Greeting 7120 Rotarians:

As we begin Rotary International President Jennifer Jones "Imagine Rotary" year, I want to take the opportunity each month to highlight a 7120 club.

Clubs in our District have a lot to be proud of and they do significant good in their community, District, and the world.

This month's feature club is our District's largest Rotary club, **Rochester Rotary**, a diverse club of over 350 members. The club's members are business, not-for-profit and civic leaders. Rochester Rotary has 22 committees which support 3 significant service projects:

- Rochester Rotary Sunshine Camp: A 157-acre camp located in Ruch, NY is celebrating 100 years of serving adults and children with special needs. There is no charge for campers to attend the camp. As owners and operators of the Sunshine Camp, staff and Rochester Rotary members maintain the camp as well as fundraise to cover the \$1,000,000 plus annual operating cost.
- To help celebrate the 100th year of the Sunshine Camp the following activities have been planned:
- Camp Carnival celebration of 100 years on July 14th
- Nancy Lopez Women's Golf Tournament on July 24th at Locust Hill Country Club. There will be a brunch that they would love to have District Rotarians attend to hear Nancy's reflections on her time in Rochester while on the LPGA tour
- Shirley's Clay Shooting Tournament at Brooks Gun Club on July 21st
- Wickham Farms has embraced our anniversary and the corn maze this year will have our 100-year logo and the Rotary Wheel as their maze design. They have great event space, and it would be great fun for District Clubs to have a day at the farm
- Heroes Brewing has released a beer, "Milestone" – in honor of the Sunshine Camp anniversary. You can stop in and purchase a pint
- Birdhouse Brewing in Honeoye, NY has a special release of the Sunshine Maple Brown Ale on tap, made from the Sunshine Camp syrup
- Guglielmo Pasta Sauce has a special release sauce in celebration of the 100-year anniversary on shelves in Wegmans and many other outlets
- Sunshine Camp Day at the Red Wings – September 1st
- Sunshine Camp Trail Mix 5K and 10K – Sunday, October 9th
- 100 Years of Sunshine Event on Friday, November 4th at the Sunshine Camp (adult-only evening event – dinner and a lot of fun & surprises)
- Annual RPO Holiday Pops Concert in December
- Rochester Rotary adopted Rochester City Roberto Clement #8 school in 1994. Members tutor and support staff, families, and student needs. This year over 40 students experienced a day of fun at the Frederick Douglass International Airport, the Sunshine Camp and the Genesee Warplane Museum to learn about the Tuskegee Airmen.
- Rochester Rotary has a scholarship program where students are selected at the end of the 5th grade and paired

with a Rotary mentor until high school graduation. Upon high school graduation, that student will receive 75% of SUNY tuition for 4 years.

- International Service: Rochester Rotary has an International Service Committee that works with other Rotary Clubs in the District, and other agencies in our community, to provide financial support to their projects. They also host the International Exchange District Committee at their offices for their meetings and provide use of the Camp at no charge

Rochester Rotary has fantastic speakers at their Tuesday luncheon meetings and all Rotarians are invited to attend. Please register in advance.

Nominations are Now Being Accepted for 2025-26 District Governor

As of July 1, 2022, the District 7120 Nominating Committee is accepting nominations for District Governor for the Rotary Year 2025 – 2026. Are you an experienced Rotarian, with interests in getting deeper into the operation of our district? Do you have leadership skills, perhaps underutilized, that need to be exercised? Can you assemble and lead a team of like-minded, enthusiastic people?

If so, please consider submitting an application. Also, look around your club, your Rotary area and our Rotary district. Whom have you noticed with the skills needed to lead our district? Whom would you like to see leading District 7120 in a few years?

Reach out and ask a few questions. Some people, very qualified people, only need a little “push” to consider accepting the rewarding challenge of helping lead a Rotary district to discover and demonstrate its potential for *Service Above Self*.

To assist you in your effort, here is the **Procedure and List of Requirements** for a Rotary District Governor:

A candidate should **NOT** contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. If prospective candidates have any questions they should contact District Governor-Elect Julie Carney juliecarney7120@gmail.com, or District Governor-Nominee Dave DeMers demers@gmail.com

Important information for prospective candidates:

A Nominee for District Governor must complete an application for consideration as District Governor and meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years;
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position;
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club.
- The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 15, 2022).

After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.

- The candidate will be contacted for an interview time.
- The spouse or partner of the candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.

COVID UPDATE:
KNOW YOUR COVID-19 COMMUNITY LEVEL

There has been a marked increase in the incidence of COVID-19 infections throughout the 11-counties of Rotary District 7120.

As of May 6, 2022, nine counties in District 7120 (MONROE, WYOMING, LIVINGSTON, WAYNE, ONTARIO, SENECA, YATES, and CHEMUNG) have a HIGH level of infection in the community. For these communities, the CDC recommends the following:

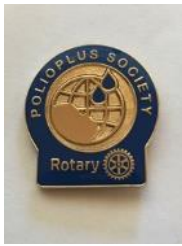
1. Wear a well-fitting mask indoors in public settings, regardless of vaccination status;
2. Stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines;
3. Get tested if you have symptoms;
4. Take additional precautions if you are at high risk for severe disease.

SCHUYLER County is at MEDIUM risk and ALLEGANY County is at LOW risk. In those communities you should still stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and getting tested if you have symptoms.

Please show consideration to those Rotarians who have higher health risks!

Even though Governor Hochul has rescinded the mandate for masks in most venues affecting Rotary club meetings, fund raisers, and service projects, compliance with CDC recommendations is strongly encouraged. For more information, the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has created a tool to help communities decide what preventive steps to take based on the latest data for hospital admissions, bed occupancy, and the number of new COVID-19 cases in the area. Each county is determined to have a LOW, MEDIUM, or HIGH level of infection based on these data. Recommendations vary with the level of infection. County levels are modified each Friday based on the most recent data: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/covid-by-county.html>

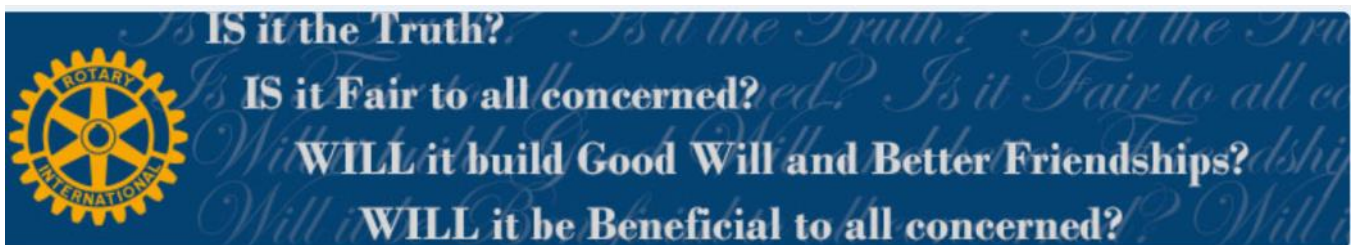
