A prospective candidate should **NOT** contact any member of the Nominating Committee*, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. Prospective candidates should contact the District Governor Nominee Julie Carney at <u>juliecarney7120@gmail.com</u> with any questions.

Per District 7120 "Policies and Procedures," a Nominee for District Governor must have the following minimum qualifications:

- Served a full term as a Club President and been a Rotarian for seven years,
- Be able to withstand three rigorous years plus a fourth year as Immediate Past District Governor (IPDG),
- Be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth,
- NOT be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee,
- Have the support of their club.

Additional information on the roles and responsibilities of District Governor (DG), District Governor-Elect (DGE) and District Governor-Nominee (DGN) can be found on the District 7120 website in the Policies and Procedures document.

The Nominating Committee will review all fully completed applications received by the deadline of October 15, 2021 and select the top three (3) candidates. The Chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the top three (3) candidates to schedule each for a personal interview with the entire Nominating Committee. The spouse or partner of each candidate is highly encouraged to attend the interview.

Rotary: Are We Back to Normal?

As the CoVid-19 pandemic eased in the United States, many Rotary Clubs in District 7120 have returned to meeting regularly and resuming service projects in their communities. Since there is still disease risk for those who will not or cannot be vaccinated, precautions are still in order.

On February 1, 2021, Rotary International General Secretary John Hewko notified Rotarians that the RI Board advised regional leaders, district governors, club presidents and others to hold meetings virtually through the end of the Rotary year, which concluded June 30. As of May 26, 2021, the Board continues to recommend "that Rotary conduct its business virtually or in a hybrid form. HOWEVER, ROTARY MEETINGS, SERVICE PROJECTS, AND TRAINING EVENTS CAN OCCUR AS LONG AS HEALTH CONCERNS HAVE BEEN CONSIDERED AND EVERYONE FULLY COMPLIES WITH LOCAL HEALTH AND SAFETY RULES."

For those of us in District 7120, that means compliance with recommendations of the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and those of the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH). At this time, those who have been vaccinated are at an extremely low risk for becoming seriously ill from the CoVid-19 virus, and therefore do not require masks outdoors or indoors and no longer need social distancing precautions.

All children under age 12 and those adults who have chosen not to be vaccinated, remain at significant risk for becoming infected (even if they were diagnosed in the past with CoVid-19), experiencing mild or serious symptoms, and transmitting the virus to other susceptible people. This is an opportunity for Rotarians to focus on Disease Prevention and Treatment, one of the seven areas of focus of The Rotary Foundation.

When a club meets INDOORS, I recommend that a HYBRID MEETING be offered to those who are unvaccinated. As an alternative, a section of the meeting room should require MASKS and have seats six feet DISTANCE apart for the unvaccinated and anyone else desiring these additional precautions. OUTDOOR meetings do not require this accommodation. HAND SANITIZER should be offered at the entry site for the meeting. MICROPHONES should be on a stand rather than hand-held, and disinfecting wipes should be available for adjusting it. Minimize material that is passed around the room, and when FOOD is served buffet style, it is best for one person to serve it rather than for each person to handle the serving utensils.

Club service projects locally can include educational efforts in the community and assisting at vaccine clinics. Internationally, your donation to the PolioPlus Fund of The Rotary Foundation supports the public health infrastructure in third world countries that not only tracks and prevents polio but also CoVid.

Rotarians from District 7120 participated in a Rotary Friendship Exchange to District 4670, in southern Brazil in February 2020. While there, we visited a local park and lake in Canela - that is the main area of recreation and relaxation for the youth and adults of Canela. Due to leakage of sewer waste into the lake there is a strong offensive odor in the air, which leads to declined use of park facilities, playground, soccer field and basketball court and walking trail in the park. There is no swimming in the lake due to pollution.



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The Global Grant is for a Sewer Collecting Ring around the lake so all the refuse from the houses around the area can be collected before it drains into Canelinha stream and Canela Lake, diverting the water to the new water treatment plant that the town is building. The goal is no polluted water will pour into the lake.

