This month I am pleased to share Honeoye Lake Rotary Club information:

It is truly an honor for the Honeoye Lake Rotary Club to share some of our history with District 7120. We are a small but mighty club of 26 members, and we are dedicated to making sure we serve our community well while spreading our Rotarian goals worldwide.

The HLRC was chartered on January 25, 1968 and established on April 10, 1968. We celebrate our "birth" each fall when we host our Quad Cities dinner. Our 54 years



of "Service Above Self" is evident in all we do. This can be seen in the Bright Spot we had on Channel 13 for our crocheted American Flag auction on Facebook, the podcast we were featured in along with the Victor-Farmington club and our opportunity to host the DTA in April 2022.

Our membership includes one of our charter members as well as a member who works with us from Florida and adds to our younger range of members. (She is also a former exchange student.) We do have a majority of female members and our age range is from early thirties to early eighties. This enables us to tackle a wide variety of community service projects.

Our annual golf tournament enables us to supplement our treasury with funds to carry on many of our community service projects. Other fundraising activities include our annual craft sale and our annual fall Road Rally. (Last year, as a result of our rally, we gained a new member.) This fall we are experimenting with a "Walking Taco" event to be held at one of our local breweries.

The HLRC enjoys our "Adopt a School" projects which include our "Rotary Reading Rally", our "Gift Book a Month" project and our donation of tote bags filled with school supplies at the elementary level. At the secondary level, we sponsor a Student of the Month at both the middle school level and the secondary level. At graduation, three of our seniors are honored with our two Memorial Awards and the financial backing for the salutatorian award. Our "Vittles for Vacation" project enables students at the secondary level to enjoy easy to prepare foods while not able to receive the free breakfast and lunch offered at school. This past year we were able expand our program to all four vacations – Christmas, February break, Easter and summer.

Winter community support takes in the "Toys for Tots" collection by our local Marines and the Youth to Youth/Interacts blanket, jackets, etc., drive.

Involvement in the cross-country team's "Rally Round the Valley" wakes us up to our spring projects as does our support for the CORAL groups spring plant sale.

Our successful grant applications over the past few years have allowed us to establish our "Gift Book a Month" project, install a ramp to our enclosed pavilion at Sandy Bottom Beach, build kiosks at the beach (Continued on page 2)

trails, install signs and other improvements at our beach trails and support a program for senior citizens.

Environmentally, we participate in the community's annual roadside cleanup and distribute tree seedlings to elementary students for Earth Day/ Arbor Day/

This year we have been invited to conquer a major challenge as we welcome the "Power of One" exchange student to spend the next few months with our small but mighty club. This will expose us to a very different culture and encourage us to be sure our student has a memorable year experiencing life in Honeoye. Hosting a YE student from Uganda adds to the work we do with Costa Rica and "Books for the World" as we stretch our international goals.

A lot of laughter and fun can usually be enjoyed at our meetings, and we welcome community members (and out of town Rotarians) to join us at any time so they can get to know us better. Our small but mighty club meets at The Twisted Rail on East Lake Rd. Thursday evenings at 6:30PM.

A candidate should NOT contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. If any prospective candidate has any questions, contact District Governor Nominee Dave DeMers at 585-764-6648 or by email at demers@gmail.com

Important information for the candidate:

Per District 7120 "Policies and Procedures" and RI "Manual of Procedure", a nominee for District Governor must meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for 7 years
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee
- Must have the support of his/her club
- The candidate must complete an application for consideration as District Governor.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club
- The application must be returned to the chair of the district Nominating Committee by the date on the application
- After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the district Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.
- You will be contacted for an interview time
- The spouse or partner of the candidate is highly encouraged to attend the interview

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INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:

COVID-19, INFLUENZA, and POLIO

September 10, 2022

COVID-19:

1.Updated Booster Vaccines are now available for those 12 and older. It provides additional protection against the Omicron variants BA.4 and BA.5, for those who have previously been vaccinated. If you a "late-adapter" or "health risk-taker," I strongly encourage you to reconsider and start your vaccine series now, even if you have already experienced the disease!

