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The District 7120 Nominating Committee is accepting nominations for District Governor for the Rotary year 2026 – 2027.

Are you an experienced Rotarian, with interests in getting deeper into the operation of our district? Do you have leadership skills, perhaps underutilized, that need to be exercised? Can you assemble and lead a team of like -minded, enthusiastic people? If so, please consider submitting an application. Also, look around your club, your Rotary area and our Rotary district. Whom have you noticed with the skills needed to lead our district? Whom would you like to see leading District 7120 in a few years? Reach out and ask a few questions. Some people, very qualified people, only need a little "push" to consider accepting the rewarding challenge of helping lead a Rotary district to discover and demonstrate its potential for Service Above Self.

To assist you in your effort, here is the procedure and requirements for a Rotary District Governor:

A candidate should NOT contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. If prospective candidates have any questions they should contact District Governor-Elect Dave DeMers at <u>demers@gmail.com</u> or District Governor-Nominee Jim Crane at jim@jparchery.com.

Important information for prospective candidates:

A Nominee for District Governor must complete an application for consideration as District Governor and meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years;
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position;
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club.

• The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 14, 2023). After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.

The spouse or partner of the candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:

COVID-19, INFLUENZA, and POLIO

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COVID-19:

- On May 11, 2023, the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency ended, according to the US Department of Health and Human Services. This does not mean the disease went away. Population levels of immunity, whether from vaccination or from the disease, are high enough to warrant this action. Over 85% of people have had at least 1 dose and over 73% are fully vaccinate. Unvaccinated and under vaccinated people are still at risk for contracting this deadly disease.
- 2. The Original (Monovalent) Vaccines are no longer available. Updated (Bivalent) Booster Vaccines are now available for those 6 months and older. If you are over 65 years, or immunocompromised, you should get a second Updated (Bivalent) Booster 4 months after the first one. It provides additional protection against the Omicron variants BA.4 and BA.5, for those who have previously been vaccinated. If you a "late-adapter" or "health risk-taker," I strongly encourage you to reconsider and start your vaccine series now, even if you have already experienced the disease!

INFLUENZA:

1. Seasonal Influenza Vaccines will be available by late August. Influenza can be serious and deadly. Those over 65 years old should receive the High-dose version. It can be given at the same time as the COVID-19 Booster in the opposite arm. Infants over 6 months old should get their first half-dose and then a second half-dose 4 weeks later.

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus was detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your families. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.

Summer camp is always an exciting place, especially for kids living with special needs. They plan, pack a few things, load the car, take a ride, and end up arriving at a special place away from home. Then the adventure begins with a guiding camp staff

and hopefully a good cook who can prepare plenty of good camp food.

This summer brought a new challenge. Everyone embraced our new home – Camp Whitman. The dedicated camp staff of 55 led the way and the campers just enjoyed following

along the new trail. Week one brought 71 campers and week two brought 62 campers.

The set up of camp went smooth and take down was even smoother with all the help from our supporting Rotarian. Not everything went well but in camp you adapt and conquer. Thank God the rain stayed away especially for the Sunday carnival where 14 Rotary Clubs put a great outdoor program together for a fun-filled afternoon.

And then we pay the bills. This effort is no small task and represents a great team behind the scenes securing funds from generous caring people. The Board of Directors have a plan to raise the balance of \$24,000 this fall to balance the budget. Capital projects are ongoing and the first year at Camp Whitman showed that we are very serious about a long term contract. Over \$60,000 was raised to build shelters, put up a new flag pole, build picnic tables, purchase AEDs, install new electric system to living quarters, purchase fire rings, replace kitchen equipment, etc. Plans for 2024 are needed to build a new storage building.

We all thank our two Co-Directors Robin Mark and Joanna Meyer for their leadership, dedication, and time. We also recognize so many dedicated Onseyawa camp staff who continue to go the extra mile for the kids.

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GVRC CELEBRATES 60 YEARS AT CAMP WITH A GROOVE



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On August 13, Camp Sam Wood in Pike, NY, welcomed over 90 campers to its annual meeting of the Genesee Valley Rotary Camp (GVRC). Since 1963, GVRC has hosted campers with differing abilities from Livingston, Steuben, Wyoming, and Allegany County.

GVRC has met at Camp Sam Wood in every year since its inception, except 2020, making 2023

its 60th Anniversary. Fittingly, the theme chosen for this year's camp was "Sam Woodstock," with each tribe at the camp creating their own groovy name and banner. But even absent the 1960s theme, free love is in no short supply at GVRC, as their motto proclaims: "Here is Love."

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Over 90 campers attended GVRC this year. They spent the week sleeping in tents, exploring nature, swimming, attending classes, tie-dying shirts, doing arts and crafts, performing skits, and making lifelong friends. GVRC hired 77 staff (nearly all volunteers) to provide a wholesome and enriching camp experience to all attendees despite their differing abilities. Many have been volunteering at GVRC for decades, and several former campers have returned to join the staff.

The camp would not be possible without the love and dedication of its staff, and to celebrate this, GVRC's affiliate clubs awarded four Paul Harris Fellows to camp staffers who have each been volunteering at the camp for over 30 years.

Melissa Fiorentino, Joe Martin, Meghan Woods Glieco and Clare van Durme received a Paul Harris Fellow for their service to GVRC.

