• **Support for Local Peace Initiatives**: Identify and support existing local organizations that work towards peacebuilding and conflict prevention.

 \checkmark Implementation: Allocate resources, volunteer support, or grants to these organizations. Engage with them to understand their needs and how Rotary can best assist their efforts. **Peace poles are a** way for clubs to show their commitment to peace.

• Online Campaigns for Peace Awareness: Use social media and online platforms to promote peace awareness and education.

✓ Implementation: Create and share content highlighting the importance of peace, stories of successful peace initiatives, and educational material about conflict resolution. Encourage members to participate and share these resources widely.

Remember to reach out to someone you have had a conflict with in the past and do not talk to. Make the effort to reconcile your differences.

Our actions, however small they may seem, contribute significantly to the larger picture of global peace and understanding. By engaging in these activities, we foster peace in our immediate environments and set an example for others to follow.

Role and Responsibilities

- Serve as the District Governor's official representative among the designated Rotary clubs.
- Support club effectiveness by assisting the governor with the administration of designated clubs, including the timely submission of semi-annual reports, payment of RI and District dues, and monthly membership and attendance statistics.
- Visit each club regularly, at least quarterly, to meet with the club president and other club leaders to discuss the business of the club and resources available to them.
- Assist club leaders in planning and preparing for the governor's official visit.
- Keep the governor informed about clubs, and suggest ways to enhance Rotary development and resolve difficulties.
- Ensure appropriate financial stewardship of club funds by club leaders.
- Serve as a two-way communication link between clubs and District committees
- Promote the implementation of the Club Leadership Plan, including the Assistant Governor's club.
- Encourage clubs to implement the governor's requests and recommendations
- Share "best practices" from their designated clubs with each other, and with other Rotary clubs.
- Monitor and motivate clubs to achieve club goals relating to membership development and retention, and support for The Rotary Foundation.

• Assist clubs in researching and implementing effective community and international service projects.

• Assist clubs in completing the activities which will lead to the Presidential Citation for the club, and the submission of the certification form to the governor by 1st April each year.

- Identify and develop leaders capable of serving Rotary beyond the club level.
- Promote attendance at the District Conference and the International Convention.



Hosted by the Rotary Youth Exchange Committee and the Rotex Rotaract Club, the event will take place on **Sunday, April 6,** 2025, at noon at **The Beachcomber** on Conesus Lake (5911 West Lake Road, Conesus, NY, 14435).

Event Highlights:

The event will begin at noon with registration and sign-in. Participants will turn in the money they raised and enjoy live music, food and drinks, and a Rotary classic, the 50/50 raffle.

The Plunge will take place in rounds, with individuals and teams grouped by age. The event will conclude with an awards ceremony, recognizing the following:

- The top three individual and team fundraisers
- The best individual and team costumes
- The youngest and oldest plungers

How You Can Get Involved:

We are seeking **individual participants** and **teams** to take the plunge. Participants will raise funds through sponsorships from family, friends, and colleagues. The event is also welcoming **corporate sponsors** at all tier levels. To sign up, individuals and teams can visit the event's **webpage on the District 7120 website**. The general public or businesses interested in becoming donors or sponsors are encouraged to contact the Rotex Rotaract Club for more information.

Participants who raise \$100 or more will receive a free lunch donated by The Beachcomber. Those who raise \$200 or more will also receive a custom event t-shirt (additional t-shirts will be available for purchase by participants and attendees). Teams can also earn these perks by meeting fundraising thresholds based on team size or by raising a minimum of \$1,500 overall.

Fund Allocation:

All proceeds will be distributed as follows:

50% of funds raised will support Rotary-sponsored summer camps, including <u>Rochester Rotary Sunshine Camp</u>, <u>Camp</u> <u>Haccamo</u>, <u>Camp Onseyawa</u>, <u>Genesee Valley Rotary Camp</u>, and <u>Camp Star</u>.

40% of funds raised will go to the <u>Rotary Youth Exchange</u> and the <u>Rotex Rotaract</u> operating budgets, which includes scholarships to enable students from all economic backgrounds to participate in international youth exchanges.

• The remaining 10% will be allocated as the reward money for our Rotary Club Fundraising Challenge to be donated to the <u>Rotary International Foundation</u>.

The Rotary Club Fundraising Challenge:

All donations made to the Polar Plunge will have the option to credit a specific club within our district. During the event, donations will be counted, and the club that raises the most money (via individuals, teams, and/or corporate sponsors) will have the 10% portion of the proceeds raised to be donated to the RI Foundation in their name, supporting Rotary's global humanitarian efforts. The winning club will also receive special recognition at the annual Rotary District 7120 Conference in Corning, NY (May 2-4, 2025).

