

February is Peace Building and Conflict Prevention Month in the Rotary World. In January, we celebrated the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday. In January, we also lost another great peacemaker - a Vietnamese Buddhist monk named Thich Nhat Hanh (pronounced tick na han). They had a deep and profound respect for each other. MLK nominated Thich Nhat Hanh for a Nobel Peace Prize, and Thich Nhat Hanh considered MLK a "bodhisattva" - an enlightened being trying to awaken other living beings and help them move toward more compassion and understanding. When Thich Nhat Hanh met the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. in person for the first time, he knew he was in the presence of a holy person. Not just his good work, but his very being was a source of great inspiration for him. "When those who represent a spiritual tradition embody the essence of their tradition, just the way they walk, sit, and smile speaks volumes about the tradition." They had tea together in his room, and then went down for a press conference. Dr. King spoke out for the first time against the Vietnam War. That was the day they combined their efforts to work for peace in Vietnam and to fight for civil rights in the U.S. Thich Nhat Han wrote: "I also believe with all my being that the struggle for equality and freedom you lead in Birmingham, Alabama, is not aimed at the whites but only at intolerance, hatred, and discrimination. These are real enemies of man - not man himself." Thich Nhat Han died in France at the age of 95, and MLK, JR. would have been 93. What a collaboration that would have been had MLK not been assassinated.

Let us as Rotarians dedicated to Peace and Conflict Resolution continue their work.

#### District StoveTeam Project Exceeds All Expectations!

In the fall of 2021, District 7120's Environmental Action Committee launched a district-wide project to raise money for StoveTeam International. After watching a video about the inexpensive stoves being manufactured locally in Central America, and distributing it to the clubs in the district, a request was made by the chair of the committee, Gary Anderson, and District Governor Janet Tenreiro for clubs to consider contributing at least enough money to purchase 1 stove (\$100.00). The committee's goal was to raise \$10,000 to send to StoveTeam International. Upon hearing that open fire cooking causes more black carbon in the air than all of the cars in the world produce, many clubs stepped right up with a commitment. The Environmental Action Committee then went to Rotary International with the intention of applying for a global grant to multiply our donations exponentially. Unfortunately, RI is currently not funding global grants for stoves at this time. We considered trying to apply under Economic Development, or Maternal & Child Health, but we were advised that that route was also not going to provide results. Nevertheless, the clubs in our district came through with amazing results! 35 clubs blew through the \$10,000 goal and we raised it to \$15,000. We smashed through that and increased it to \$20,000. As the winter progressed, so did the contributions, and ultimately we ended up with \$21,475.00 from 35 clubs and several individuals. As District Governor, I had funds available to use for a project, so the district added \$3,925.00 to the pot, with the goal of bringing the total up to \$25,000. And we actually exceeded that to reach a final total of \$25,400.00 for StoveTeam International. I cannot tell you how proud I am of every club that contributed, as well as every club that considered this project. This money will provide 254 new stoves for communities in Central America. The company that builds the stoves will be owned by a local craftsman. The building of those stoves will provide jobs for many people in the local community where they will be used. Once a stove is installed in a home, the amount of black carbon smoke in the building decreases to nearly nothing, making it safer to breathe for the women and children in the home. There will no longer be an open fire where a child or woman can get burned if they trip and fall. The necessity to search for firewood decreases by at least half, enabling the children to spend more time in school, and saves some deforestation. The benefits are many.

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If your club considered this project but didn't respond previously, there is still time. Just make your contributions out to StoveTeam International and mail them to me at: Janet Tenreiro, 4069 Whitetail Drive, Canandaigua, NY 14424. I would like to be able to credit your club when I send in this Project to Rotary International. StoveTeam's innovative model for launching local projects in Latin America has been awarded the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Partnership for Clean Indoor Air Award for Developing Local Markets for creating local employment while improving health and reducing air pollution. To date, local projects started by StoveTeam in Guatemala, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Honduras and Mexico have produced more than 78,000 stoves, improving the lives of more than half a million people and preventing nearly one million tons of CO2 from entering the atmosphere.

#### COVID UPDATE:

#### MAXIMIZE TELEWORK

January 10, 2022

With the intensity of the COVID disease incidence confronting us, I am now recommending that Rotary Clubs in District 7120 maximize their implementation of telework, i.e. preferential use of electronic communication over in person meetings to conduct club and district business whenever possible. This is a precaution we take due to the stress on our health care system, the low percentage of vaccinated people in our communities, the high degree of contagiousness of the omicron variant, and the relative risk for some of our more senior Rotarians. GET VACCINATED, USE HAND SANITIZER, AND UPGRADE TO A KN-95 MASK!

I reiterate from last month: NY Governor Kathy Hochul reinstated a statewide mandate for wearing masks at indoor public events beginning Monday, December 13. This applies to Rotary meetings, fundraisers, and projects that are held indoors at a public facility. There is an exception for events where all participants provide proof of vaccination, i.e. the digital Excelsior Pass or the CDC vaccination card. This is expected to be enforced by county health departments. This mandate is in effect at least until January 15, 2022. (I expect that it will be extended.)

Here are some options for Rotary clubs:

- Hold virtual meetings.
- Hold hybrid meetings at a public facility where those attending in person provide proof of vaccination (as referenced above).


• Hold in person meetings at a public facility at where all those attending wear masks throughout the meeting (as referenced above).