INFLUENZA:

1.Seasonal Influenza Vaccines are now available. Influenza can be serious and deadly. Those over 65 years old should receive the High-dose version. It can be given at the same time as the COVID-19 Booster in the opposite arm. Infants over 6 months old should get their first half-dose and then a second half-dose 4 weeks later.

POLIO:

- 1. There is now a state of emergency in New York State to boost polio immunization rates! A resident of Rockland County contracted Polio earlier this year and the Polio Virus has now been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties.
- 2.Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your families. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.



Now, more than ever, we cannot let down our guard against Polio. A new case of vaccine derived polio was diagnosed in Rockland County (north of New York City) just this week. He is an unvaccinated adult and had not been travelling.

Also reported recently that polio virus has been detected in the London sewage system.

Please, if you or your club have not donated to PolioPlus lately, now is the time to take action.

Should you wish your donation to be an annual event, you can sign up for the PolioPlus Society if your donation is \$100.00 per year or more. It is NOT necessary. Any amount will be appreciated.



Books for the World (BFTW) is a global literacy and educational project sponsored and supervised end-to-end by Rotarians. It's a major, world-wide, non-profit organization sponsored by the Rotary Club of Seabrook, Texas and funded by the Second Wind Foundation. The overall goal of this project is to enhance literacy and education in third world countries while also promoting international understanding. Working with Rotary Clubs around the United States, BFTW collects books scheduled for disposal which might otherwise be thrown into landfills, shredded or incinerated and ships them to third world countries around the world where educational resources are greatly needed.

The BFTW project began in 2000 from a conversation between two Rotarians, one from Texas and the other from South Africa. They discussed how the two clubs might work together and became aware that schools in South Africa needed school and library books, while schools in Texas were disposing of hundreds of thousands of valuable textbooks every year. As of today, BFTW has provided many millions of books to over 25 countries across southern Africa, Central and South America. India, Afghanistan, Pakistan and others.

The BFTW shipments of books overseas are distributed to needy schools, some of which have no building, no books and no school supplies with many teachers saying they never before had books from which to teach. Many of the children this project reaches have never held a book, let alone learned how to read one.

The Books for the World, Western New York (BFTW WNY) was created in 2008 to collaborate with BFTW in collecting books from Rotary clubs operating within Rotary District 7120. Since its inception in 2008, BFTW WNY has collected, packed and shipped over 361 tons of books to the Second Wind Foundation in Texas. Once there, they are combined with books received from other U.S. locations, placed into shipping containers, and shipped to their final destinations around the world.

In the past Rotary year, BFTW WNY has received monetary donations from a number of area Rotary Clubs (RC) (including some individuals from those clubs: Fairport RC, Gates-Chili RC, Honeoye Lake RC, Pittsford RC and Rochester RC Donations have also been received from 2 organizations: Network for Good and The Last Man Standing Pool.

In the last year, BFTW WNY has sent 2 shipments of books to the Second Wind Foundation, traveling 1,577 miles by truck.

- July, 2021: 28 pallets holding 672 boxes of books weighing around 20 tons. The estimated value of the books was \$1,008,000. The total expense for this shipment was \$4,166 (including boxes, packing material and shipping).
- July, 2022: 27 pallets holding 648 boxes of books weighing around 20 tons. The estimated value of the books was \$500,000. The total expense for this shipment was \$5,500 (including boxes, packing materials and shipping).

In addition to the Bath Rotary Club, the Canisteo, Chemung Sunrise, Corning, Elmira, Elmira Heights, Horseheads, Prattsburgh, and Watkins-Montour Rotary Clubs fund the week-long event so that no camper is charged to enjoy this special place.

On Thursday, August 18, the Bath Rotarians provided the campers, counselors, and staff a picnic of hotdogs, hamburgers, chips, fruit cups, ice cream and bottled water. 