6. Member Recognition: new member biography, accomplishments, fines.



The amount of your time needed depends on the number of submissions this year. Previous year's range 7-16 submissions. Judging will not start until April 2, so I just need to know if you are interested in helping. You will receive a simple spreadsheet on April 2 with links to the pages to evaluate. put in your scores on the sheet, and then email the results back to me. You should spend 5-15 minutes per site scoring them based on the judging criteria available on the website link above.

One bonus benefit to you being a judge, is you get to look at the best of the district club websites and Facebook pages and take any cool ideas you discover and apply them back to your own club website and Facebook pages. And yes, you can be a judge of your own club site, you are a Rotarian so we trust your integrity. The other nice thing about judging is that each judge will apply their OWN PERSONAL criteria in each cate- gory and for the score. Just be consistent club to club. This should take you a couple of hours at the most.

Create Your Peace Pole Project

Become a Peace Builder and plant a Peace Pole to inspire peace within and between all people

- 1.Link with a group of people in your community.
- 2.**Find a location** to put a Peace Pole.
- 3. Get permission to plant a Peace pole on the site.
- 4. Decide what to write on each side of the peace pole.
 - We strongly suggest one side say "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in English. The other three sides may say the same in other languages or be variations on the theme such as "May Peace Prevail in Our Community"
 - Be sure to include your Rotary Club logo on the Peace Pole.
- 5. Order your Peace Pole see the district website for ordering options

Get the QR Code Decal to put on your Peace Pole to link to the world map.

- 6. Enjoy creating a community ceremony to plant your Peace Pole.
- 7.**Invite** children, teens, adults, seniors, Rotary members, other civic groups, schools, and clergy to your Peace Pole dedication ceremony to celebrate peace with you.
- 8.**Invite the media** to attend to tell the story and take photos.

Peace Pole Ordering

- Peace Poles can be a variety of sizes and materials. Below are a few options for obtaining a Peace Pole for your community.
- A standard peace pole will have graphics on each of the four sides of an 8-foot post. The post and sleeve will be buried in the ground ~ 2 ½ ft. of post and six inches of sleeve will then be secured with concrete. Another option instead of using cement is to dig a two feet hole and put gravel in the bottom and pack the dirt back in and around it.
- **Option One: Order from the Local Community** using a vinyl sleeve over a pressure treated wooden post *(Estimated cost: \$110)*

Order a white composite vinyl post sleeve from **Lowe's (Item #1)** and have it sent to **Fuse Graphics in Spencerport** (191 S Union St. Spencerport, NY 14559, Attn: Harry Sotomayor).

Contact fusecreative@gmail.com or phone 585-509-0954 to make arrangements (provide expected delivery date, design and graphics for each side). Estimated cost for printing - \$10/side plus \$10 for the Rotary logo - \$50.

Trash Olympics; A Fun Spring Environmental Activity

As we approach Spring, the EAC is proposing an activity that can add some fun to environmental projects. We are sponsoring a SpoGomi-type event. SpoGomi is a Japanese invented sport that is roughly translated as "competitive trash picking". The pure Japanese rules are too restrictive for our district's purposes, but we thought the competition aspect would be a fun

activity that would encourage additional community involvement. Some of the normal Spring clean-up activities that would lend themselves to the competition are:

- Spring community clean-up projects
- Adopt a Highway programs
- Watershed clean-ups
- Can and bottle drives
- Community compost material drives

The rules for the Trash Olympics are simple:

- Once the activity is finished for the day/week the club will take a picture of the participants with their haul The number of bags collected will be divided by the number of participants. Items too big to be counted as a bag (examples: a club with 20 participants collecting 60 bags would have a score of 3.0, a club of 10 participants collecting 10 bags would have a score of 1.0)

- The club with the highest average wins. If other community organizations participate, their members should be included in the total participating. Prizes will be awarded to the most unusual item, and the grossest item. - Most Clubs use industrial trash bags. This would make scoring easier.

- The dates of the competition would be April 1st to June 30th. Clubs may begin earlier than April, but must be finished by June 30th.

- Clubs that do trash pickups and can and bottle drives can send two or more pictures, one for each event. The total will be tabulated.

- A monthly scorecard will appear in the May and June issues of the Grapevine, with the winner announced in the July issue with the DG presenting the trophy in July.

