To assist you in your effort, here is the **Procedure and List of Requirements** for a Rotary District Governor:

A candidate should **NOT** contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. Important information for prospective candidates:

A Nominee for District Governor <u>must</u> complete an application for consideration as District Governor and meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for seven years:
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years;
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position;
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club.
- The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 15, 2024).

After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.

- The candidate will be contacted for an interview time.
- The spouse or partner of the candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.

In celebration of Pride Month and in recognition that diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts are not just for those in minority or vulnerable populations, let's talk about what it means to be an Ally.

An Ally is a person who is not part of a particular marginalized group, but who stands up and advocates for the human rights of individuals and communities in that group. Being an Ally isn't just for straight or cisgender people, it is for everyone as within vulnerable populations, there are often more vulnerable populations. For example, LGBTQIA+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, Plus other sexual identities including pansexual and Two-Spirit) people can be allies to others within their community: a white transgender man can be an ally to transgender women of color.

Being an Ally isn't about knowing everything about a population, but it is about a commitment to ensure all individuals in a community can feel a sense of belonging and live a safe, healthy life. Many people are afraid of saying something 'wrong' and avoid engaging in conversations with those they don't know or on topics they are not comfortable with, so how does someone become an Ally?

Commit to Belonging. The core value that all humans inherently deserve to have a place and a sense of belonging and safety in their community and the commitment to being open, learning, and speaking up.

Actively Listen. Let down your walls and listen to the experiences of others so that you might find common ground and better understand their perspective. Understand your <u>Implicit Bias</u>.

Educate Yourself. Whether it's about LGBTQIA+, Women's, or BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and Persons of Color) history, recognize that you very likely don't have a lot of the history of that group. Take the time to do your own research. Use what you learn and share it with others where you can.

Speak Up. If you hear someone saying something that is not equitable or inclusive, say something. Use your privilege as an opportunity to be heard and change perspective for those with less privilege.

Create Space. Many in minority groups don't feel welcome, comfortable, or safe in all spaces. As an Ally, build spaces where all people can feel like they are safe and belong.

Understand and Share Your Privilege. Every human has different resources and opportunities that come with their identity. Understand the places where you have privilege and support others.

Be Humble and Acknowledge Mistakes. We all make mistakes and humility allows us to move through mistakes with the 3 A's, Acknowledge, Apologize and Amend. Say thank you when corrected. Learn from your mistakes and get it right the next time.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive leadership experience where selected youth develop skills as a leader while having fun and making connections. This year twenty-one candidates **converged** at Finger Lakes Community College in Canandaigua to spend time learning about themselves and the potential that they each possess.

Upon arrival, the students were nervous and very quiet. They checked in with our staff which consisted of myself as the Chair, Bill and Carrie Grove and Simon Devenesh as chaperones. The students quickly got settled into their dorm rooms and returned to start our icebreakers and ground rules for our time together. Strangers started learning names and **connections** were being made.

Our facilitator, Chris McDonald from the Rochester SW Rotary Club met with the group Sunday evening and started the leadership training. The extensive sessions went daily from 8am-7pm. Chris brings in great speakers such as: Chad McDonald who talks about anxiety and depression and mental well being, Wanda Martinez-Johncox who talks about volunteer opportunities locally and around the world, past exchange students who talk about the benefits of exchange and getting involved in all youth service opportunities, and Bach 2 Rock who unifies the team with musical collaborations. Thank you to District Governor Dave Demers for taking time to come over to FLCC and see, first hand, the impact that this program makes on the participants. It is through this kind of leadership that our youth feel seen and valued!

After a full day of learning, the students were then put into small groups to complete tasks such as creating a yearbook, designing a t-shirt and the last group made awards for each participant/wrote thank you notes for the presenters/went shopping to provide snacks for the week.

The growth that occurs in a short time, is life-changing and will benefit the participants for a lifetime! Let's **celebrate** the youth in our communities - they are our future!!

BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY

Literacy, the ability to read and write, is the most important factor in determining a person's potential life and career. For those who cannot read, the options are extremely limited – even unskilled minimum-wage jobs can be difficult to obtain. As of 2024, approximately four in five U.S. adults (79%) are literate; and approximately one in five U.S. adults (21%) are illiterate. In New York state that figure is approximately 20%.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:

COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and POLIO

DISEASE PREVENTION

COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and Other Respiratory Diseases:

The U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention has revised its guidance for when to stay home and when to return to normal activities after respiratory infections including COVID-19, Influenza, and RSV.

- 1. Individuals should stay home and away from others, including people they live with who are not sick, if they have respiratory virus symptoms that are not better explained by another cause. These symptoms include fever, chills, fatigue, cough, runny nose, and headache.
- 2. Individuals can go back to normal activities when, for at least 24 hours, both of the following are true: a.) Symptoms are getting better overall, and b.) They no longer have a fever, without the use of fever-reducing medication.
- 3. When going back to normal activities, individuals should take added precautions over the next 5 days, including taking additional steps for cleaner air, hygiene, masks, physical distancing, and testing when they will be around other people, especially older adults, young children, and those with weakened immune systems. Children under 2 should never wear a mask.
- 4. Keep in mind that people may still be able to spread the virus that made them sick, even if they are feeling better, so it is important to take extra precautions after resuming normal activities.
- 5. If individuals develop a fever or start to feel worse, they should stay home and away from others again. They should use the same criteria for returning to normal activities as when they first had symptoms and take added precautions over the next 5 days.
- 6. There is additional guidance for healthcare workers.
- 7. Additional information is available at CDC.gov and health.ny.gov

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
- 3. There were 12 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2023, the last in Pakistan on October 24, 2023. No cases have been identified in 2024.
- 4. I will be giving a detailed presentation on the PolioPlus Campaign of Rotary International at the District 7120 Training Assembly in Canandaigua on Saturday, April 13.



Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide

The Rotary International plate is available via mail through the DMV Custom Plates Unit. You can find details at: https://dmv.ny.gov/plates/rotary-international. (You will need to mail in a letter of proof of membership from your president on Rotary letterhead. Scans and PDFs are accepted.)

You can download the PDF order form https://dmv.ny.gov/forms/cp30.pdf, which you will mail in along with your letter of proof of membership.

Rotarians who currently have the old Rotary plates and want to switch to the new one should call the DMV Custom Plates Unit at 518-402-4838, Monday through Thursday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The Rotary International plate is also available with the International Symbol of Access (ISA) (formerly "handicapped" plates) on it for any registrant with a disability who qualifies for such a plate. Any individual qualifying for an ISA must contact the Custom Plates Unit at 518-402-4838 before submitting their application.

Personalized custom plates at an extra fee (you pick the characters, i.e., "RTRY"), and custom plates that include the Symbol of Access for individuals who qualify, are also available.



NAMING PROJECTS OR EVENTS

When naming a project, event, or website URL, you must include the name of your club or district. If you want to Include the word Rotary or Rotarian(s). For example, instead of calling your event. Rotary Bings, call it Rotary Choi of Evanton Bings) in Might. You insight also call it We Love Bings), leaving out any reference to Rotary. These guidelines are outlined in the Rotary Code of Policies. Please note that when using your club name, your club must be in full control of the event or project. The Rotary name cannot be licensed to a third party, for example, if a summer camp is opening in cooperation with your club, don't name it Rotary Camp.

MARK OF EXCELLENCE

Rotary club event

The Rotary wheel is the Mark of Excellence (MOE) and should be considered the secondary logo. When you use the it, we encourage you to post on your dub, district, or zone logo nearby for clarify and recognition. There is no simplified version of the MOE — the words "Rotary International" must always appear in the wheel.










Fairport Rotary Club




