



## Literacy Corner

Rotary clubs showcase literacy at Christmas by distributing books to children, often as part of holiday events like "Children's Christmas Parties" or "Santa Clara Rotary's Christmas 4 Kids". These initiatives provide new books as gifts, stock community "Christmas Stores" with books, or fund school-based literacy programs to promote reading during the holidays.

### Ways Rotary supports literacy at Christmas

Each of the following categories will be rated on a 0 to 5 point basis unless otherwise noted.

3. **Graphics, photos, and color:** use of these items to enhance the story or to illustrate.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:  
COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and POLIO

IT'S TIME TO GET YOUR UPDATED 2025-2026 COVID-19 and INFLUENZA VACCINES, EVEN IF YOU WERE PREVIOUSLY VACCINATED and EVEN IF YOU WERE PREVIOUSLY SICK WITH THESE VIRUSES! THEY CAN BE GIVEN SIMULTANEOUSLY.

**INFLUENZA:** The New York State Department of Health recommends that everyone aged 6 months or older get a seasonal flu vaccine. (The seasonal influenza virus is not approved for use in children younger than 6 months old, but their risk of flu complications is higher than for any other child age group. The best way to protect children younger than 6 months against seasonal influenza is to make sure members of their household and their caregivers are vaccinated. The same can be said for households in which anyone has a chronic disease, especially lung disease such as asthma or emphysema. Get vaccinated to protect yourself and your loved ones! See [Flu \(Influenza\)](#) for more information.

**COVID-19:** COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. The governor has issued an executive order to assure the vaccine is available. Everyone over age 65 and anyone else who has chronic disease should get this vaccine. Others may benefit as well by reducing their risk of illness during the winter months. **RSV (RESPIRATORY SYNCYTIAL VIRUS):** RSV is a highly contagious virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms but can be serious, especially in infants and older adults. In adults it can cause pneumonia, infections of the bronchioles (bronchiolitis), and can exacerbate underlying chronic lung disease. RSV Vaccination is recommended for adults age 60 and older and for pregnant women. Each year in the U.S., RSV leads to approximately 60,000-120,000 hospitalizations and 6,000-10,000 deaths among adults 65 years of age and older. The governor's executive order also applies to the RSV Vaccine. RSV does NOT need a second vaccine. See [Respiratory Syncytial Virus \(RSV\) Infection](#) for more information.


**To protect against respiratory viruses, the Department of Health recommends commonsense precautions, including:**

- Staying up to date on all vaccines, including the RSV vaccine (if eligible).
- Washing hands often with soap and hot water for least 20 seconds.
- Not coughing or sneezing into hands.
- Staying home when sick or symptomatic.
- Those wishing to further protect themselves from respiratory viruses such as RSV disease may consider wearing a well-fitting, high-quality mask when in public indoor spaces.

**POLIO:**

1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
3. There were 99 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2024, 25 in Afghanistan and 74 in Pakistan. To date, there have been 28 cases of WPV1 in 2025, 4 in Afghanistan and 24 in Pakistan.
4. There were 463 cases in 21 countries of circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Viruses (cVDPV) worldwide in 2024. To date in 2025, there have been 142 cases in 16 countries of cVDPV.

I am available to provide club programs on Rotary's PolioPlus Campaign, as well as other programs on The Rotary Foundation.



**Our wish is to have at least one member of the PolioPlus Society from every club.**

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#), we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

**By the numbers:**

- \$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio
- 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017
- \$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide


The Corning Club recently had the opportunity via Zoom to talk with our exchange student Maren Benjamin, currently in Brazil.

Maren presented a PowerPoint with pictures of places and people she has met. She described her school, families and friends as well as the opportunities and challenges she has experienced while there.




## CHURCHVILLE-CHILI INTERACT CLUB

Rob Merkle, Director of Training for the Victor Farmington Ambulance Corps, recently spoke to the V-F Rotary club on the five decades of service they have provided to the community since they were founded in 1970.

The V-F Ambulance Corps has had an evolving and dramatic impact on providing medical services for the community that has required additional resources, implementation for adapting to rapidly changing technology and increased professionalization and training for their personnel.

The towns of Victor and Farmington are the two largest townships in Ontario county and continue to grow at a rapid pace. Rob discussed the rapidly expanding population growth of the V-F community, including the approval of an additional 3,000 residential units in Farmington over the next few years, and how this will create more demands on their services.

These adjustments include expanding their ambulance bases to three full-time bases and a fourth part-time base at the Victor Fire Department; a fleet of six fully equipped ambulances and three first responder vehicles; expanding their professional staff to 18 full-time paramedics and nine full-time EMTs; a comprehensive educational

program involving internships, AED locations, CPR training, health classes with Victor school district, and a loan program for medical devices.

The V-F ambulance Corps has come a long way from 1970 when they started with a single ambulance to cover the two townships and basically were trained to deliver first aid services while transporting patients to local hospitals.



# Obituary

Karen Parkhurst, RIP - December



The Victor-Farmington Rotary Club was deeply saddened on December 4th by the sudden passing of Club Secretary Karen Parkhurst, a club member since 2004. Karen was a long-time club secretary and a former District 7120 District Secretary. At the time of her passing she was serving as the D-7120 Rotary Foundation Chair. Karen was a native of Chicago, attended Loyola University, and a graduate of Roberts Wesleyan College (MBA).

Karen previously served as the V-F Rotary Club President. In 2015 Karen retired as the Chief Financial Officer for New Energy Works in Farmington. She was a resident of Canandaigua.

Karen went far and beyond the average Rotarian in pursuing the goals and objectives of Rotary. There was no club project or activity that did not involve Karen's involvement. Early on in her Rotary career she became involved in supporting the Rotary Foundation and would eventually graduate to the Major Donor level. Karen was active in supporting many of the grant programs under

Foundation auspices. Karen not only made a commitment to financially support the Foundation, but she also continuously urged club members to "get involved."

Karen's dedication to promoting Rotary's goal of serving others can best be described as "ACTA NON VERBA." She not only donated financial support for the many projects she promoted, but Karen also took direct action. When the V-F Rotary club became involved in Foundation projects in Nicaragua, Argentina, Paraguay, etc., Karen would often travel to these projects to make certain the objectives were being met. On a local basis, the many club service projects that benefitted from Karen's involvement are too many to list. She strongly supported educational projects with both the Victor Central School District and the inner-city schools in Rochester, particularly the Franklin Campus. At the time of her passing she was involved with the club's Christmas project (Giving Tree) to provide gifts to seniors, shut-ins, low-income families, and those in need, as well as the club's annual partnership with the Victor-Farmington Community Library's "Day of Giving" for children.

Karen would often describe how in 2004 she was made aware of Rotary, and all that Rotary does around the world, when she joined the club. Being a Rotarian opened new horizons for her to serve others. For over two decades she truly made an impact and Rotarians in the Victor-Farmington Rotary Club, District 7120, and around the world, are better because of it.


