The month of April brings us April showers which lead to May flowers. The environment is Rotary's focus this month. District 7120's Environmental Committee has announced a district wide contest for all clubs, the Trash Olympics. More detailed information is contained later in the Grapevine.

Rotary International has made supporting the **environment** one of its key focus areas in recent years. Here's how Rotary is contributing to environmental sustainability:

### 1. New Area of Focus

As of 2021, **Protecting the Environment** became Rotary's seventh official area of focus. This shift allowed clubs to apply for global grants to fund environmental projects, signaling a stronger commitment.

### 2. Types of Environmental Projects

Rotary clubs around the world are involved in a wide variety of environmental initiatives, such as:

- **Reforestation** planting trees to combat deforestation and absorb carbon.
- Clean water initiatives improving access to clean water and preventing pollution.
- Ocean and river cleanups removing plastics and debris from water sources.
- Renewable energy supporting solar, wind, and other renewable projects.
- Sustainable agriculture promoting eco-friendly farming practices.
- Wildlife conservation protecting endangered species and habitats.

### 3. Partnering with Environmental Organizations

Rotary often partners with NGOs, local governments, and international groups to maximize impact. For example, partnerships with **The Nature Conservancy** or **WWF** on local projects help scale their effectiveness.

### 4. Grants and Funding

Rotary clubs can apply for **Global Grants** and **District Grants** to support environmental efforts. These funds are often used to:

- Buy materials for reforestation or clean energy installations
- Educate communities about sustainability
- Implement local infrastructure that protects ecosystems

### 5. Rotaract and Youth Involvement

Rotary encourages younger generations, especially through **Rotaract** and **Interact clubs**, to lead grassroots environmental campaigns, increasing awareness and action among youth.

### 6. Environmental Days and Advocacy

Rotary clubs frequently organize and participate in activities aligned with global environmental days like:

- Earth Day
- World Environment Day
- World Oceans Day

These events often include community clean-ups, educational seminars, and eco-fairs.

Here are some **real-world Rotary environmental projects** from various regions to show how clubs are making a difference:

### 1. Kenya – Reforestation and Climate Action Rotary Club of Nairobi

- Planted over 1 million trees as part of Kenya's national initiative to increase forest cover.
- Partnered with schools and local communities to ensure long-term maintenance.
- Focused on climate mitigation and water catchment restoration.

# **2.** India – River Rejuvenation

### **Rotary Club of Coimbatore**

- Launched the Noyyal River Restoration Project, reviving a heavily polluted river.
- Worked with environmental scientists, local farmers, and government bodies.
- Focused on **desilting**, **planting native trees**, and preventing future pollution.

### 3. Philippines – Marine Conservation Rotary Club of Zamboanga City

- Partnered with marine biologists to protect sea turtle nesting sites.
- Built community awareness about ocean plastic and waste disposal.
- Organized **coastal cleanups** and installed eco-friendly bins.

### 4. United States – Solar Energy for Schools Rotary Club of Boulder, Colorado

- Installed **solar panels** in underserved schools to reduce electricity costs and teach students about renewable energy.
- Created an educational curriculum around sustainability and solar tech.

# **5.** Germany – Zero Waste Campaign Rotary Club of Munich

- Led a Zero Waste Challenge in collaboration with local businesses and schools.
- Distributed reusable kits, hosted composting workshops, and encouraged bulk shopping habits.

### 6. Brazil – Urban Garden Projects Rotary Club of São Paulo

- Transformed unused urban lots into community gardens.
- Provided fresh produce to low-income families and taught organic farming techniques.

These are just snapshots—Rotary projects are highly localized, meaning clubs often tailor efforts to address specific environmental challenges in their communities.



Select a date

Select a gathering location

Recruit volunteers including youth group and other service clubs.

Check in teams of two at the start, one to collect trash one for recyclables.

If your project is a can and bottle drive, try to gather all participants for the drive at one time for the picture. Outsize items will count as a bag. If your project is electronic recycling, make sure you have an official disposal site. Each item will count as a bag.

To be considered for the prizes, gather all your bags and take a photograph for proof. Count the number of bags and the number of participants. Divide the number of bags by the number of participants. The club with the highest score wins. Last day to report is June 15th.

