

Rotarians.

As we start our new Rotary year, I hope you and your family had a great Independence Day weekend.

A Big Thank you to our PDG Dave DeMers and his wife Anne for a great and successful District 7120 year. Following the 2024-2025 Theme the Magic of Rotary they inspired us to grow Rotary by increase our Impact, Engage our communities, Expanding our Reach of participation, and Adapt to new ideas.

*We start out our 2025-2026 year with a change of leadership at the Top:

Following the unexpected resignation of RI President-elect Mário César Martins de Camargo which took effective 8 June. With only a few days before the start of the International Convention, this required the R.I. Board conducted a special session. Guided by the RI code and policies, the Board selected the new president-elect from a pool of candidates who were considered by the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in August 2023.

Francesco Arezzo has been selected by the Board of Directors to become Rotary International's president for 2025-26. Francesco is a member of the Rotary Club of Ragusa, Italy, A Rotary member for more than 30 years,

The 2025-26 presidential message, announced at the 2025 Rotary International Assembly in February, will remain Unite for Good, which calls on Rotary members to be a force for unity in a world increasingly divided by politics, geography, and ideology. Through service projects, Rotary brings together people of every background — across races, religions, and professions — in a shared mission to do good in their communities.

I have included an insight to our New RI President, we are sharing most of his opening message from the Rotary international Convention.

*FRANCESCO AREZZO, RI PRESIDENT-ELECT'S REMARKS

We have a year of service ahead of us. As I said a week ago, I was playing with my grandchildren in our living room at home, and two days later, I was on a plane to arrive here, with a thousand thoughts, a thousand doubts, and a lot of confusion in my head. Rotary International presidents usually have two years to plan their year; I have two weeks!

Well, I said to myself, let's not lose our cool. Let's start with the fundamentals.

Let us start with our annual message, Unite for Good. Let us examine it for a moment. In my opinion, it is an extraordinary message in its simplicity, brevity, and impact.

Unite: to unite, reconcile, gather around. Unite can be understood in two different manners. You have to unite in space and time. Uniting in space means involving all members, but not only members, in our service. It means involving organizations that function as partners, local administrations, other voluntary associations.

In short, it means "expand our reach."

It means increasing our membership. In many parts of the Rotary world, we are not

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growing. In fact, we have been losing membership for years. This remains one of the areas of action we will have to focus on during this year. The most effective way to increase membership is, first of all, to increase retention. We lose too many members, especially members admitted in the previous two to three years.

Maybe they did not find what they were looking for? Maybe the club experience was not what they expected? Improving the club experience must be another imperative during the year, making ample use of all the possibilities we have to apply great flexibility. Let us make more use of new types of clubs, for example, satellite clubs or clubs of purpose.

Let us set no limits on creativity, let us adapt new forms of clubs to our local culture and traditions.

Unite also means expanding one's reach and working to benefit not only the local community but also needs far beyond our borders.

In short, unity means working in harmony, building bridges, involving as many people as possible to achieve more and more effective results.

Unite can also be understood as unity in time. In other words, it points to the need to work serenely with those before you and those after you. An annual project can be limiting. A project that lasts one year will rarely be transformational but will always remain on the surface of the problem. If we really want to change the world and people's lives, we must plan bigger, with multiyear projects. Our assignments may only last one year, but we must work and plan with those who precede us and with those who follow us.

Remember, it is never my year; it is always and only the year of Rotary.

We are called to undo our egos for the good of Rotary and the communities we serve.

For good. We have joined together to do what? For the good of humanity. For good indicates what our goals are.

What are mine?

First, along with membership, is the eradication of polio. We are always a few steps away from a success that is denied from year to year.

But we are there now — every year we are closer and closer — and it is our duty not to break the promise we made so many years ago. We can do it — we have the means and the right partners, we have our infinite tenacity. We can do it. And we will do it.

And the last goal is peace.

That's it: polio, membership, peace.

What do I mean by peace?

Peace for me is what we do best and what we do every day. Taking a young person to a peace center or sending a young person to another country on a Youth Exchange is working for peace.

Preventing and curing disease is working for peace.

Providing clean drinking water or sanitation where there is none is working for peace.

