COVID UPDATE: KNOW YOUR COVID-19 COMMUNITY LEVEL March 10, 2022 PDG DAVE HANNAN

There has been a marked reduction in the incidence of COVID-19 infections throughout the country. Governor Hochul has rescinded the mandate for masks in most venues affecting Rotary club meetings, fund raisers, and service projects. The U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has created a tool to help communities decide what preventive steps to take based on the latest data for hospital admissions, bed occupancy, and the number of new COVID-19 cases in the area. Each county is determined to have a LOW, MEDIUM, or HIGH level of infection based on these data. Recommendations vary with the level of infection. County levels are modified each Friday based on the most recent data: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/covid-by-county.html

As of March 4, 2022, the 4 westernmost counties in District 7120 (MONROE, WYOMING, LIVINGSTON, and AL-LEGANY) have a LOW level of infection in the community. For these communities, the CDC recommends staying up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and getting tested if you have symptoms.

The 7 easternmost counties (WAYNE, ONTARIO, SENECA, YATES, STEUBEN, SCHUYLER, and CHEMUNG) have a MEDIUM level of infection. For these communities, the CDC recommends that those at high risk for severe illness talk with their healthcare provider about the need for wearing a mask and taking other precautions, in addition to staying up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and getting tested if you have symptoms.

Please show consideration to those Rotarians who have higher health risks!

Rotary Position Statement on COVID-19 vaccination:

As the first organization to envision a polio-free world through mass immunization of children, Rotary believes the decision to vaccinate is a humanitarian imperative based in scientific evidence. While we acknowledge and respect our members' divergent religious, cultural, and political beliefs, The Rotary International Board of Directors and Rotary Foundation Trustees take the following positions:

Global vaccination is critical to ending the pandemic, and we strongly encourage vaccination for all individuals, including our members.

Misinformation hinders the fight against COVID-2o, and we are committed to providing our members with science-based information.

Rotary is engaged in ensuring equity in vaccine access to all people. Through joint efforts with Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, we are leveraging our frontline experience with polio to facilitate vaccine delivery.


Rotary salutes health care workers everywhere as clinical and hospital staff, public health workers, and long-term care providers continue to deliver lifesaving services. We encourage clubs to offer recognition and encouragement to these heroes.

Rotary and Rotaract clubs are encouraged to redouble their efforts to support COVID-19 prevention and vaccination efforts.

As one of the greatest advances of modern medicine, vaccines have eliminated or controlled numerous diseases such as polio, smallpox, measles, and Ebola, and save millions of lives each year. COVID-19 vaccines have proven to be safe and effective at helping protect against severe disease and death from the novel coronavirus, including known circulating variants.

The eradication of polio remains the goal of the highest order for Rotary. We can continue to apply the lessons we learned in fighting polio to COVID-19 response efforts.

A new custom Rotary license plate will soon be available for New York State Rotarians!

The new custom plate will feature the Rotary logo and our motto, "Service Above Self".

District 7120 Governor Janet Tenreiro along with District 7040 Area Governor Michael Griffin are taking point on this project, which has the support of all nine district governors in New York State.

The new plate will take the place of Rotary's current custom plate in New York, which uses the old logo and has no motto.

In order for New York State to move ahead on printing the new plates, we need to get at least 200 New York State Rotarians to express interest in ordering the new custom license plate.

If you are interested in ordering a plate, please fill out the short form online at https://forms.gle/sQAhXsejZBanX25K8 or print out and mail in a form.

After we get our 200 Rotarians signed up, we'll let those interested know, share the list with New York State and the project will move ahead!

Personalized custom plates (you pick the characters, i.e., "RTRY"), and custom plates that include the Universal Symbol of Access (formerly "handicapped" plates), for individuals who qualify, will also be available.

An initial fee and an additional annual renewal fee, in addition to your vehicle registration renewal fee, will be billed for the plates every two years when you renew your registration.

We hope that you consider supporting this exciting project, which will spread our Rotary message around the state and country!

Peace has always held a unique status in Rotary. As Rotarians, Rotaractors and Rotary Peace Fellows, we approach peace not as an abstract concept, but as a living, dynamic expression of human development. It is both a cornerstone of our mission as a humanitarian service organisation, and it is one of our seven areas of focus – one of the main ways in which our members make their mark on the world. And yet, as amazing and inspire as our peace programs are, 'peacebuilding' is something that is inherent in everything that we do in Rotary. It is an integral part of our polio and disease eradication programmes, our WASH programmes, our environmental initiatives as well as our work on basic education and literacy. When we strive to reduce gender disparity in education, we are doing peace work! When we expand access to quality care, so mothers and their children can live and grow stronger, we are doing peace work. When we enhance economic and community

development and create opportunities for decent and productive work for both young and old, we are doing peace. Last year, my longtime friend and colleague, RI President Shekhar Mehta reached out to me and asked if I would host a preconvention peace conference at the Rotary International Convention in Houston. But this was to be a different kind

of peace conference. The Rotary Presidential Conference Houston: Serve to Bring Peace will aim to showcase how everything we do in Rotary goes on to create more peaceful and resilient societies. This event will focus on Rotary's seven areas of focus, and how each of them supports the eight pillars of positive peace. This conference will also act as a capstone event to the six Presidential Conferences taking place around the world. It will be the perfect opportunity to network with the wider Rotary peacebuilding community, to hear what others are doing around the globe to create peace, and to be inspired to take action. The conference will be the perfect opportunity to come together, to meet friends old and new, and to be re-energized as champions of peace. The conference will aim to tackle some of the most important issues of our time, from the empowerment of girls; polarization in our communities; forced migration and human trafficking; and climate change and the challenges to peacebuilding. Given that this year will also mark the 20th anniversary of the first cohort of Rotary Peace Fellows, the conference will also have a special focus on the Rotary Peace Fellowship program and its achievements and impact. The coveted international event is returning to Houston for the third time, marking the 50th anniversary of the 1972 international convention. The Bayou City also hosted the 5th Rotary convention in 1914. The event is expected to deliver \$30 million in economic impact for the city's hotels, restaurants, retailers and attractions....

Perry Rotary to Aid Ukrainians

Perry Rotary has a reputation for serving others, whether here in Wyoming County or across the globe. Once again, the Club answers the call for help.