- 3. Get permission to plant a Peace pole on the site.
- 4. Decide what to write on each side of the peace pole.
  - We strongly suggest one side say "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in English. The other three sides may say the same in other languages or be variations on the theme such as "May Peace Prevail in Our Community"
  - Be sure to include your Rotary Club logo on the Peace Pole.
- 5. Order your Peace Pole see the district website for ordering options

### Get the QR Code Decal to put on your Peace Pole to link to the world map.

- 6. Enjoy creating a community ceremony to plant your Peace Pole.
- 7.**Invite** children, teens, adults, seniors, Rotary members, other civic groups, schools, and clergy to your Peace Pole dedication ceremony to celebrate peace with you.
- 8.**Invite the media** to attend to tell the story and take photos.

### Peace Pole Ordering

- Peace Poles can be a variety of sizes and materials. Below are a few options for obtaining a Peace Pole for your community.
- A standard peace pole will have graphics on each of the four sides of an 8-foot post. The post and sleeve will be buried in the ground ~ 2 ½ ft. of post and six inches of sleeve will then be secured with concrete. Another option instead of using cement is to dig a two feet hole and put gravel in the bottom and pack the dirt back in and around it.
- **Option One: Order from the Local Community** using a vinyl sleeve over a pressure treated wooden post *(Estimated cost: \$110)*

Order a white composite vinyl post sleeve from **Lowe's (Item #1)** and have it sent to **Fuse Graphics in Spencerport** (191 S Union St. Spencerport, NY 14559, Attn: Harry Sotomayor).

As of 2024 the adult literacy rate in the US stands at 79% which is approximately 43 million adults with 21 % being categorized as illiterate. Alarmingly 54% of US adults demonstrate literacy skills below a 6<sup>th</sup> grade level with 20% falling even below a 5<sup>th</sup> grade level.

New York state has the <u>2<sup>nd</sup> highest percentage</u> of adults lacking basic reading and writing skills of 22.1% in the US. Despite this, NY has the **9<sup>th</sup> highest percentage** of adults with Bachelors degrees or higher of 35.7%.

Let's put the power of Rotary behind improving these statistics one adult at a time.

# Rotary District 7120's Polar Bear Plunge Makes a Splash

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On Sunday, April 6, 2025, Rotary District 7120 came together for its first annual Polar Bear Plunge at The Beachcomber on Conesus Lake. Organized and hosted by the **Rotex Rotaract Club**, the event brought together roughly 200 participants with the help of **30 different clubs** (via volunteers, participants, corporate sponsors) in our district, demonstrating Rotary's community spirit.

Thanks to the remarkable efforts of Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors, youth exchange students, and generous donors, **the event profited over \$30,000** to support these transformative youth initiatives. The Polar Bear Plunge was created to not only help our club's mission of promoting & supporting Rotary Youth Exchange in D7120 (**over \$9k!**) but also to raise funds for all five Rotary-sponsored summer camps in our district (**over \$15k!**)—Genesee Valley Rotary Camp, Camp Haccamo, Camp Onseyawa, Camp Star, and Rochester Rotary Sunshine Camp. We also



created the Rotary Club Challenge to offer further incentives to clubs to actively participate (**over \$6k!**) and support our Rotary community.

Festivities began with a lively check-in, welcome, and opportunity for fellowship–complete with live music, food, & drinks. Despite the chilly weather, spirits were high as brave "polar bears" took the plunge into the 40 degree waters. The energy onshore was equally inspiring, as supporters gathered to cheer on participants and celebrate the Rotary values of service, unity, and courage.

A variety of awards were announced following the event. Best costume honors went to Dan Cole (Caledonia-Mumford) and the "Livonia Bus Garage" team, whose creativity captured the crowd. The youngest plunger was an 8-year old, and the oldest was 78 year-old Mike May (Webster), with a special shout-out to Dolly Kujawa, Executive Director of Camp Haccamo, for her spirited participation. The highest fundraising teams were "The MayBees" in 1st (Geneseo), "The Frozen Bronze Bears" in 2nd (Geneseo), & "Ice Ice Baby" in 3rd (Friendship). Whereas the highest fundraising individuals were Lillian Sharp in 1st (Victor-Farmington), David Richardson in 2nd (Honeoye Lake), & Andrew Spreter (Fairport).