To accomplish this, Global Grant donations from the clubs in District 7120 are needed with a goal of \$20,000 by December 15, 2021. Total cost of the construction of a sewage separator network in the sub basin of Canelinha stream is estimated at \$83,600.00 US Dollars.

Once the project is executed, the quality of life for everyone in Canela will be much better, much safer and healthier.

Avon Rotary News Rambling On Rotary—September

As we enter September, summer is winding down, schools are getting ready to open and I am reflecting on where I was and what I was doing twenty years ago on September 11th, 2001. I was a high school principal on that day. I was heading into an administrative meeting on that Tuesday morning; the meeting was scheduled to start at 9:00. I recall a student entering the high school main office, signing in late for the day, and him stating that a plane crashed into the World Trade Center. My secretary and I thought it was a small private plane which had occurred previously; I went into my meeting. By 9:15, while in our meeting, we had heard that another plane had crashed into the second tower of the World Trade Center and our admin team meeting broke up and we returned to our buildings to begin some crisis management and assist our students and staff deal with our national tragedy. Where were you that morning? What were you doing? What did you stop doing?

During the challenge of COVID last year, RIPP Holger Knapp stated, "Every great challenge is an opportunity for renewal and growth." Clearly, for our country, the 9/11 attack offered our country tremendous challenges and opportunities for renewal and growth ... and service. By a joint resolution approved December 18, 2001, Congress designated September 11 of each year as "Patriot Day" and Congress has requested the observance of September 11 as an annually recognized "National Day of Service and Remembrance." Even a small act of service is a giant act of patriotism. As Rotarians, we have an opportunity to lead our community and our world forward to serve in a remarkable spirit of unity, honor, and compassion ... and service. September 11, 2001 not only united our country but united the world.

September is Rotary's Basic Education and Literacy month. RI President Shekhar Mehta stated, "Enhancing literacy skills is critical in our pursuit of reducing poverty, improving health, and promoting peace. Empowering people through education is among the boldest goals we have as Rotarians." Club President Tom's district grant for this Rotary year involves constructing some raised garden beds to be used by students in the Avon school district to grow vegetables and other food items. "The project will start a community garden to educate students in need regarding composting and growing foodstuffs that will then supplement the back pack program with a goal of teaching the students how to help support their diets while improving our environment." These are skills needed around the world to feed the world to help "reduce poverty, improve health, and promote peace".

On this 20th anniversary of the attack that caused our world to pause and reflect, let us remember all those who serve every day above and beyond that which is "their job". On this Remembrance Day let us pause and reflect to honor those first responders killed and injured twenty years ago and the countless others who serve to defend the nation's freedom at home and around the world.

I recall the Alan Jackson song (don't ask me to sing it, Katie), "Where Were You When The World Stopped Turing". Some of the lyrics are:

"Where were you when the world stopped turnin' that September day?

Were you in the yard with your wife and children or workin' on some stage in L.A.?

Did you stand there in shock at the sight of that black smoke risin' against that blue sky?

Did you shout out in anger, in fear for your neighbor, or did you just sit down and cry?

Did you weep for the children, they lost their dear loved ones

Pray for the ones who don't know?

Did you rejoice for the people who walked from the rubble and sob for the ones left below?

Did you burst out with pride for the red, white, and blue and the heroes who died just doin' what they do?

Did you look up to heaven for some kind of answer and look at yourself and what really matters?

I'm just a singer of simple songs, I'm not a real political man

I watch CNN, but I'm not sure I can tell you the diffrence in Iraq and Iran.

But I know Jesus and I talk to God and I remember this from when I was young.

Faith, hope, and love are some good things He gave us and the greatest is love."