Dr. Joan E. Flender, of Stony Brook Pediatrics, who was unable to attend, was also awarded a Paul Harris Fellow. GVRC is a community service project of the Rotarians in Avon, Belmont, Caledonia-Mumford, Dansville, Friendship, Geneseo, Lima, Livonia, Mt. Morris, Nunda, Perry, Wayland and Wellsville. Our Avon Rotary Club contributes to this project by nominating two of its members to serve on the GVRC Board and through the donation of goods and services to the Camp.

The camp provides a tenting experience for special needs kids for one week each August, this year serving 92 campers. This year they are tended by 85 staff many of whom have served the camp for decades. They have also done much of the fundraising that has kept the camp functioning. At the GVRC board meeting at camp last Wed., Aug. 16, 2023 special thanks went to some of the donors including Sierra and Chris Mitchell of Dansville whose 2023 softball tournament raised \$3,200. This is the tenth year of the fundraiser. Sierra started coming to the camp as a toddler when her parents were staffers.



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Jacob Miles of Northport, NY in Long Island has been among the staff for 23 years. He organizes an annual golf tournament there that raised over \$6,100 this year with another \$2-2.5K anticipated. Miles said the camp changed his life after he first visited for a day in 2001, then volunteered for the next 5 years. Married with kids, he returned this year for five days.

He's simply called "Mr. Sam" and was a 16-year-old McQuaid Jesuit High Schooler who needed 100 community service hours to graduate. GVRC provided that and the reason that he became a special education teacher and started a non-profit based on physical movement. "This place taught me what it means to be a community," he said after presenting a \$6,000 donation to GVRC.

The Hoag family, husband and wife Michael and Sue and their niece Kaitlyn topped the evening with a gift of over \$13,000 raised from the annual golf tournament sponsored by Big Sky Restaurant in Dansville, run by Michael's brother and sister-in-law. Like the Long Island tournament, many Rotarians compete. The Hoag's had a surprise donation of \$1,000 to present for the camp's rifle range from White Tail Association.

The Conklin Memorial Golf Tournament in Dansville this year picked GVRC to receive proceeds of \$1,000 and Jean and Diana Moffett \$400 used toward a pizza party.

The kindness and generosity of the many people behind the scenes at GVRC leave its long-time Director Brian "Bart" Bartalo speechless and GVRC Board President Chris Woods said it wasn't that long ago that he feared the funds had dropped so low that it would cease operating in a year. It costs approximately \$50K-\$60K/year to operate that one week. That includes one-half of the annual dues each Rotarian in GVRC's 12 supporting clubs pays. There are 529 Rotary districts worldwide, every club in those districts it supports a special needs camp. There are 5 such

camps in District 7120's sixty clubs and GVRC is the most rustic, according to

Rotary 7120 Governor Julie Carney of Avon. The week's spotty rains just added to the fun in the mud spirit of daily activities.

Special awards were part of the gathering at which staff/volunteers Claire Van Durme, Melissa Fiorentino, Meghan Woods Glieco, Joe Martin and Dr. Joan Flender of Stony Brook Pediatrics in Dansville received Paul Harris awards, Rotary's highest honor. Avon Rotarian Ernie Wiard, a GVRC Board member of 48 years was presented an engraved

plaque. A retired grocer, he has organized the annual steak dinner for this meeting for 42 years. He has been a GVRC Board president and treasurer, too. Long-time GVRC Board secretary David Henehan was not present to accept his plaque. Like Wiard, his service spans decades. A retired attorney, Henehan was Board secretary for many years.

Perry Rotary



Perry Rotary Club on Thurs., Aug. 10, 2023 conferred its highest honor to Warren Heilbronner of Rochester, formerly of Perry. Heilbronner, 90, recently made a large donation to Rotary in memory of his family. His father and brother were one -time members of the Perry club. The family's exodus from Nazi Germany to America was included in the 2001 book, Perilous Journeys: Personal Stories of German and Austrian Jews Who Escaped the Nazis. It is important to Heilbronner that he tell of this time because the world's democracies are in danger and the crimes against Jews are growing in the U.S. and abroad.

As a young man Heilbronner's father fought for his German homeland under the command of General Erwin "The Desert Fox" Rommel. He was a textile engineer who became a superintendent in his father-in-law's Stuttgart mill. In 1935 Nuremburg instituted laws that took away Jews' citizenship and most rights. The Heilbronners overcame many challenges to get out of the country doing so when Warren was just 5 and his brother Les 7. On March 29, 1939, their ship reached New York and the Heilbronners stood along the rails to view the Statue of Liberty, safe at last. Acceptance here was not easy but got easier in time. The Feinbloom textile manufacturers' George Traber hired Mr. Heilbronner eventually promoting him to superintendent. He was put in charge of the Mt. Morris plant and was part of the patented Nitey Nite line. He was reassigned to Perry to be in charge of research. Les played football for Perry, graduated Syracuse U. and worked as a Daily Orange journalist and later for the Perry Herald. He became an insurance partner with Ivan Hodges

then sole owner of the business. He was a timer, writer and supporter of Perry's race track, managed a softball team, and collected coins. Les died in 1988 of a heart attack while changing planes at O'Hare in Chicago. Dora Heilbronner was active for years in the Gray Ladies and Perry Garden Club, which honored her with an engraved marker in one of its gardens. Warren made his career in law, earning many accolades while maintaining an active life of service to the community.