In the **Rotary Club Challenge**, which <u>measured fundraising totals per Rotarian</u> (*is it fair to all concerned?*) *Friendship* Rotary Club earned 1st place, followed by **Geneseo** in 2nd, and **Dansville** in 3rd. These top-performing clubs will each receive a corresponding portion of the proceeds to support their local projects and contributions in their name to The RI Foundation, earning Paul Harris Fellow points.

This event was more than a fundraiser—it was a celebration of what our district can achieve together. The collaboration, dedication, and service-mindedness reflected the true heart of Rotary District 7120. We extend special thanks to the Livingston County Sheriff's Office and EMS, whose presence ensured the safety of all participants, and to the Beachcomber for hosting the event.

# **MENTAL HEALTH WELLNESS:**

Sunlight and Serotonin: Exploring the Role of Sun Exposure in Mental Health Jan 13, 2025 by Tania Dutte

MENTAL HEALTH

Sunlight has long been associated with positive emotions and mental wellbeing. The phrase "sunny disposition" is more than just a metaphor, and there is a deep-seated cultural understanding of the sun's ability to lift our spirits and improve our mood.

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Research suggests there's something scientific going on here, too. Let's dive into the science behind sunlight's impact on mental wellbeing...

Sunlight Helps Ease Depression and SAD

Sunlight exposure can help to reduce symptoms of depression by increasing levels of serotonin, a neurotransmitter that plays a key role in mood regulation. Serotonin is often referred to as the "happiness hormone" because it can promote feelings of well-being and contentment. When we are exposed to sunlight, our retinas send signals to the brain, which triggers the release of serotonin which can boost our mood and energy levels.

This effect can be incredibly powerful in staving off <u>Seasonal Affective</u> <u>Disorder</u>, or "SAD." SAD is a type of depression that is triggered by changes in seasons, particularly the shorter days and fewer hours of sunlight during the winter months.

A <u>2023 study</u> published in the journal Risk Management and Healthcare Policy found that people who live in areas with more sunlight exposure tend to have greater mental health. A <u>2001 study</u> found that hospitalized patients with bipolar depression who stayed in rooms that were exposed to direct sunlight in the morning had shorter hospital stays than bipolar depression patients in rooms without morning sunlight.

<u>Research</u> shows that <u>light therapy</u> (also known as phototherapy) can be a helpful treatment for SAD. In light therapy, the recipient undergoes routine, daily exposure to bright light, typically with a specialized <u>light box</u> that mimics the color spectrum of real sunlight.

Sunlight Improves Brain Function

Feel like you're in a winter-induced brain fog? Sunlight has been scientifically proven to positively impact cognitive function, attention, and memory!

Research has uncovered sunlight's ability to <u>enhance cognitive performance</u> and potentially <u>reduce the risk</u> of mental decline and conditions like dementia. When we are exposed to sunlight, our brains produce more dopamine, a neurotransmitter that plays a role in attention, learning, and memory. A <u>2009</u> <u>study</u> in the journal Environmental Health found that among depressed participants, those exposed to lower levels of sunlight had impaired cognitive performance.

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### Sunlight Helps You Sleep Better

Sleep deprivation can take a toll on mental health, especially in the long nights of winter. **Sunlight exposure helps to regulate the body's natural** <u>sleep-wake cycle</u>. The body's circadian clock responds to light as a signal to be awake, and darkness as a signal to go to sleep. And when we get enough sunlight during the day, we are more likely to produce melatonin at night, which helps us to fall asleep and stay asleep more soundly. A <u>2022 study</u> in the Journal of Pineal Research found that not getting enough natural light during the day negatively impacts one's quality of sleep at night.

### Sunlight Reduces Stress and Anxiety

When we spend time outdoors, the exposure to natural light helps to regulate our circadian rhythms and promotes relaxation. In addition, exposure to sunlight can stimulate the production of endorphins, neurotransmitters that are focused on stress management and pain relief.

Being in the warm sun, and close to nature, can also provide a sense of peace and serenity, which can serve as a calming antidote to stress. A <u>2016 study</u> investigating the effects of nature and sunlight on employee wellness found that those who got more sunlight exposure tended to have more positive mental health, lower levels of anxiety, and higher job satisfaction.

