to have fellowship with the seniors. "Some people want to continue their relationships with their grandparents after they've adopted them. We really encourage that," she says. She remembers one man in his wheelchair who had a rose for her. He said, "How wonderful for someone to have thought about us here." "That's the whole reason I do this," Tamika says.

V-F ROTARY CLUB SUPPORTS BED BUILDING PROJECT FOR CHILDREN WHO HAVE NO BEDS

The Victor - Farmington Rotary Club recently hosted Pittsford residents Donna and Shawn Ritchie, founders of the Rochester Chapter of Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP). SHP is a volunteer organization that is dedicated to building, assembling, and delivering tap notes bunk back to abildram and familias in nood.

top-notch bunk beds to children and families in need.

Several V-F Rotarians were volunteer workers on a recent SHP bed-building project. Their experience led to a club initiative led by Rotarian Bruce Chapman to learn more about SHP projects and explore possible future club involvement with the group.

The SHP project originated in Twins Falls, Idaho in 2012 and has since expanded to over 200 chapters throughout the USA and Canada. The Rochester chapter was founded in 2019. Since its inception in 2012 SHP has built over 35,000 beds for low-income families.

Donna and Shawn's presentation provided information explaining how the SHP program works and their need for volunteer workers.

In closing, both Donna and Shawn described the motivation that led them to establish the local SHP chapter. They stressed that having a bed for a child to sleep in is "not a luxury." Their bottom line - "If a child needs a bed, we want to make sure they get one. No kid sleeps on the floor in our town."

VICTOR - FARMINGTON ROTARY CLUB SUPPORT FOR LOCAL LIBRARY

The V-F Rotary Club has a long history of supporting the programs and mission of the Victor - Farmington Library. This support has included joint literacy programs to provide books for low-income families and residents, financial support, and involvement with various library projects. Tim Niver, Director of the V-F Library, recently spoke to the club on the library's plans.

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Like most organizations and institutions, the COVID-19 pandemic made this past year a severe challenge for the library. In addition, the library faces a growing lack of space in its current location in the village. The large population boom in the two towns has resulted in the library now serving a population base of approximately 25,000 from a structure containing 9,000 square feet. This is a considerably smaller space allotment when compared to local libraries serving a comparable population base. As an example, the library in Canandaigua has approximately 18,000 square feet and the Pittsford library has approximately 30,000 square feet.

The V-F Library has the second largest circulation volume in the Pioneer Library System that includes 42 libraries in Ontario, Wayne, Wyoming, and Livingston counties.

As the residential population boom continues to accelerate, and the release of the 2020 census figures expected to show an increasing population surge in the Victor – Farmington community, the space problem is becoming acute. Director Niver

thanked the club for its past support and stated he looked forward to continuing the library's partnership with V-F Rotary in serving the needs of the community in the coming year. Submitted by Dave Luitweiler



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
younger brother all became very involved in the Rotary exchange programs and have continued to travel – they work to earn money to travel!



Dr. Bill Plummer, Paul Harris Fellow and member of the Corning Rotary Club, passed from this life on Saturday, January 9^{th} , 2021, at Robert Packer Hospital. Despite failing health, he lived alone with the help of his neighbors, friends and Visiting Angels. Bill celebrated some 200 birthdays, only 93 were real, for every *month he claimed a seat at the Rotary birthday table to enjoy the ice cream sundae*.

Forty-five of those years were dedicated to Rotary Service, many as editor of *Crystal Cogs, the Corning Club's newsletter*.

Bill began community service as an Eagle Scout in Wilkes

Barre, Pa. He served in the US Army in Germany at the end of WWII. He earned a PHD in physical chemistry at University of Pittsburgh in 1956, then joined Corning Glass for a 31-year career in the Physical Properties Research Lab.

Bill loved Nature, and as a Rotarian was a leader in the development of Spencer Crest Nature Center (a 250-acre nature center with over 7 miles of trails and a museum located adjacent to Corning Community College). Garden and nature clubs relied on Bill's knowledge of plants and songbirds. He was active in Christ Episcopal Church and Corning Public Library. He sailed Keuka Lake and enjoyed music, especially jazz.

His happiest days were in May and June when Bill and his wife Jane hosted their annual spring party so friends could enjoy their hospitality and wildflower garden surrounding the house. Huge trees provided shade for the blooming mandrakes, rhododendron, trillium and violets.

Bill was the author of a book of essays titled wild Fronds & Anemones.




