As we transition into the cooler weather and bid farewell to Summer, let's remember to listen to our members and our communities. We want to continue the conversation by asking "How are you REALLY?" to make sure that everyone has a voice and a safe place to be their authentic self. Thank you to everyone that took the Mental Health and Wellness survey. While most of our members are doing alright, there were some responses that were alarming. If you were one of the people who replied that you are struggling or not feeling fulfilled, please reach out to a healthcare professional.

World Mental Health Day, on October 10th, was a time to raise awareness and break the stigma associated with discussing mental health and start the conversation. The talk was real

and heartfelt. Most of us have some connection to someone who suffers from mental health/substance abuse issues.

This is something you can do in your own club by inviting mental health professionals and advocates to your meetings and perhaps having them to speak. Simply creating an environment where people are more comfortable talking about mental health sets a good example for your community – and provides a safe space for helping one another form the kinds of connections that strengthen our own mental health. Remember, that if someone takes even a half of a step back from what they have always been engaged in, please check and ask how they are. This may be the first warning sign that something is not right.

Engagement in service has been proven to help relieve depression. Rotary offers many opportunities to expand our impact on our communities and within ourselves. Last week 14 Rotarians from our District participated in the Learning to Lead event in Toronto, Canada. This is funded by our District and it is where we can get together to learn, mentor, engage, grow and get energized.

With over 400 Rotarians in attendance the leadership programs offered focused on the Governor line, Assistant Governors, Future Leaders, Rotaract, Public Image, Foundation, Membership, Diversity Equity and Inclusion, Mental Health, Trainers, and Young Professionals. If you are interested in expanding your knowledge of Rotary, please let me know and you may be considered to attend next year.

The organizers also created an event to raise money for the Foundation. It was a Zorb Ball competition that matched competitors against each other and as each contestant was eliminated (by being "bounced" out of the ring) the bracket grew. In the end, over \$105,000 was raised. The entire event was full of energy, collaboration and team building. Check out the photos to see who from our District participated!

The Learning to Lead event is also a time to celebrate the work put in by our DGE's (District Governor Elect's). Our own Dave DeMers graduated with his fellow classmates and President Elect Stephanie Urchick provided the commencement speech at the Graduation.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:

COVID-19, INFLUENZA, and POLIO June 6, 2023

COVID-19:

- 1. On May 11, 2023, the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency ended, according to the US Department of Health and Human Services. This does not mean the disease went away. Population levels of immunity, whether from vaccination or from the disease, are high enough to warrant this action. Over 85% of people have had at least 1 dose and over 73% are fully vaccinate. Unvaccinated and under vaccinated people are still at risk for contracting this deadly disease.
- 2. The Original (Monovalent) Vaccines are no longer available. Updated (Bivalent) Booster Vaccines are now available for those 6 months and older. If you are over 65 years, or immunocompromised, you should get a second Updated (Bivalent) Booster 4 months after the first one. It provides additional protection against the Omicron variants BA.4 and BA.5, for those who have previously been vaccinated. If you a "late-adapter" or "health risk-taker," I strongly encourage you to reconsider and start your vaccine series now, even if you have already experienced the disease!

INFLUENZA:

Seasonal Influenza Vaccines will be available by late August. Influenza can be serious and deadly.
Those over 65 years old should receive the High-dose version. It can be given at the same time as
the COVID-19 Booster in the opposite arm. Infants over 6 months old should get their first half-dose
and then a second half-dose 4 weeks later.

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus was detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your families. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.



Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide




This year we have also presented each teacher with a set of ten