#### Sunlight, Vitamin D, and Your Health

Vitamin D is an essential vitamin and its deficiency is linked with many signs of ill health, including feelings of depression, low mood, fatigue, muscle pain, weak bones, frequent illness and more. The primary source of this nutrient is sunlight (80-90%) and not very many foods are naturally rich in vitamin D. And

so it is important to spend some time in the sun to absorb this essential nutrient. Around 8 to 10 minutes of sun exposure at noon produces the daily recommended amount of vitamin D. And <u>studies</u> have suggested that low levels of vitamin D during pregnancy are linked to postpartum depression.

- Improved physical health: Sunlight exposure nelps to strengthen the immune system, reduce inflammation, and improve bone health.
- **Reduced risk of chronic diseases:** Sunlight exposure has been shown to reduce the risk of developing several chronic diseases, including heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes, and some types of cancer.
- **Increased social interaction:** Being outside in nature can provide an opportunity to connect with others and enjoy the company of friends and family. This can help to reduce feelings of loneliness and isolation.

### **Core Prevention Strategies**

<u>CDC recommends</u> that all people use core prevention strategies to protect themselves and others from **COVID-19**:

- Stay up to date with <u>COVID-19 vaccines</u>.
- Although vaccinated people sometimes get infected with the virus that causes COVID-19, staying up to date on COVID-19 vaccines significantly lowers the risk of getting very sick, being hospitalized, or dying from COVID-19.

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- Practice good hygiene (practices that improve cleanliness)
- Take steps for cleaner air

### When you are sick:

April

2025

- Use <u>precautions to prevent spread</u>, including staying home and away from others (including people you live with who are not sick) if you have respiratory symptoms.
- Learn when you can go back to your normal activities.

Seek health care promptly for <u>testing</u> and/or <u>treatment</u> if you have <u>risk factors for severe illness</u>. Treatment may help lower your risk of severe illness, but it needs to be started within a few days of when your symptoms begin. **Order your free COVID-19 tests at the end of September.** 

U.S. households will be eligible to order 4 free COVID-19 tests at COVIDTests.gov. The COVID-19 tests will detect current COVID-19 variants and can be used through the end of the year. Visit COVIDTests.gov

### **Additional Prevention Strategies**

In addition, there are other prevention strategies that you can choose to further protect yourself and others. <u>Wearing a mask and putting distance between yourself and others</u> can help lower the risk of COVID-19 transmission. <u>Testing for COVID-19</u> can help you decide what to do next, like getting <u>treatment</u> to reduce your risk of severe illness and taking steps to lower your chances of spreading COVID-19 to others.

### What to watch out for

Using these prevention strategies can be especially helpful when:

- Respiratory viruses, such as COVID-19, flu, and RSV, are causing a lot of illness in your community
- You or those around you have <u>risk factors</u> for severe illness
- You or those around you were recently exposed to a respiratory virus, are sick, or are recovering

### POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
- 3. There were 12 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2023, 6 in Afghanistan and 6 in Pakistan. To date, there have been 34 cases of WPV1 in 2024, 18 in Afghanistan and 16 in Pakistan.
- 4. There were 517 cases in 26 countries of circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Viruses (cVDPV) worldwide in 2023. To date in 2024, there have been 122 cases in 17 countries of cVDPV. This includes 1 case in the occupied Palestinian territory (Gaza) on July 25, 2024.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

#### Avon Rotary and Partners Build Beds for Local Children in Need

On Saturday, March 29th, the spirit of "Service Above Self" was in full swing as the Avon Rotary Club spearheaded a service project in collaboration with Sleep in Heavenly Peace – Rochester (SHP). A dedicated team of 45 volunteers came together to construct 37 beds for local children who currently lack a safe and comfortable place to sleep.

The event, held in Macedon, saw enthusiastic participation from Rotarians representing not only the Avon Club but also the Geneseo, Honeoye Falls-Mendon, Penfield, Rochester Southwest, and Spencerport Clubs. Their efforts were further bolstered by the generous involvement of friends and family, all united by a common goal.

Throughout the day, the volunteers worked in teams at specialized stations to assemble each of the components of a twin bed. One station was dedicated to assembling and sanding the side rails; another to fastening strapping tape to rolls slats; and another to sanding and constructing headboards and footboards, which were then drilled with holes to facilitate easy bolt assembly

upon delivery of the beds. As a final touch, each completed headboard and footboard was branded with the SHP logo.