To have women give birth in a safe environment and take care of their children is working for peace.

To improve the environment in which we live, to support girls' education, to give economic support to those who cannot open their businesses, all this is working for peace.

We are a great, immense machine that has been working for peace for more than a century.

More background information can be found in our vision.

Together. It is a word that must always stand out prominently in all our workplaces.

Together. Alone we go nowhere, any difficulty will seem insurmountable. Let us leave the Superman we think we are in the attic and learn instead to value the team, to use our infinite different skills, to look at problems from different points of view.

Alone we lose, together we win, always.

We see a world. We look far ahead, and in our vision of tomorrow, we transfer our dreams.

Dreaming is indispensable. A poet of the last century said that you begin to die the very moment you stop dreaming. Never stop dreaming.

Dreaming is a consequence of enthusiasm and in turn generates enthusiasm. If we cannot dream and make our members dream, we will hardly have a successful year.

But dreaming is not enough. We have to act. We are People of Action.

To conclude, I want to tell you a story.

Many years ago, a young professional joined a Rotary club. He immediately made himself useful and tried to cooperate to the best of his ability.

After a few years, he was offered the position of president. He refused, because he suffered from a stutter and the idea of having to speak in public on a regular basis terrified him. But his colleagues insisted so much that they eventually convinced him. Surrounded by the support and affection of his associates, he passed the test successfully and began attending the district.

After a few years, they offered him the position of governor. Again, he gave up, for it was one thing to speak to a limited number of people, made up of friends and acquaintances. It was quite another to speak to a much larger and mostly unknown audience. They convinced him.

Again and again, the experience was positive. To make a long story short, after a few years he became a director of Rotary International, and now, at this moment, he stands before you, president-elect of Rotary International.

A great Sicilian writer, Luigi Pirandello, used to say that each of us builds a mask to face the outside world, without anyone being able to see our true personality. Before I came on this stage, I took off my mask, and now I show myself to you somewhat naked.

I show you my fears and flaws; I also tell you about my dreams.

And of everything — dreams, fears, flaws — I make you a gift. I ask you to give me your dreams. Each one of us has many in the drawer. Let us unite them, let us create one great shared dream that unites us, that excites us, that changes the world and changes our lives, too. But let us act upon them and deliver to our communities.

I owe it to you, because Rotary has changed me, changed my life profoundly. If the young professional who was afraid to speak to his club, because of the risk of making a fool of himself, can now get up on a stage and speak, in a language which is not his own, to an audience of thousands, well, I owe it all to all the Rotarians I have met in my life and who have always supported me and surrounded me with their affection. I am confident that you will give me all the support and affection I have always found in Rotary.

Together, we can unite.

We can unite to change lives, including our own.

We can unite to change communities, right around the corner and half a world away.

We can unite to change our world for the better, not just for us, but for generations to come.

Together, we Unite for Good.





Role and Responsibilities


- Serve as the District Governor's official representative among the designated Rotary clubs.
- Support club effectiveness by assisting the governor with the administration of designated clubs, including the timely submission of semi-annual reports, payment of RI and District dues, and monthly membership and attendance statistics.
- Visit each club regularly, at least quarterly, to meet with the club president and other club leaders to discuss the business of the club and resources available to them.
- Assist club leaders in planning and preparing for the governor's official visit.
- Keep the governor informed about clubs, and suggest ways to enhance Rotary development and resolve difficulties.
- Ensure appropriate financial stewardship of club funds by club leaders.
- Serve as a two-way communication link between clubs and District committees
- Promote the implementation of the Club Leadership Plan, including the Assistant Governor's club.
- Encourage clubs to implement the governor's requests and recommendations
- Share "best practices" from their designated clubs with each other, and with other Rotary clubs.
- Monitor and motivate clubs to achieve club goals relating to membership development and retention, and support for The Rotary Foundation.
- Assist clubs in researching and implementing effective community and international service projects.
- Assist clubs in completing the activities which will lead to the Presidential Citation for the club, and the submission of the certification form to the governor by 1st April each year.
- Identify and develop leaders capable of serving Rotary beyond the club level.
- Promote attendance at the District Conference and the International Convention.

