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Dear Fellow Rotarians,





## Celebrating Black History Month:



### John Lewis:

As a boy, he heard radio broadcasts of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s words during the Montgomery Bus Boycott and was compelled to become part of the movement. Lewis's most memorable act of "good trouble" occurred on March 7, 1965, when he led a group of 600 people across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, on what would be known as "Bloody Sunday." Lewis, who was then only 25 years old, marched across the bridge in the fight for equal voting rights for Black people. John Lewis was one of the leader of six prominent civil rights organizations who were instrumental in the organization of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in 1963. John Lewis also spoke and March on Washington where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said the I Have a Dream Speech. He was one of the original Freedom Riders who rode buses to highlight the segregated travel laws in the South. He helped to found and became a leader of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

## February: Black History Month

### A Brief Reflection of A Gutsy Woman & Civil Rights Activist: Claudette Colvin

Civil Rights in Montgomery, Alabama took a giant leap forward in 1955. Fifteen-year old Claudette Colvin refused to give up her bus seat to a white woman. Breaking the law of the time Colvin was arrested, handcuffed, and forcibly removed from the city bus. These series of events took place at least nine months before the famous Rosa Parks incident sparking the Montgomery bus boycott.

This gutsy young lady paid her bus fare and sat in the prescribed "colored only" section of the Montgomery City bus. The bus was crowded that day when Colvin was told to vacate her seat for a young white woman who just got on. Colvin, apparently exasperated with the unfair order refused to move. She shouted repeatedly that her constitutional rights had been violated. The bus was stopped until the police arrived, taking the fifteen-year old off to jail. Ms. Colvin said she was very lucky not to be brutalized on her way to jail that day.

Some sixty-six years later, Claudette petitioned the District Court to expunge her juvenile arrest record. Now in her 80's, Claudette received the news of her request being approved by a young black man who happened to be the sitting judge for her case. Claudette was vindicated at last.

Claudette recalled, "History kept me stuck in my seat. I felt the hand of Harriet Tubman pushing down on one shoulder and the hand of Sojourner Truth pushing down on the other."

**INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:**

**COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and POLIO**

**FEBRUARY 5, 2024**

**DISEASE PREVENTION  
AND TREATMENT**

**COVID-19:**

1. On May 11, 2023, the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency ended, according to the US Department of Health and Human Services. This does not mean the disease went away. Population levels of immunity, whether from vaccination or from the disease, are high enough to warrant this action. Over 85% of people have had at least 1 dose and over 73% are fully vaccinated. Unvaccinated and under vaccinated people are still at risk for contracting this deadly disease.
2. The Original (Monovalent) Vaccines are no longer available. Updated (Bivalent) Booster Vaccines are now Recommended for everyone 6 months and older. It provides additional protection against the Omicron variants BA.4 and BA.5, variant JN.1 (which now accounts for almost half of cases) for those who have previously been vaccinated. If you are a “late-adapter” or “health risk-taker,” I strongly encourage you to reconsider and get your vaccine now, even if you have already experienced the disease!

**INFLUENZA:**


1. Seasonal Influenza Vaccines are still available and worth getting. Influenza can be serious and deadly. Those over 65 years old should receive the High-dose version. It can be given at the same time as the COVID-19 Booster in the opposite arm. Infants over 6 months old should get their first half-dose and then a second half-dose 4 weeks later.

**RSV:**

1. Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) is another respiratory illness for which a vaccine is available. It is recommended for pregnant women, infants, adults over age 60, and others with chronic illnesses.

**POLIO:**

1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
3. There were 12 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2023, the last in Pakistan on October 24.



**Our wish is to have at least one member of the PolioPlus Society from every club.**

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#), we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

**By the numbers:**

- \$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio
- 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017
- \$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide





### NAMING PROJECTS OR EVENTS

When naming a project, event, or website URL, you must include the name of your club or district if you want to include the word Rotary or Rotarian(s). For example, instead of calling your event Rotary Bingo, call it Rotary Club of Evanston Bingo Night. You might also call it We Love Bingo, leaving out any reference to Rotary. These guidelines are outlined in the Rotary Code of Policies. Please note that when using your club name, your club must be in full control of the event or project. The Rotary name cannot be licensed to a third party. For example, if a summer camp is opening in cooperation with your club, don't name it Rotary Camp.