SHP is an international nonprofit organization, founded in 2012, that is driven by the motto "No Child Sleeps on the Floor in Our Town." With over 300 chapters across the United States and Canada, SHP recognizes that a good night's sleep is fundamental to a child's healthy growth and development. Their core mission is to build and deliver beds to families in need, ensuring that no child has to endure the discomfort and insecurity of sleeping on the floor.

The importance of this work is underscored by scientific research. A study published in *Lancet Child & Adolescent* Health on July 29, 2022, highlighted the critical role of sufficient sleep in healthy brain development. The research indicated that children who consistently get at least nine hours of sleep experience better mental health and exhibit fewer behavioral challenges compared to those with insufficient sleep.

The Rochester chapter of SHP was established in 2019 by Donna and Shawn Ritchie. Their hard work and dedication have resulted in the delivery of over 1,150 beds to families in need throughout Monroe County. Despite their significant impact, the need remains substantial, as evidenced by SHP's waitlist of over 400 families.

"This is such a worthwhile project. Most of us take for granted a safe and comfortable bed to sleep in," said Tim Hayes, a Geneseo Rotarian who volunteered at the event. "This project was a reminder that too many children in our area go without this basic necessity. It felt good to be able to help local families take care of their kids."

The successful bed build event was supported by Avon Rotary's \$5,000 donation to Sleep in Heavenly Peace for building supplies. This contribution included \$2,910 in District Grant funding from the Rotary Foundation. The Rotary Foundation invests funds donated by Rotarians and channels them back into communities through District Grants, which local Rotary Clubs like Avon can apply for to finance projects that create meaningful change both locally and internationally. This collaborative support within the Rotary network underscores its commitment to service and community betterment.

Beyond the construction efforts, Rotarians also rallied to donate essential bedding items, which will be delivered alongside the newly built beds. Adding an extra layer of warmth and care, the Henrietta Quilt Club contributed handmade bedding, ensuring that each child receives not just a bed, but also the comfort of cozy blankets and linens.

This collaborative service project exemplifies the dedication of the Avon Rotary Club and its partners to addressing critical needs within our community. By providing these 35 beds, we are not only offering a place to sleep but also contributing to the health, well-being, and brighter futures of local children.






#### Victor– Farmington Rotary Club





His friendship, kindness, generous heart, and leadership in Rotary, Scouts, Project Christmas, LPGA, RHAFT (Rush Henrietta Area Food Terminal) and Henrietta United Church of Christ left a lasting impact on many.

One example of his leadership is the partnership he created between Rotary and RHAFT which resulted in Project Christmas. For over 30 years it has spread holiday cheer by delivering Christmas gifts to low-income Seniors living in the towns of Rush and Henrietta. It is difficult to know whether this tradition brings more joy to the Seniors receiving the gifts or the Rotarians and RHAFT members delivering them.

Rush Henrietta Rotary has a tradition of raising funds for Camp Haccamo through a live Holiday Auction every year. Charley and his wife, Patty, often brought a few containers of special homemade pickles to auction off. They were wildly popular, and it was not unusual for them to sell for over \$20 each. When asked what made them so special Charley told us they were Conversion pickles because they started off as dill pickles and were converted into sweet pickles!

Charley was a boy scout from Newark, NY, attending the National Jamboree as a teenager, with President Dwight Eisenhower as the speaker at the jamboree, and continued to pay it forward, serving as the chartered representative for Cub Scout Pack 342, sponsored by the RH Rotary Club.

One of Charley's biggest passions was golf, and through Rotary, he was involved with the LPGA tournament in Rochester to raise funds for Camp Haccamo and Camp Sunshine, connecting the professional golfers with the kids at the camps, serving as Chairman of the Tournament in 1985, and serving many years as Operations Manager at Locust Hill Country Club. Using proceeds from his construction and paving business, he built the "Executive South" 9-hole golf course on land he purchased on East Henrietta Road, teaching golf through continuing education, opening a driving range and clubhouse. When he was ready to retire, he donated the property to the Town of Henrietta to become a park and donated the operation of the driving range to the Henrietta Foundation.

In recognition of this donation, the Town named the park "Lookup Park" which still has the driving range but has converted the golf course to a disc golf course, municipal dog park, and general park, with the former clubhouse becoming Baldwin Cabin as part of the Henrietta Park System.

Rest in peace Charley, you have inspired us all to put Service above Self.