• Hold in person meetings at a non-public facility. (Check with your county health department to ascertain their concurrence that the facility is "non-public.")

Please reach out to your meeting facility manager and your food vendor as soon to maintain a good working relationship with these people.

Despite the "COVID fatigue" which we are all experiencing, it is truly important for clubs to continue meeting, now preferably electronically, and serving our communities. It is also important, whether or not we agree with Governor Hochul's decision, that Rotarians comply with these directives to protect our members and to maintain a favorable public image in our communities.





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#### Major Gifts News -- Unique benefits and tax incentives?

Josh Olewiler, Planned Giving Officer at the Rotary Foundation, recently noted that there have been increased numbers of Rotarians interested in **Donor Advised Funds** and **Charitable Gift Annuities** this past year. A Donor Advised Fund gives the owner control over how grants using their funds are distributed. Gift Annuities offer peace of mind by providing a regular income stream back to donors and their spouses for the rest of their lifetimes.

Both these options provide interesting and unique benefits as well as tac incentives. As we approach the end of the tax year, talk with your tax advisor to consider the financial advantages of these programs for you! A new custom Rotary license plate will soon be available for New York State Rotarians! The new custom plate will feature the Rotary logo and our motto, *"Service Above Self".* 

District 7120 Governor Janet Tenreiro along with District 7040 Area Governor Michael Griffin are taking point on this project, which has the support of all nine district governors in New York State.

The new plate will take the place of Rotary's current custom plate in New York, which uses the old logo and has no motto.

In order for New York State to move ahead on printing the new plates, we need to get at least 200 New York State Rotarians to express interest in ordering the new custom license plate.

After we get our 200 Rotarians signed up, we'll let those interested know, share the list with New York State and the project will move ahead!

Personalized custom plates (you pick the characters, i.e., "RTRY"), and custom plates that include the Universal Symbol of Access (formerly "handicapped" plates), for individuals who qualify, will also be available.

An initial fee and an additional annual renewal fee, in addition to your vehicle registration renewal fee, will be billed for the plates every two years when you renew your registration.

#### GRANT MANAGEMENT SEMINAR (GMS) for Global & District Grants in the 2022-2023 Rotary Year

To participate in Rotary Foundation Programs including Global and District Grants during Rotary each year, a club is required to become certified/re-certified and accomplish the following four tasks:

1. Each club President-Elect and Foundation Chair, or their representatives, are required to complete a district-sponsored Grant Management Seminar (GMS) or the Rotary.Org Learning Center online course.

2. Club president and president-elect must sign a Memorandum of Understanding (Club MOU) per The Rotary Foundation

3. Club president and president-elect must sign the District 7120 Addendum to the Club MOU, which is available on District 7120 website.

4. Each club must adopt the document retention and financial management policies required by the MOU.

5. Additionally, clubs must have donated \$25 average per capita in the 2020-2021 Rotary year in order to qualify for grants in 2022-2023. (Next year that amount increases to \$35.)

In 2020-21 and following, participants may complete an online course offered by Rotary International. The course includes 9 modules that can be completed at the participant's own pace. There is a recertification module for those who completed the online course in a prior year. A participant can save and leave the site and pick up their training later at their own pace. The course can be accessed as follows: Note many browsers and phones/tablets/ laptops work a bit differently.

Sign into "My Rotary" at Rotary.org (You may create an account if you do not already have a My Rotary account.)

Click on "Learning & Reference" header at mid-top of the page, then "Learning Center," then "The Rotary Foundation" View box.

A list of courses will appear.

At the left on the 2nd row of courses, click on "Grant Management Recertification 2021" or "Grant Management Seminar."

Enroll in one of these courses. The Recertification Course is only for those who completed the online course last year, and NOT for those who completed a live or Zoom District course in the past.

The Grant Management Seminar has 9 modules. Each module has a learning test at the end. Upon completion of the "Grant Management Seminar", you will be able to print a completion certificate for each module and for the entire course. #### Red Jacket Rotary's Trout Pond

Matt Schaertl, project lead for Red Jacket Rotary's Trout Pond project is seen applying the mastic adhesive to one of the two windows in preparation for placement into the weir. Close inspection will reveal there are two suction cup handles on the bottom side of the window as it is sitting to allow lifting it and inserting it into the weir opening after the mastic is applied.

Even though we have had several below zero nights, there is still open water around the weir. Matt didn't need to break any ice with his waders to get into the frigid waters.



Close up of the weir and sluiceway with some very cold water continuing to cascade over the edge. For some idea of scale and depth, the windows are nominal 2' X 2' squares.





It has been a few days since the windows were inserted and the pond is now full. Water can be seen running down the sluiceway cast into the weir. Because this is a spring fed pond and the water is running continuously, the ice build up on the pond is minimal and much too thin for skating. There are signs posted "no skating" around the pond. Just a couple hundred yards down the hill, in the area between the pond and Shortsville's Budd Park, there is a nice, man made, skating rink for all to enjoy.

Concerning the pond, the following is a quote from Matt's communications with the Department of Environmental Conservation. "The club won a ecological grant from Rotary International last summer (new national grant, so we are one of the first in the country to receive it). As you may recall, we reactivated a 1880's spring fed trout pond that had silted in. The Village has had the water tested and it is looking extremely promising with the flow continuing to occur over the weir even with these extreme temperatures."

The next major event will, hopefully, be stocking of the pond by the DEC this spring.