Dealing with Transition and Change:

July is a month of many transitions. For Rotary it is a time for change of leadership. For many it is summer vacation planning, children out of school, and others graduating. Some change jobs and others have lost jobs. There are changes in outdoor activities, outdoor home maintenance and even changes in the food we eat.

Change can cause stress and anxiety. Good or bad, we need to find ways to adapt and cope with transitions. Life transitions are inevitable and an important part of our personal grown and our lives.

Try to normalize change since transitions will always continue and can be interesting and challenging.

Despite stress and anxiety, it is best to find the positive part of change. They can provide new opportunities, personal growth, and a chance to develop new skills.

Ways to cope with the difficult parts of change:

- 1) Loss may be felt by leaders who are leaving their leadership roles. It is important to remember the positive experiences and to continue to be active,
- 2) It is important to seek support from others who have had similar changes and seek advice from them.
- 3) Remember how you worked through changes in the past and were successful and use those coping tools again.
- 4) Prepare for new changes keeping schedules and planners and pace yourself.
- 5) Continue to try to focus on the positive sides of change and excitement of it.
- 6) Have other activities or hobbies to help focus on other areas of your life to distract from any negative thoughts about transitions.

The Mindset you apply to transitions will have a great impact on how you adapt to them.





Our wish is to have at least

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide

District 7120 now has a PolioPlus Society recognized by Rotary International. To become a member, you pledge to donate \$100.00 or more per year until Polio is eradicated in the world. October 24th is World Polio Day – please consider participating by making this pledge. The commitment form is below! Remember that every dollar is matched 2 to 1 by the Gates Foundation.

Get the QR Code Decal to put on your Peace Pole to link to the world map.


- 6. Enjoy creating a community ceremony to plant your Peace Pole.






CAMP ONSEYAWA READY TO OPEN!

Dear Fellow Rotarians.

As we speak, the kids and staff are packing for summer camp. Wow – Season No. 69! The camp is ready to open and the staff is putting the final touches to the program. You can't beat the basics of camp – aquatics, campcraft, field sports, dinning hall food, campfires, carnivals, hiking the woods, and getting some rest in your cabin.

Our monthly board meetings have been well attended and the planning all year will bring another successful season. We honor the support of 19 Rotary Clubs for supporting these kids who truly need a camp experience. Your club should be very proud of this Rotary project and the incredible teamwork.



The 2025 budget was approved by the Onseyawa Board in April. With the move to Camp Whitman and some

rising costs, the board continues to successfully balance the budget. The 2024 budget ended with a nice balance due to the success of the golf tournament, annual dinner, foundation support, and business/ personal donations. This will allow the board to complete a long-standing goal of increasing summer staff salaries.

We thank so many clubs for going the extra mile to support a number of capital improvements. We also thank the five Rotary Clubs who have supported the 2024 special projects by securing \$8,080 from the Rotary Foundation Simplified Grant program: Ontario/ Walworth, Red Jacket, Geneva, Dundee, and Waterloo Rotary Clubs. We just received more good news that this grant program has approved the funding of four more club projects for the 2025 season from: Naples, Waterloo, Bloomfield, and Victor/Farmington Rotary Clubs. These estimated foundation gifts should reach \$ 14,000. This will enable us to complete a few more important projects that should end our capital needs for the foreseeable future. We also recognize and thank the Naples Rotary Club for funding the renovation of the ceramic lodge with an \$8,000 gift.

The outreach to foundations to generate new income sources continue. So far, we have received one grant

for 2025: \$20,000 from the Finger Lakes Area Community Foundation and hope to receive 2 more from area foundations. Our standard policy of charging no camper fees is still in place.

Your contributions are vital in order for this program to continue and may be sent to: Camp Onseyawa, PO Box 723, Canandaigua, NY 14424.

We thank the many Rotarians who continue to give so much to the fiscal and program challenges. Thank you so much for your incredible teamwork and support. Thank you for lighting a fire of hope for these special kids.

It will soon be time to open the camp gates on August 10 and welcome 70 kids to summer camp. The campwide annual carnival is set for the afternoon of August 17. Come on down and visit us on that day at Camp Whitman.




E-Club of District 7120