President Joe Biden said, "Service is a fitting way to start to heal, unite, and rebuild this country we love." Our community and our world have many needs requiring our service and commitment to address. Patriot Day can be a day to pause, reflect, and remember. However, how we use those reflections every day moving forward in service to others is how we assure a better community and world for all children. We Rotarians have this commitment and obligation to keep our world turning together, to "reduce poverty, improve health, and promote peace". And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.

Newark Rotary finalizes plans for LWW Water Project in Tabi, Mexico

The Newark Rotary Club, in partnership with Living Waters for the World (LWW), has just finalized covenants and project plans with representatives from the community of Tabi in Quintana Roo, Mexico to bring safe water, sanitation and economic development to their community of some 700 residents. Two team members, Linda Werts and Joanne Tunison, along with Doug Depies, one of LWW's Yucatán coordinators, recently spent three days in meetings and fellowship with the appointed water and education committees in Tabi to complete the planning and budgeting for the project and to agree to a LWW Covenant which will remain in place for at least three years.

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It has taken a long time to reach this development phase. Trips earlier this year had been cancelled due to COVID and the original Ejido group backed out of an agreement to lead the project. But the Iglesia Presbiteriana Bet-El church and community members stepped in and agreed to coordinate this project with Newark Rotary. The group leaders who they are now partnering with are competently skilled and incredibly thankful for the opportunity to advance this project to completion.

Newark Rotary has been supported financially along the way from the following Rotary Clubs: Newark, Bellaire TX, Canandaigua, East Hartford CT, Gananda, Istanbul Turkey D2420, Palmyra-Macedon, Penn Yan, Valladolid Mexico, and Wolcott.

The NY "Tabi Project" Team is comprised of members from the Newark, Palmyra-Macedon and Wolcott Rotary Clubs, the United Church of Canandaigua, Elmira First Presbyterian, Palmyra Western Presbyterian, and the Weston Presbyterian churches and in-country partners from Limones, Mexico. It is anticipated that the water plant building will be completed by the Tabi partners and ready for a system installation and celebration trip in February of 2022.

Nielsen House serves homeless men with a criminal history who are entering the community from jail, in-patient facilities, the streets, and other homeless situations. The men who are accepted are required to live drug-free in a structured environment and must be willing to receive chemical dependency evaluations and mental health evaluations, if necessary. Residents with substance abuse and chemical dependency are encouraged to participate in a Twelve Step Program. Nielsen House also offers the opportunity for residents to become mentors for other men battling substance abuse and mental health issues.

A new house was recently purchased, which will allow Nielsen House to offer a warm bed and a safe place to sleep for many more men.

They provide for residents' basic needs with homecooked meals, a clothing closet, a bedroom, and a well-stocked supply cupboard for toiletries and personal effects, along with teaching skills for future jobs. Residents can expect twenty-four-hour supervision and intensive case management services as well as personal and spiritual guidance.

Rotarians recently took a tour of the new location and presented our donation. The tour was led by Director Jon Olsen, who had recently given a presentation to our club.

"I wondered, 'How many carousels can I take my kids to in a year?' That was the challenge I set for myself," he said. He started with carousels in the five boroughs, including the Prospect Park Carousel in Brooklyn, the Bug Carousel in the Bronx Zoo, and Le Carrousel in Bryant Park in Manhattan. Jackson wasn't born yet when the carousel riding began. But the Gormans quickly

got him onboard and despite his tender age, he is already a carousel veteran, with four rides under his belt. Gorman, who has become something of a merry-go-round expert, researches carousels to find new ones to ride. The adventure has provided an opportunity to learn about the history of each merry-go-round. New York provided a wide variety of choices — from the Forest Park Carousel in Queens, built-in 1903, tothe SeaGlass Carousel in Battery Park, which opened in 2015. Gorman documents each ride on a spreadsheet, adding a new entry each time they go on a carousel. The most recent ride took place a few weeks ago on a carousel in Old Forge, a hamlet in the Adirondacks. "That was our 50th," Gorman said. "And we're going to keep it up."
