This month I would like to feature the Elmira Club:

The Elmira Rotary Club sends greetings to District 7120! Our Club is 106 years old and consists of 43 dynamic, loving members who believe in community action.

While the Pandemic may have kept us physically apart, the Club flourished via Zoom, adding new members, featuring speakers from all over the country, launching our first Corporate Membership, and hosting a successful online event that brought together Rotarians and non-Rotarians. Our recent efforts to support the people of Ukraine resulted in an astonishing \$4400 being channeled through the Rotary International Disaster Relief Fund.

Corporate Membership allows a company to hold a few membership seats in our Club, and to assign those spots to different employees as jobs and duties change. It's a powerful way to have allies in the business community.

Our Virtual Beer Fest, the brainchild of web guru Tom Brown, brought in more than \$3,000 for two local charities. It was a joyous event that included lots of community members who learned about Rotary.

Elmira held a community rally to show support for the people of Ukraine. The suggestion was made to offer the RI Disaster Fund as a reputable way to donate. Donations came to us for weeks following the event, giving our friends and neighbors a safe, well-established way to send money.

Elmira Rotary also made possible a handsome marker to tell the story of the Lake Street bridge over the Chemung River, complete with a lovely marker noting sponsorship by the Club.

We also found ways to continue our nearly 15 year partnership with Diven Elementary School, our Club adopted school. We sent snacks to the kids, our members read books to them online, we treated the teachers to cupcakes made by our local Meals on Wheels, (Don't tell the kids, they got hummus and crackers!) and when the end of last school year came around, Rotarians showed up to cheer the kids as they and their parents drove by the school to head into summer vacation. We also continued our efforts for highway cleanup and helping to serve at the Community Kitchen.

Our Youth Salute leadership award program is one of our cherished traditions, whereby Rotary supports three local high school students who complete an application, an essay, and an in-person interview. The program culminates in a Fall luncheon where the winners of cash prizes are announced, and all those who participated are celebrated.

Last Rotary year, we tackled a physical project and helped rehab three bridges on the trails of Tanglewood Nature Center. The section of hiking paths we worked on are the only ones that allow hikers to bring their dogs, and we got to watch the very first pup walk across the new span.

The Elmira Rotary Club is a fun-loving, welcoming collection of good people who love their community. We invite you to visit us at our Noon Tuesday meeting at the Clarion Hotel in downtown Elmira.

A candidate should NOT contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. If any prospective candidate has any questions, contact District Governor Nominee Dave DeMers at 585-764-6648 or by email at demers@gmail.com

Important information for the candidate:

Per District 7120 “Policies and Procedures” and RI “Manual of Procedure”, a nominee for District Governor must meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for 7 years
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee
- Must have the support of his/her club
- The candidate must complete an application for consideration as District Governor.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian’s club
- The application must be returned to the chair of the district Nominating Committee by the date on the application
- After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the district Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.
- You will be contacted for an interview time
- The spouse or partner of the candidate is highly encouraged to attend the interview



COVID UPDATE:
KNOW YOUR COVID-19 COMMUNITY LEVEL

May 10, 2022

There has been a marked increase in the incidence of COVID-19 infections throughout the 11-counties of Rotary District 7120.

As of May 6, 2022, nine counties in District 7120 (MONROE, WYOMING, LIVINGSTON, WAYNE, ONTARIO, SENECA, YATES, and CHEMUNG) have a HIGH level of infection in the community. For these communities, the CDC recommends the following:

1. Wear a well-fitting mask indoors in public settings, regardless of vaccination status;
2. Stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines;
3. Get tested if you have symptoms;
4. Take additional precautions if you are at high risk for severe disease.

SCHUYLER County is at MEDIUM risk and ALLEGANY County is at LOW risk. In those communities you should still stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and getting tested if you have symptoms.

Please show consideration to those Rotarians who have higher health risks!

Even though Governor Hochul has rescinded the mandate for masks in most venues affecting Rotary club meetings, fund raisers, and service projects, compliance with CDC recommendations is strongly encouraged. For more information, the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has created a tool to help communities decide what preventive steps to take based on the latest data for hospital admissions, bed occupancy, and the number of new COVID-19 cases in the area. Each county is determined to have a LOW, MEDIUM, or HIGH level of infection based on these data. Recommendations vary with the level of infection. County levels are modified each Friday based on the most recent data: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/covid-by-county.html>



Now, more than ever, we cannot let down our guard against Polio. A new case of vaccine derived polio was diagnosed in Rockland County (north of New York City) just this week. He is an unvaccinated adult and had not been travelling.

Also reported recently that polio virus has been detected in the London sewage system.

Please, if you or your club have not donated to PolioPlus lately, now is the time to take action.

Should you wish your donation to be an annual event, you can sign up for the PolioPlus Society if your donation is \$100.00 per year or more. It is NOT necessary. Any amount will be appreciated.




FAIRPORT ROTARY TO HELP FILL 300 BAGS WITH SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Mackenzie will be entering Nazareth College in Rochester in the fall and pursue a career in education.




