

Nominations are Now Being Accepted for 2028-29 District Governor

The District 7120 Nominating Committee is now accepting nominations for District Governor for the Rotary Year 2028 – 2029. Are you an experienced Rotarian, with interests in getting deeper into the operation of our district? Do you have leadership skills, perhaps underutilized, that need to be exercised? Can you assemble and lead a team of like-minded, enthusiastic people?

If so, please consider submitting an application. Also, look around your club, your Rotary area and our Rotary district. Whom have you noticed with the skills needed to lead our district? Who would you like to see leading District 7120 in a few years?

Reach out and ask a few questions. Some people, very qualified people, only need a little "push" to consider accepting the rewarding challenge of helping lead a Rotary district to discover and demonstrate its potential for Service Above Self.

To assist you in your effort, here is the **Procedure and List of Requirements** for a Rotary District Governor:

A candidate should <u>NOT</u> contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. If prospective candidates have any questions, they should contact District Governor Jim Crane at jpsarchery@gmail.com, District Governor Elect Lisa Norwood at jpsarchery@gmail.com, District Governor – Nominee Peter Vogt at walkingPete1947@gmail.com

Important information for prospective candidates:

A Nominee for District Governor must complete an application for consideration as District Governor and meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years:
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position;
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club.
- The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 14, 2025).

After receiving a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.

- The candidate will be contacted for an interview time.
- The spouse or partner of the candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.



Bags, Bikes & Battery Hauls: District 7120's First-Ever Spogomi Trash Olympics!

This spring, Rotary District 7120's Environmental Action Committee (EAC), launched its first-ever **Spogomi Trash Olympics**—a friendly, districtwide competition turning community cleanups into an environmental sport! Inspired by the Japanese sport of *Spogomi (competitive trash-picking)*, the event encouraged clubs to clean up their communities while vying for cash prizes and quirky awards.

Between April 1 and June 30, six clubs—including one Rotaract Club—participated, logging over 125 volunteers, collecting nearly 70 bags of garbage and over 100 pounds of old batteries, and hauling in 43 bags of cans and bottles. Projects ranged from Adopt-A-Highway efforts and cemetery cleanups to canal sweeps.

With generous support from **Waste Management** and the **Fairport Rotary Club**, the EAC was able to offer cash prizes—\$500 for first place, \$300 for second—plus plaques for the clubs that found the **weirdest** and **grossest** items during their efforts.



1st Place: Geneseo Rotary Club (2.53 bags/person)

Geneseo hosted two events: a Temple Hill Cemetery clean-up and a can/bottle drive that brought in \$496 in deposit refunds. Though they didn't find anything especially gross or weird, their consistent turnout and impressive results earned them the gold medal (and \$500!).

2nd Place: Canandaigua Rotary Club (1.56 bags/person)
Canandaigua got creative with their own local Trash Olympics and followed up with an Adopt-A-Highway event. Their haul included 36 bags of trash, 8 tires, and—perhaps most impressively—a full stop sign and post.

Honorable Mention: Bloomfield Rotary Club (1.17 bags/person) Bloomfield focused on their Adopt-A-Highway Route on NY-5 & 20. Their collaboration with local Scouts and consistent cleanup work landed them in the top three.

Grossest Item: Rochester Southwest Rotary Club with its mud-covered child's bike, found during their annual Erie Canal Clean Sweep event, took top (or bottom?) honors.

Weirdest Item: SUNY Brockport Rotaract discovered a "ratty green chair" during their Earth Day Canal Walk clean-up which stood out among many oddball finds.

Awards will be presented at the District's One Summit on Saturday, September 6th at Avon High School.

Not Just a Game

The Trash Olympics wasn't just about prizes—it was about impact. Participating clubs made a tangible difference in their communities while building camaraderie and raising environmental awareness. "This competition was a great way to get clubs involved in service, have some fun, and build awareness around environmental issues," said Past District Governor, Ralph Brandt. "Next year, we hope even more clubs will join in!"

Congratulations to all the winners—and to everyone who stepped up to clean up! Let's keep building a cleaner, greener District 7120.




A new and improved Rotary Learning Center app

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative**, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide




Rotary Camp Onseyawa Golf Tournament

Dansville Rotary Club





Stove Team Challenge

Since 2020, the district has supported StoveTeam International in Central America. StoveTeam crosses several key Rotary areas of focus (Environment, Building Economy, and Health and Safety) and does not neatly fit any one committee's area of responsibility. Consequently, the Geneseo Club is coordinating a district wide challenge to support StoveTeam. We are dedicating \$500.00 dollars of our Can and Bottle drive profits (two stoves) to the project and challenging other clubs to match or exceed the amount. The drive will go from August 15th to October 31st. We will advertise how many stoyes each club is able to sponsor at the end of the drive. This is an actual chance for each club to make a real and quantifiable difference in the world. Below is a quick explanation of what they do from their website:

Each year, smoke inhalation from indoor cooking fires kills more people than malaria and AIDS combined. And CO2 emissions from cooking fires are a major contributor to climate change. StoveTeam partners with communities in Central America to deliver and sustain clean cookstove solutions that improve health, protect the environment, and ignite lasting change. Help us save lives and forests!

Nuevo Palmar, located in the Quetzaltenango department of Guatemala, is a community in urgent need. In 2023, the mayor approached the Retalhuleu Rotary Club, seeking help for over 500 families still cooking over open fires. With the support of Rotary Clubs across the U.S. and their partnership with the Rotary Club of Retalhuleu, StoveTeam has placed 70 cookstoves so far in 2025, with an additional 40 preparing to be built before the fall. Each Justa Cookstove costs about \$250 to place, which includes materials, labor, and monitoring and evaluation of the stove for five years. If each club can contribute \$250. We will have collected enough to build stoves for sixty-six families which will make a huge dent in the needs of Nuevo Palmar.

Participating clubs should make checks payable to StoveTeam International and send them on to the our Treasurer Bonnie Swanson P.O. Box 216. Geneseo, NY 14454-0216. Bonnie will forward them to Stove Team. We will publish results in the September, October, and November Grapevine issues.

Spencerport Rotary Club

A recently approved District Grant for the Spencerport Fire Department will be used to purchase thermal imaging cameras for fire training. The cameras will enhance firefighter training safety and effectiveness and be used by instructors during live fire training in their burn building facility, where recruits learn essential interior firefighting techniques.

In a live fire environment, visibility can be reduced to near zero due to thick smoke conditions. Thermal imaging cameras (TICs) are a critical tool that allow instructors to monitor students in real time, ensuring they maintain proper fire attack techniques and avoid hazardous conditions. Without these



cameras, instructors must rely on limited visibility, making it difficult to assess students' movements and safety in real time.