- Clubs are encouraged to conduct multiple events, the total of which will count toward the competition.





Core Prevention Strategies

<u>CDC recommends</u> that all people use core prevention strategies to protect themselves and others from **COVID-19**:

- Stay up to date with <u>COVID-19 vaccines</u>.
- Although vaccinated people sometimes get infected with the virus that causes COVID-19, staying up to date on COVID-19 vaccines significantly lowers the risk of getting very sick, being hospitalized, or dying from COVID-19.

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- Practice good hygiene (practices that improve cleanliness)
- Take steps for cleaner air

When you are sick:

- Use <u>precautions to prevent spread</u>, including staying home and away from others (including people you live with who are not sick) if you have respiratory symptoms.
- Learn when you can go back to your normal activities.

Seek health care promptly for <u>testing</u> and/or <u>treatment</u> if you have <u>risk factors for severe illness</u>. Treatment may help lower your risk of severe illness, but it needs to be started within a few days of when your symptoms begin. **Order your free COVID-19 tests at the end of September.**

U.S. households will be eligible to order 4 free COVID-19 tests at COVIDTests.gov. The COVID-19 tests will detect current COVID-19 variants and can be used through the end of the year. Visit COVIDTests.gov

Additional Prevention Strategies

In addition, there are other prevention strategies that you can choose to further protect yourself and others. <u>Wearing a mask and putting distance between yourself and others</u> can help lower the risk of COVID-19 transmission. <u>Testing for COVID-19</u> can help you decide what to do next, like getting <u>treatment</u> to reduce your risk of severe illness and taking steps to lower your chances of spreading COVID-19 to others.

What to watch out for

Using these prevention strategies can be especially helpful when:


- Respiratory viruses, such as COVID-19, flu, and RSV, are causing a lot of illness in your community
- You or those around you have risk factors for severe illness
- You or those around you were recently exposed to a respiratory virus, are sick, or are recovering

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
- 3. There were 12 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2023, 6 in Afghanistan and 6 in Pakistan. To date, there have been 34 cases of WPV1 in 2024, 18 in Afghanistan and 16 in Pakistan.
- 4. There were 517 cases in 26 countries of circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Viruses (cVDPV) worldwide in 2023. To date in 2024, there have been 122 cases in 17 countries of cVDPV. This includes 1 case in the occupied Palestinian territory (Gaza) on July 25, 2024.
- ^{5.} I am available to provide club programs on Rotary's PolioPlus Campaign, as well as other programs on The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio
430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017
\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide

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Elmira Rotary Club



Every Thursday for the past four or five years a Grandmother, and her two Grandchildren come down after lunch and sit on my bench next to the library. She reads a book to them, and they take one home as well. My sub-division keeps my library well stocked up with children and adult books. Over the summer I go to garage sales and see what books I can get for the library, in order to stock it up before school starts in Sept.

In early December this year, I came home, and I saw an Amazon truck parked out in front of the library and the driver is looking at books in the library. I asked him if he found something he liked- (*Now the good part*). He said there was a Christmas book he had when he was a child called -The Little Shepard Who Lost His Baby Sheep at Christmas or something like that. A few days earlier he had told his three-year-old daughter about this book and how much he loved it as a kid, but he lost the book when the family moved to Texas.

As he turned my street corner that day, he saw **THAT** book sitting in the window of the library. -got chills yet?? He knew nothing about the Little Free Library program. I told him about the website and on the website, there is a location map. You can type in any zip code or town anywhere in the world and then watch the libraries populate on the map. It made his Christmas !!

Many times, as Rotarians, we do things or give money to the club or the RI Foundation not knowing if we really are making a difference in our town or the world. The story above showed me **WE ARE!! and We Do Every Day!**

So, if your club is looking for a District Grant idea, this is a great club project. The club builds them or buys them from the Little Free Library website. Let your Town or School District know about the project and solicit applications through your website or schools in the area. You do this in order to find the locations that best fit the library's accessibility. You then collect books to get the library stocked upon the delivery of the library to the homeowner. The homeowner (steward) is responsible for installing the library, painting it, and keeping it stocked with the books. The Little Free Library mails you the official plaque to put on the library and their website.

The Little Free Library Website has all the building instructions, installation in the ground instructions, to do lists to get your project going, and how to register the library – here is the weblink <u>https://littlefreelibrary.org/</u> Have some Rotary FUN!!!


Grant to bring water and sanitation to the campus that serves children orphaned by families because they have special needs.






