Are you an experienced Rotarian, with interests in getting deeper into the operation of our district? Do you have leadership skills, perhaps underutilized, that need to be exercised? Can you assemble and lead a team of like -minded, enthusiastic people? If so, please consider submitting an application. Also, look around your club, your Rotary area and our Rotary district. Whom have you noticed with the skills needed to lead our district? Whom would you like to see leading District 7120 in a few years? Reach out and ask a few questions. Some people, very qualified people, only need a little "push" to consider accepting the rewarding challenge of helping lead a Rotary district to discover and demonstrate its potential for Service Above Self.

To assist you in your effort, here is the procedure and requirements for a Rotary District Governor:

A candidate should NOT contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. If prospective candidates have any questions they should contact District Governor-Elect Dave DeMers at <u>demers@gmail.com</u> or District Governor-Nominee Jim Crane at jim@jparchery.com.

Important information for prospective candidates:

A Nominee for District Governor must complete an application for consideration as District Governor and meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years;
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position;
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club.

• The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 14, 2023). After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.

The spouse or partner of the candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.

Literacy Corner



August 2023

Play and Literacy

When children play, they are learning how to read and write. They learn abstract representation-that an object can represent something or someone else. Making meaning out of a jumble of letters and words takes the ability to reason abstractly. Pretend play provides an excellent cognitive foundation.

Play lays the foundation for literacy.

Through play children learn to make and practice new sounds. They try out new vocabulary, on their own or with friends, and exercise their imagination through storvtelling.

Play Improves Literacy

Babies and toddlers learn new words when adults describe what they see, hear and do. Songs and poems connect syllables to beats. This helps children develop listening skills and learn about the sounds in words. Through play, kids learn about communication.

How does imaginative play support literacy?

Unstructured and imaginative play promotes independent learning through problem solving and exploration. Creative storytelling boosts the skills needed for narrative expression and social skills. Drawing shapes and squiggles refine the fine motor skills that make writing possible.

Why is play important for language?

Play allows children to learn to navigate and react to their environment. Play skills are also foundational for the development of higher-level speech and language functions, such as conversational turn-taking and problem-solving.

Play gives children space. To practice physical movement, balance and to test their own limits.





COVID-19, INFLUENZA, and POLIO

COVID-19:



DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT

2. The Original (Monovalent) Vaccines are no longer available. Updated (Bivalent) Booster Vaccines are now available for those 6 months and older. If you are over 65 years, or immunocompromised, you should get a second Updated (Bivalent) Booster 4 months after the first one. It provides additional protection against the Omicron variants BA.4 and BA.5, for those who have previously been vaccinated. If you a "late-adapter" or "health risk-taker," I strongly encourage you to reconsider and start your vaccine series now, even if you have already experienced the disease!

INFLUENZA:

1. Seasonal Influenza Vaccines will be available by late August. Influenza can be serious and deadly. Those over 65 years old should receive the High-dose version. It can be given at the same time as the COVID-19 Booster in the opposite arm. Infants over 6 months old should get their first half-dose and then a second half-dose 4 weeks later.

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus was detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your families. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.




